Let me tell you what has been going on in Century Village this summer. We have been busy with many new projects and they are now coming to fruition.

Our irrigation system around the perimeter road is complete. However, the landscaping of the swales will have to be postponed to a later date. It will be done by quadrants around the road and completed as soon as funds are available. The Beautification Committee has accomplished quite a lot, and we can all be proud of the attractive entrances to the Village. The Committee also has ambitious plans for further landscaping.

At this writing, we are about to close the deal with the county to acquire the unused medical building and surrounding parking areas at the Okeechobee gate. We hope eventually to use this building as the new home of our United Civic Organization. I particularly would like to thank Irv Spevak for his valuable input in helping us to close this deal.

As always, in our projects, we are working as a team for the betterment of all our residents. I am planning to meet with all the association presidents on a one-to-one basis to find out how UCO can help them.

We are currently involved in meetings with county representatives in order to guarantee a steady supply of water for our lake and canals. This will help reduce the problem of erosion when the water level rises and falls.

I am again urging all delegates to attend our monthly meetings so that you can be informed of all current and future projects.

Let me repeat once more: Please do not park or drive on the swales. The cost of repairing broken pipes and sprinkler heads takes needed funds from our beautification account.

## Procedures for the Completion of the Adelpia Project

As everyone is aware by now, Adelpia has been through every building trying to complete the rewiring necessary for our residents to have digital cable service. Adelpia has been addressing all of the complaints that they have received. We would like to inform the unit owners at this time how to handle certain problems that they may encounter as we go forward with this project.

Construction problems will be handled through the UCO office and then forwarded to the proper representatives of Adelpia. Samples of construction problems would be:

- If access to a unit was not available when Adelpia did the rewiring, then workers will need to come and rewire the unit when access is available.

- If a unit was rewired but the resident was not home and upon inspection of the rewiring the unit owner is not satisfied with the installation, workers will need to return and correct the wiring

- If there is any external wiring around the building that the association is not satisfied with, workers will need to return to correct these deficiencies.

- If there is any landscaping damage from the Adelpia wiring, then workers will need to return to correct these damages.

When you experience one of these situations or one you feel is a construction problem, please call the UCO office at 683-9189 and be prepared to leave your name, address, telephone number, and a brief description of your problem.

Reception or subscription problems will need to be called in to Adelpia's customer service department at 848-1600. If necessary, a service person will come out to help you. Samples of reception problems would be:

- If you are not receiving a clear picture on all of the subscribed channels.

- If you are not receiving all of your subscribed channels.

- If you want to add premium channels to your subscription.

When you experience one of these problems with your reception or with your subscription, you must contact Adelpia's customer service department.

We are printing a tentative schedule from Adelpia for the turnover of the building from the old system to the new system. Adelpia plans to begin this switching August 19<sup>th</sup> and completing on September 9<sup>th</sup>. Please review the schedule for the date you

building is to be switched over.

### HUD Requirements Under the Fair Housing Act Sec. 100.307 Verification of Occupancy

(a) In order for a housing facility or community to qualify as housing for persons 55 years of age or older, it must be able to produce, in response to a complaint filed under this title, verification of compliance with Sec. 100.305 through reliable surveys and affidavits.

(b) A facility or community shall, within 180 days of the effective date of this rule, develop procedures for routinely determining the occupancy of each unit, including the identification of whether at least one occupant of each unit is 55 years of age or older. Such procedures may be part of a normal leasing or purchasing arrangement.

(c) The procedures described in paragraph (b) of this section must provide for regular updates, through surveys or other means, of the initial information supplied by the occupants of the housing facility or community. Such updates must take place at least once every two years. A survey may include information regarding whether any units are occupied by persons described in paragraphs (c)(1), (c)(3), and (c)(4) of Sec. 100.305.

(d) Any of the following documents are considered reliable documentation of the age of the occupants of the housing facility or community:

- (1) Driver's license;
- (2) Birth certificate;
- (3) Passport;
- (4) Immigration card;
- (5) Military identification;

(6) Any other state, local, national, or international official documents containing a birth date of comparable reliability; or

(7) A certification in a lease, application, affidavit, or other document signed by any member of the household age 18 or older asserting that at least one person in the unit is 55 years of age or older.

(e) A facility or community shall consider any one of the forms of verification identified above as adequate for verification of age, provided that it contains specific information about current age or date of birth.

(f) The housing facility or community must establish and maintain appropriate policies to require that occupants comply with the age verification procedures required by this section.

(g) If the occupants of a particular dwelling unit refuse to comply with the age verification procedures, the housing facility or community may, if it has sufficient evidence, consider the unit to be occupied by at least one person 55 years of age or older. Such evidence may include:

(1) Government records or documents, such as a local household census;

(2) Prior forms or applications; or

(3) A statement from an individual who has personal knowledge of the age of the occupants. The individual's statement must set forth the basis for such knowledge and be signed under the penalty of perjury.

(h) Surveys and verification procedures which comply with the requirements of this section shall be admissible in administrative and judicial proceedings for the purpose of verifying occupancy.

(i) A summary of occupancy surveys shall be available for inspection upon reasonable notice and request by any person. (Approved by the Office of Management and Budget under control number 2529-0046.)

Time and time again, I have informed our unit owners of the difference between living in a condominium and living in a private home or in an apartment. Our rules, regulations, and restrictions are for the benefit of all the association's unit owners, as well as all persons living in Century Village. If the contents of the association's documents are not enforced, then the breach in governing will only widen until chaos results.

Having said this, how can we rectify these types of situations? First of all, I implore each and every unit owner to please take an active part in the administration of your condo association. It's only a minimal amount of time involved and your life experience is the only experience that is necessary. Secondly, ten percent of the unit can request to have a meeting of

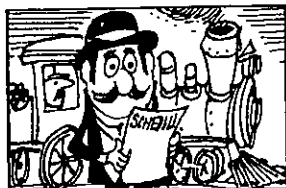

Let me wish all our residents a healthy, happy, and sweet New Year.

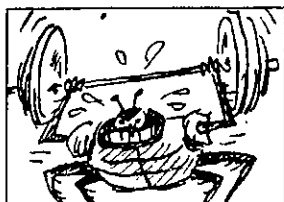

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### Why the Bar Code?

During the winter season, long lines are common at both security gates entering our Village. Having to stop and prove your reason to enter is a hassle UCO has tried to relieve. At each gate, right lane only, there is a scanner that reads a bar code and it automatically opens the gate for that lane. But first, your vehicle must have the bar code affixed to the outside of the right rear window.

On the *second Friday* of each month (with a rare exception because of a holiday), your bar code committee, as many as 26 to 28 volunteers, set up at Temple Anshei Sholom from 9 am to 11 am to issue bar codes for your vehicles. As in any structured and organized system, there are rules to be observed. The rules that UCO has adopted are for the assurance that our "bit of paradise" is kept safe and secure. They are simple and easy to observe:

1. A Century Village I.D. card must be shown.
2. A valid driver's license will be shown.
3. A valid vehicle registration (not title, or bill of sale or proof of insurance) will be shown.
4. A charge of \$5 for each bar code will be paid.
5. A change of car will require a new bar code.
6. When you sell or trade your car for a new one, the old bar code (even in shreds) must be returned or
7. a new bar code will cost \$25. The penalty reminds when you sell, trade, give away, or destroy the old car, the new driver will *not have access to CV*.
8. If your car is totaled, a police report or letter from your insurance company will absolve the penalty.
9. Only one (1) bar code per unit will be issued unless there are two (2) licensed drivers in that unit.
10. No commercial vehicle will be issued a bar code.
11. If you lease your car, you must show a period of two years or more on the lease.
12. If you are a yearly tenant, the lease must be shown.
13. If you are a seasonal renter, keep using your I.D. card. No bar code will be issued.

Please remember that Century Village is a gated community for your safety and security. Our security personnel are to be treated with respect and the decency you would show to a certified law person.

Your visitors and tradespeople are called in only from your home phone, which has previously been certified.

The use of your vehicle by any other driver, without your presence in the car, is a cause to remove your bar code. Again, safety, security, and convenience of entry are the reasons for the bar code.

Association presidents, board members, or anyone interested should remind residents who are moving out of the Village, or family members who remove the car, to have the bar code removed.

### Generic Drugs: What Everyone Should Know

(NAPS)—An estimated 44 percent of all prescriptions in the United States are filled with generic drugs. These products carry all the medicinal qualities (and side effects) of their brand-name counterparts, but generics tend to have one additional benefit: lower cost.

According to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA), a generic drug is a copy that is identical to a brand-name drug in dosage, safety, strength, how it is taken, quality, performance and intended use.

New drugs, like other new products, are developed under patent protection. The patent protects the investment—including research, development, marketing and promotion—by giving the company the sole right to sell the drug while the patent is in effect.

When patents or other periods of exclusivity on brand-name drugs are near expiration, manufacturers can apply to the FDA to sell generic versions.

For example, in the 1950s, when the analgesic acetaminophen was developed, it was only available under its brand name—Tylenol. Today, acetaminophen can be found in many other pain-relief products, including generic

and store-brand versions. "FDA-approved generic drugs are bioequivalent and therapeutically equivalent to their brand-name counterparts," says Gary Buehler, director of FDA's Office of Generic Drugs. "People can use them with total confidence."

Both brand-name and generic drug facilities must meet standards of good manufacturing processes. The FDA conducts about 3,500 inspections each year to ensure standards are met. Generic firms have facilities comparable to those of brand-name firms. In fact, brand-name firms account for an estimated 50 percent of generic drug production. They frequently make copies of their own or other brand-name drugs but sell them without the brand name.

There is absolutely no parking on the swales along the perimeter road. Areas have been newly seeded and sprinkler systems installed. Broken pipes and sprinkler heads cost all of us money.

This word seems to be the most popular word used by a few of our residents who ride our buses.

We have made some changes to our transportation schedule as of August 1, 2002, for the good of the whole Village. You notice, I am referring to our community as a village, instead of a city, because that is what we are. Our village happens to have the best transportation system of any retirement village in the Palm Beaches. Your monthly cost is fair and equitable.

The changes we have made were to keep that cost from rising. We stopped going into the Hastings Health Club after the 5 pm run, only on the #1 and #3 routes, because of lack of ridership. The #2 bus and the express will continue to service the stop for the full duration of their runs.

The buses that take you to the malls had to be reconfigured so as to fit into the contractual allotment of the contract. Besides, you are now getting more time to shop those malls.

We have stopped the super bus due to the fact that the amount of residents using this route was practically nil. What we have done is to expand the hours of the shuttle and mall buses to accommodate those residents wishing to take advantage of many restaurants' early bird specials.

We had to make those changes to save time and miles. Over a full year, those figures add up to a very large amount. As I have stated to many of our riders, "If you had a business and you were spending \$10,000 a month and found a way to save \$9,000 a month, without disrupting service, which option would you take?" I did not get many answers; instead, the questioner walked away.

We plan to take our Jewish residents, who are planning to use the temple in the Hastings area, to Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services directly to the temple on their respective bus runs. Please look for the schedule that will be posted in your bus.

We are also taking our residents to the front door of the library on Okeechobee Boulevard.

During the primary election on September 10, 2002, and the regular election on November 5, 2002, you will

have direct service to your polling place, starting from 8 am until the polls close.

Why not concentrate on the positive instead of the negative? It will cause fewer ulcers and less sleepless nights.

sible.

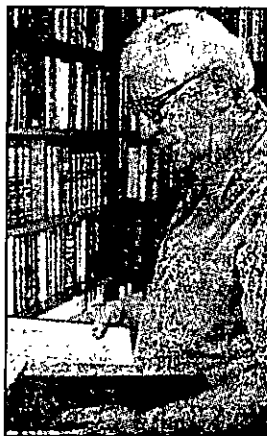
Imagine, me, in my senior years, weakening and seriously looking into another technology in the form of a cell phone to adapt to the times.

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# A White Boy in Manila

By George Loewenstein



*In November 2001, there was a book on the bestseller list titled Ghost Soldiers. At the time described in this book, George Loewenstein was a child in Manila. Now 67 years old, and living in Century Village, West Palm Beach, he has consented to share his story.*

*Born in Berlin, Germany, on August 14, 1934. George and his family fled the Nazis in 1939. During those five short years, hazy memories.*

*Riding the corridor of an apartment on a bicycle with training wheels; Hitler youth marching down the street with drums beating and trumpets blaring; jealousy—because they looked so good in their brown uniforms; the need to flee, with no country willing to accept stateless Jews; taking grandparents to the airport on their way to Italy; on a train with parents, through a long tunnel to a ship in Italy; a fifth birthday, and a small airplane with pontoons as a gift; ice cream served in a metal dish; the ship's crew calling him Bambino; all the windows on the ship covered in black*

*War had started and since Italy and Germany were allies, there was discussion about returning the Jews to Germany, but the Italian ship's captain decided to continue toward the Phillipines (which had agreed to accept Jews.)*

*And now, here, in George's own words, his life in Manila from age 5 to age 12:*

My first recollection is my first day in kindergarten in an American school, and my not understanding a word of what the teacher or students said since I didn't understand a word of English. Everyone was making fun of me. I cried bitterly until my mother transferred me to the kindergarten in a Catholic convent by the name of Santa Escolastica. The nuns were of German origin and translated for me. That is how I learned English. Another

Jewish student there was Eva Susskind.

I can visualize our synagogue, Rabbi Schwartz, and Cantor Cysner. The children would go up to the *Bimah* Friday nights to hear the cantor recite the *Kiddush*. I remember one Friday being up there and having to go to the bathroom. It leaked down my legs (I was wearing short pants) for all to see. I guess I was too young to be embarrassed. The synagogue youth group put on a play and I was a bellhop dressed like Johnny in the Philip Morris ad. Susie Welsh was a chambermaid. My cousins were also in the play.

At first, we lived with my mother's parents on Santa Monica Street. It was the first house in from Dewey (now Roxas) Boulevard and the ocean, with a view of Bataan and Corregidor. After awhile, my father, mother, my father's mother and I moved into our own apartment on the same street. We were able to watch on December 7, 1941, as the Japanese planes dropped bombs on Bataan and Corregidor.

The next day, my uncle urged us to join him in a province called Saryaya. He apparently was working for a firm that had housing there. I also remember that at some point he owned two horses (stabled in the garage) which he used to pull a *caramata* (a nine-passenger, two-wheeled wagon). I recall my dad making hair pomade. He bought a car and on the way, driving it home, he apparently, unbeknownst to him, had a minor collision with a *caramata* and the driver followed him home to claim compensation.

We did flee to the province; my mother, my father's mother, my mother's parents and my uncle, aunt, and three cousins. (My aunt was my mother's sister, Lotte. Her husband, Ziggy Eichholz, and their children were Gunther, and twins Werner and Ilse. All made it to America, and at this writing, the older generation has passed on, but the three Eichholz cousins are alive with spouses, children, and grandchildren.)

We stayed in a native house made of thatched sides and roof. My father stayed to watch our apartments. A few days after our arrival, the Japanese invaded the Philip

pines.

When the troops reached our home, they were startled to see white people. They lined us up against the wall with their rifles aimed at our bodies. My uncle kept saying we were Germans. Hitler had declared all German Jews stateless and put that into our German passports. He then put his stamp, consisting of a swastika, as signature. The Japanese soldiers could not speak English, but did recognize the swastika, and marched us to an open square where their commander was sitting, feet in a tub of water. Still believing that we were Germans, he gave us safe conduct passes back to Manila.

In the meantime, my dad succeeded in finding us and we journeyed back by hitchhiking rides on Japanese military vehicles. I remember one Japanese soldier giving me rock candy, something I had never seen before. To this day, seeing rock candy brings back that memory.

The American and Filipino Army retreated to Bataan, a peninsula in Manila Bay, as well as Corregidor, an island in the bay. Guns from Manila and from ships bombarded these places for weeks until they surrendered. We could watch this from the shore. After the surrender, the military prisoners were marched, partially on Dewey Boulevard passed our house, to a P.O.W. camp. We watched how those poor G.I.s were beaten when they could not keep up. Some were shot af-

And above all this hovers the cloud of a possible double-dip recession ("The economy, stupid" — remember?); the ever-rising national deficit; and a feeling of betrayal due to the outright thievery perpetuated by the barons of many of our major corporations, causing the nation's economy to take a nosedive.

Enough to think about, certainly enough to make you want to do something about it. It should really make you want to participate in the primaries and the general elections.

Our potential in having a decisive voice in the primaries is significant and there are thousands of votes to be cast in Century Village in November, which may well influence the final outcome in some of the races.

Century Village will see a major effort to get this vote out. There are too many problems to be decided for us to sit home and not let our votes count. Our constitution endows us with the privilege of freely choosing our government. It is more than a privilege — it is a duty.

# My Trip to China

So what did I do last summer? I went to China. We flew on 11 planes, sailed on the Yangtze River for five days, were paddled on a sampan through the Parrot and Dragon Gorges, and took a train to Hong Kong.

I must compliment the Chinese transportation system. Their planes and trains left and arrived on time. Mussolini did the same thing for Italy, so they hung him up by his feet.

The domestic portion of my flight wasn't so ideal. We flew Northwest Airlines from WPB to Detroit to make a connection to Tokyo. We boarded Flight 11 in Detroit and sat there while the maintenance crew went looking for a replacement tire for this big 747. Imagine that, in Detroit, the home of General Motors, Ford, Chrysler, and Firestone, it took them almost two hours to find a tire so we could take off.

After almost an eternity of flying time, we arrived in the land of the rising sun. They held up our connecting flight to Beijing so Northwest Air would not have to pay a hotel bill for hundreds of travelers. I presented my boarding pass to the Japanese ticket taker. He said, "You go other line. No seat for you here." So we went to the other line. The guard said, "Show pass." "I gave my pass to the other guard," said I. After a lot of key punching, they realized that they had sold my seat. I had a choice: sleep in the airport or travel first class.

Fran and I were assigned leather armchair recliners. We were served champagne and a steak and lobster dinner. It was heavenly to be completely reclined for a four hour flight from Tokyo to Beijing. I felt sorry for the coach passengers in their cramped seats. This time, I

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## A Profile in Courage: Herman Savoy



*Lee Demeter told this story at the May 2, 1992, reunion of the 445<sup>th</sup>. He served as Battery C's commander during the war.*

I would like Herman Savoy to join me up front, as I tell you of an incident that occurred on February 12, 1945. As we were proceeding with the Eighth Infantry Division toward Duran, Cologne, and the Rhine River crossings. Herman was my headquarters communication sergeant and always accompanied me on reconnaissance missions whenever we had to move our command post. I tell this story not so much to single out Mr. Savoy as one of the bravest of the 445<sup>th</sup>, but rather to use his example as an illustration of what you men of the 445<sup>th</sup> were frequently called upon to do during your combat service overseas.

On the day in question, I had tentatively selected an abandoned house for my new CP. Behind the house was a field about the size and shape of a football field. A large barn was located about where the goal posts would have been on the right side. The barn seemed to be an ideal spot for the motor pool and supply station. My supply chief, Master Sgt. "Scotty" Bowman, and my motor pool director, Master Sgt. Smith (whom we called "Smitty"), started walking down the barn for a closer look while I headed to the house to check its suitability. In less than a minute, I heard a tremendous explosion and saw in the direction toward which Scotty and Smitty had been moving a geyser of earth shooting up to a height of about a hundred feet. It was obvious the two men had walked on some powerful mines and set them off. I thought for sure they must have been killed instantly. Still, I called out to them, hoping that by some miracle, they had survived. There was no answer.

Since time was of the essence, if they were still alive and we were to give them medical attention, I immediately decided to try to clear a

path through the minefield to them. I knew it was risky because anti-aircraft battalions were not equipped with mine detectors and, except for booby traps, we had received little formal training in mine detection and removal. But I did have some familiarity with German mines and felt that the risk had to be taken.

I turned to the dozen or so men of my headquarters staff who had assembled around me, explained my decision, and asked for one volunteer to join me. The two of us on our knees side by side, our bayonets in hand, carefully probed the ground and cleared a path to the two men.

Without any hesitation, Sgt. Savoy stepped forward, saluted me, and said, "Captain, sir, I'm your man. I'm ready when you are." At that point, my executive officer,

Lt. Orvie Jensen, approached me and offered to take my place. I thanked him, but told him I felt it was the duty of the battery commander to take on that assignment. I then asked him to try to get help from some combat engineers and infantrymen I had spotted earlier clearing mines about half a mile up the road.

Sgt. Savoy and I began probing the soil for mines. The ground was soft and damp owing to an unseasonal thaw and it yielded easily to our thrusts. We had advanced about ten yards without encountering any mines when I heard a loud voice behind me say, "Captain, we're combat engineers. We've come to help. Let us take over and finish the job." I was glad to accept his offer and I suspect Herman Savoy was glad too. With their mine detectors, the

engineers quickly cleared a path to Scotty and Smitty and ascertained that they had been killed instantly.

It took a lot of courage for Herman Savoy to step forward as a volunteer. He had received no training in removing mines, had never held German mines in his hands, and he knew we would have to work not with mine detectors but with bayonets. Yet, he was willing to place his life on the line because he knew that two of his buddies were lying out there, possibly in desperate need of medical attention. You have to have the right stuff to risk your own life to save someone else's. Herman Savoy had it in abundance.

arrived rested, knowing full well that this peasant will be back in coach on the return trip.

**Beijing:** Our English-speaking guide met us at the airport. She recognized us by the yellow buttons we had to wear in China. Reminds me of the yellow stars my fellow Jews had to wear in Europe. We became a group of 13 tourists. A family of four from California, a couple from New Jersey, senior citizens on their honeymoon from Tampa, a farmer's wife from Minnesota, Charlie and Abby Block and Lou and Fran Augenblick from Century Village.

A 40-passenger tour bus was assigned to our group of 13. Another young lady guide joined us and took us to the Palace Hotel, which rented stores to all the top designers like Gucci, Pucci, Chanel, Versace, Hilfiger, etc., etc., etc.

How was the food? Breakfast was served in the grand dining room buffet style. Traditional American food such as hot and cold cereals, bacon and eggs, danish, etc. Also the native Chinese

dishes. We ate dinner in the hotel's gourmet restaurant. Everyone sits around a big Lazy Susan and they bring out platter after platter of assorted chef's specials. All through China, this was the style of eating, except that, in each city, the variety changed according to the region. There must be a glut of watermelons in China because at every meal there was watermelon.

On every light pole and on most of the high rise buildings, there were banners proclaiming the *Olympics, 2008*, in Beijing, even before they were selected for this event. They were bulldozing the old neighborhoods and landscaping with grass and trees. They still have to clean up the smog.

Beijing is a thoroughly modern city. High rise office buildings and new apartment buildings with over 50 levels. Old habits never die. Each apartment has a long bamboo pole extending from the terrace from which they hang their clothes to dry. The traffic is beyond description. Cars, buses, trucks, and bicycles yield no right of way. It's bumper to bumper and survival of the fittest. There

are street sweepers wearing coolie sun hats who keep the roads spotless. They also sweep the bodies away after the fatal traffic accidents.

On the agenda was Tiananmen Square. This is the largest gathering place in the world. Students arrive in groups wearing the colors of their region to make a pilgrimage to this place. There are soldiers on guard duty here who do not move or blink their eyes for hours while standing in the hot sun. We went on to the Forbidden City and Imperial Palace. Whoever built these places must have loved steps. All you do is climb steps. The ancient emperors had their slaves to carry them up the steps. Oh, to be an emperor.

The next day, we went up to *The Great Wall*. This is one of the seven wonders of the world. It's a wonder how they ever built it. The wall stretches about 7,000 miles and it's all uphill. Yes! We walked the wall after which we had refreshments at the tea house of the tired feet. A salesgirl tried to sell me a hand-embroidered silk kimono fit for an emperor — only \$350. I said, "I'll take a coolie hat for two bucks; that's more my

style."

**Shanghai:** We were met at the airport by our new local guides Wong and Mongo the bus driver, who along with Louise, our overall tour guide, took us to the Hotel Shangri-La. Along the way, we saw a new, revitalized Shanghai. Skyscrapers and apartment buildings in pastel colors. Super highways and tunnels. Boulevards and shopping streets teeming with activity. The Shangri-La Hotel was super five star, right on the river. When I got to my room and opened the drapes, I could see no river. I saw bamboo scaffolding of a building they were putting up next door. I ran right down to the room clerk and yelled, "Where's the river?" He said, "Out the door." I said, "No! I want the river out the window." As if by magic, a bellhop appeared with a new electronic key in hand. He moved me, bag and baggage, to a river view on the 18<sup>th</sup> floor.

We had dinner in the hotel. It was buffet. The waitress asked if we wanted coffee, tea, or beer. In all of the other dining places we ate in, beer was part of the meal. Not here. When I checked

out, they charged my credit card for \$16 for two glasses of beer. Well, that's five stars and river view.

The next day, we went to the Shanghai Museum. The most interesting exhibit was the artifacts that China borrowed from Tibet after they invaded them. I came across an exhibit of a Buddha statue sitting in front of a huge Star of David. I was so intrigued that I decided I must have a picture of this, even though there was a sign reading no photos, cameras will be confiscated. Well, I slipped out my Olympus and quickly took a shot. The flash alerted the guard and he came running to catch me. He yelled, "No photo, no photo." I replied, "No comprende, no comprende." He threw his hands up in the air and walked away. What if he was a gung ho communist? He could have taken my camera and thrown my tush in jail to undergo Chinese water torture as an American spy. I have the picture of the Buddha but I didn't stick around the museum long enough to get the history of the Buddha with the Star of David. I can only surmise that a Turkish

Jew traveled the trade routes to Tibet many centuries ago and was impressed by the Buddha. He built a Turkish bath and called it Buddha Inn.

After dinner at the Shangri-La, our bus with Louise, Wong, and Mongo headed for the Ritz Carlton Hotel to see an acrobatic show. Traffic was heavy, but Mongo, our driver, would not be constained. He climbed on the bumpers of every vehicle in front of him. Merge to him meant charge. Every bicycle in his way was to be splattered. Mongo and his bus were the king of the road. He was a force to be reckoned with. He got us to the show on time and he was proud that nothing deterred him from carrying out his assigned task.

The next day, we went to a school for talented children. They played musical instruments and were quite good. We continued on to the Jade Buddha temple and climbed more steps. Our guide took us to the riverfront, which is a promenade with vendors selling souvenirs and ice cream. This area is known as the Bund, which means a band of people. Who were these people? They were a band of Jews who ran from Russian persecution in the early 1900s. They walked across Siberia and down into China. They finally settled along the river in Shanghai. They became merchants, traders, and bankers. The Chinese government welcomed and accommodated these new refugees for bringing commerce and prosperity to the region.

The Russian Revolution brought another wave of Jews to Shanghai. The first band gave the next group jobs and homes. Hitler's rise to power brought still another band of refugees to the Bund in Shanghai.

Along came World War II. Japan had invaded China. Germany becomes allied with Japan. Hitler tells Japan to kill the Jews of Shanghai. Japan refuses to kill Jews, but accommodates Hitler by confiscating Jewish property and moving them to less desirable neighborhoods. Some Jews were transported to Japan, but none were murdered by the Japanese.

The next morning, we visited the Three Gorge Dam site. This will be the largest dam in the world. It will be completed in about eight years. The Yangtze River will

rise 100 to 300 feet and wipe out all the homes and cities on the banks of this river. There is a massive relocation job going on.

Our guides drove us to the airport for the next leg of our journey. We gave a big cheer for Mongo, our driver, who delivered us in one piece, though some of our group had to take nitro pills to stop their hearts from pounding due to his Indianapolis maneuvers.

**Yangtze River Cruise:** We flew to Ya Ching and then were bused to the *MS East Queen* cruise ship. We boarded about 11:00 pm. This is a five-star riverboat with all outside cabins and complete accommodations. We sailed at midnight. Breakfast and lunch were buffet. Dinner was Chinese Lazy Susan or western food on advance re-

quest. We had a roast Peking duck dinner one night. As a treat, they served the skin of the duck deep fried. Yech.

The river called Yangtze is not blue or green — it's brown. All the waste, human and otherwise, flows into this river. Millions of people live on the banks of this river. They fish, they wash, they live on junks all on this river. They must have inherited immunity. The advantages of taking a cruise are to unpack your bags, rest your weary bones, a short walk to the food supply, and let the scenery float past you while you relax.

There was a stop on the river where most of the passengers on the boat got off. They walked up a hill and then climbed 300 steps to a temple on top of the mountain. There was a light rain

that day, so I stayed on the boat. My wife developed a swollen knee from that climb.

We continued upstream on the Yangtze and made a stop at Badong. There were ten *sampans* waiting for us to transfer onto. Each boat had a capacity of 15 passengers plus two oarsmen and one on the rudder. They paddled us off the muddy Yangtze into a tributary called the Shennon Stream. Here the water turned a clear blue/green as our oarsmen pushed the boat against the current. There were high cliffs on two sides of us. The sun was blocked out entirely as we sailed through the gorges. To break the monotony of this back-breaking task, the crew of each *sampan* had turned it into a contest of which boat would reach the turnaround,

cave first. Our crew worked very hard, but we lost.

After five days on the *MS East Queen* riverboat, we ended up in *Chongqing*. The next thing on the agenda was a visit to the old neighborhood of Kunming. Our bus parked on a narrow street and we walked up the block, proceeded into a walled entrance to the backyard of some old tenement buildings, and there it was: *The Stillwell Museum*.

**The Stillwell Museum:** Before the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor, they had invaded China. China was in desperate need of supplies to ward off the invaders. A group of Americans under the leadership of General Claire Chenault volunteered to fight for China. They formed a unit called the *Flying Tigers*. They flew sup-

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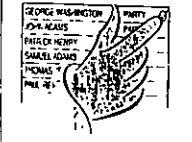

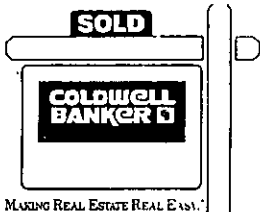

ter they fell to the ground from heat exhaustion or injuries; others were prodded along by the bayonets on the tips of the Japanese rifles. It was a frightening sight, especially for an eight-year-old.

We then moved to a home on Porvenear Street. It was the upstairs portion of a two-family house. My parents and I slept in one bedroom and my father's mother in the other. She was 86 years old. Two doors down from us was Eva's house. Across the street was a house occupied by the Japanese military. Aunt Lotte Cassel also lived near us. My mother's mother had a brother and sister-in-law who had preceded us to the Philippines and I believe were the ones responsible for our admittance to the country. My family thus consisted of my parents and my father's mother, my maternal grandparents, my uncles, and aunt. My recollection of my great uncle and aunt was that he was a tailor and made uniforms for the Japanese officers. They didn't live close to us, so I had limited contact with them.

My religious schooling at that period of time consisted of private lessons at our cantor's home. Japanese soldiers were all over the place. Each facility had an armed sentry with a bayonet attached to his rifle. It was required of everyone who passed a sentry to face him and bow, even if not entering the facility. Failure to do so was punished by slaps in the face.

The Japanese were extremely harsh with thieves that they caught. The suspects were hung on a tree upside down in a public place and each Japanese passing by either kicked or hit the person. After 24 hours of this, he was usually dead. I remember walking by and seeing an individual strung up and the next day seeing the same individual still hanging, but dead. This scene was duplicated many times since food got scarce and there were more and more attempts at stealing food from the Japanese.

The Japanese were very intimidating and one never knew the reaction of any soldier when passing him on the street. They used Koreans as slaves to do the menial tasks. I once saw a Japanese beat one of the Koreans with a thick stick like a baseball bat

while holding the Korean with a wire around his wrist anchored to the wrist of the Japanese. This beating took place on a public street for all to see.

The Japanese who occupied the house across from us were initially very decent. When my grandmother's eyes began failing, they insisted on sending over a Japanese Army doctor who, unfortunately, could not help. They also insisted that I learn Japanese and came over every day to give me a lesson. I couldn't refuse without expecting some kind of retaliation.

As the war progressed, our lives kept getting worse. The Japanese appropriated all the food because they needed it to supply their troops. We were left with brown or red

rice, which was turned into flour for bread, roasted for coffee, or eaten as rice. Meat did not exist for us, but we did eat snails taken off tree trunks. For a sweetener, we used a byproduct of sugar refinement. It was a brown, hard cake which tasted terrible. Vegetables often were green leaves of some type and bamboo shoots. Ants were also a staple, but did little to satisfy our hunger. I remember my dad buying me a bamboo pole so that I could learn to fish. Once in a while a Filipino brought us some butter. He was a guerrilla fighter in the mountains, and every so often, they were supplied by a U.S. submarine. Obviously, if he was caught, it would have meant instant death.

For a few years, we were allowed to continue to have

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religious services in our synagogue, but as time went by, the Germans prodded their Japanese allies to move against the Jews, so they took over the temple and made it into an ammunition dump. Unknown to us, the Germans also sent over a list with all the names of the German families who had emigrated to the Philippines, with the request that they be annihilated. Thank G-d that the Japanese did not carry out that request, because our names were on that list. A copy of it is in the Holocaust Museum in Washington, D.C.

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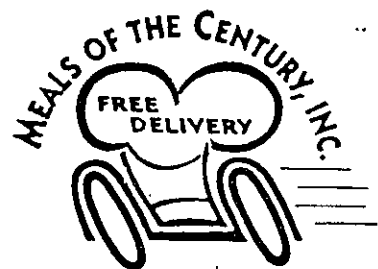

plies into China from India and also engaged the Japanese in aerial combat.

When the United States entered the war after Pearl Harbor, General Joseph Stillwell was given command of the Burma-China theater of operations. He organized the Chinese warlords, including General Chang Kai Chek and brought in the communist faction to become one strong fighting force against the common enemy.

The museum displays pictures of those desperate hours in China. There is also a film a visitor can watch if you can endure sitting on a backless wooden bench. There is a collection box near the exit to help support this museum. That's a shame! The Chinese government should move this museum to a more desirable area so that their own people could see the American contribution in China's struggle. Our own government and own veterans' organizations should contribute to the upkeep and maintenance of this piece of history.

**The Terra-Cotta Warriors:** A few years ago, a farmer, digging a well for water, discovered a tomb of

dead warriors. Strangely, they never lived. They were made of stone. The emperor, Han Jing Di, had this tomb built for himself. He wanted his army of warriors to protect him in his afterlife, so he had 7,000 warriors made of stone buried in his tomb with him. I don't buy this premise. If he could bury his wife and concubines with him and they were flesh and bone, then why would he settle for 7,000 stone warriors? I'll tell you why. Because he couldn't convince 7,000 warriors to kill themselves and be buried with him.

We flew on to Guilin and checked into the Sheraton Hotel. President Clinton slept here, so they say. We had a free night, so we walked down the block to a fantastic shopping area of nice stores. Fran and Abby bought some hand-painted scrolls. They thought they got a good buy, but in the next town, it was even cheaper.

A river runs through Guilin. This river is clean and green. We boarded this deluxe riverboat for sightseeing and lunch. They cooked lunch on open barbecue grills on an aft deck. Beer and bottled water were served with the meal I was turned off by

After lunch, we drove to Yangshou and we went to explore the Yin Zi Cave. To get into this cave, we had to climb up a path of endless steps. We entered the cave. It was dimly lit. The foot path was narrow, but there were guard rails. It was like a fairy land. There were vast caverns. Rocks in the shape of icicles were suspended from above. The colors were indescribable. 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## Periodontal (Gum) Disease

You have always taken care of your teeth, gone to the dentist regularly, gotten some cavities filled, your teeth cleaned and done all the right things, you thought. Oh sure, your gums bled occasionally when you brushed, but doesn't everybody's? You had no pain or apparent dental problems; all seemed normal; you expect another routine visit.

So one day you get the shock of your life; during one of your apparent routine visits, you hear your dentist say you may be developing a serious gum condition and he wants to refer you to a dental specialist called a periodontist. After the shock wears off, you start asking questions; what has gone wrong? How could I have prevented this? Will I lose my teeth? Is this treatment expensive? These are some of the questions that may come to mind that you would like to have answers to.

Perhaps some of the answers can be supplied to you by the periodontist after he completes his comprehensive examination:

1. You will be questioned about your general health: has there been a change, such as diabetes or pregnancy, etc? A systematic problem could have oral manifestations and contribute to periodontal disease.

2. A complete dental history will be taken such as your current dental health and previous treatment. Also, you will be asked about your previous motivation and commitment to home care, so necessary for good oral health.

3. The dental exam itself is vital in evaluating the extent of your problem. Your gums are examined for bleeding, swelling, and firmness; also for sensitivity and movement. Full mouth x-rays are necessary and a great help in detecting breakdown of the surrounding bone support. And, lastly, each tooth will be probed with a measuring instrument to determine the depth of the pockets around each tooth. Normal pocket depth is between 2-3 millimeters; any depth beyond that may suggest problems.

At the conclusion of this exam, your periodontist is now in a position to answer all your questions and to discuss treatment options with you. These options may be of a surgical or non-surgical nature. In extreme cases, one or

more teeth may have to be extracted as part of the overall treatment plan. All this will be discussed, both with you and your general dentist.

Whatever plan you decide is best for you, you must make a definite commitment to lifetime home care, or the entire treatment will fail. This consists of proper brushing, flossing, and regular check-ups.

Periodontal disease has been with us for as long as we have had teeth. What is new is that we now have the skills and technique to control this infection. By combining your own efforts with that of the dental professionals, your teeth and gums may be restored to health.

An attractive appearance, healthy teeth and gums, and comfortable eating: that's something to smile about.

## Bar Code Rules

Bar Codes, the program initiated several years ago, allow easy access to Century Village. Bar Codes are sold at \$5.00 each only on the second Friday (or the Friday one week after UCO meeting, between 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. You will need the following in order to obtain a Bar Code:

### Bar Code Rules and Regulations:

1. A valid Century Village ID card
2. A valid Driver's License from the state in which your car is registered
3. A valid Auto Registration. If a Florida resident, the registration must show a CV address
4. If you rent the unit, bring a copy of the lease showing at least 6 months until expiration
5. If you lease your car, the car registration and lease agreement must show your name, and lease agreement must be for 2 years or more
6. If your spouse has a car, the rules above apply.
7. If you trade, sell, or if your car is destroyed, your car replacement Bar Code will be \$25.00 if your old Bar Code is not returned (even if in shreds). No excuses are accepted. A police report of accident will be honored if your car is totaled
8. No more than two Bar Codes per unit will be issued

## Hurricane Check List

Below is a list of things you should do before, during and after a hurricane. This short list was put together from all the information the Emergency Committee could find.

### Things To Do Now

1. Review your insurance policy
2. Call the UCO Office if you must depend on electricity for your life support in any manner. Example, oxygen, refrigeration for insulin, etc.
3. If you want to install shutters, speak with your association president. Storm panels are recommended. (Note: Century Village is not an evacuation area. Our buildings and our area are considered very safe in a hurricane.)
4. If you are leaving for the hurricane season, remove or secure all items on your patio. Take them inside. Remember it is not the wind that destroys but the objects the wind throws around that causes destruction
5. Trim all your trees
6. Select a safe room in your apartment away from windows and doors and all flying debris. Example: Use your bathroom if it has no windows, or a hallway.
7. Check stair lights and emergency lights on building.
8. Make arrangements to secure awnings

### Things To Do One Or Two Days Before The Storm

1. Remove all patio furniture.
2. Install your shutters — lower awnings
3. Remove recyclable containers to your laundry room and secure your dumpsters. Tie down lids
4. Fill your car's gasoline tank
5. Turn your refrigerator and freezer to its coldest settings and freeze water in plastic jugs. They will keep food colder longer, if electricity goes off, and when thawed out can be used for drinking
6. Wear your Medic Alert tag
7. Clean your bathtub and then fill with water for sanitary purposes. This is not for drinking
8. Place all your valuables, such as treasured pictures, personal papers, insurance papers, etc., in waterproof containers or plastic garbage bags. Store them on the top shelf of the closet. Also wills, contracts, deeds and bonds, passports, Social Security cards, bank accounts, immunization cards, birth certificates, etc.
9. Secure checkbook, cash, ATM card. Do not leave valuables in a home safe during the hurricane
10. For those on electric assisted oxygen: Get the necessary portable tanks for their needs (2-hr., 6-hr., or 7-day supplies) in case of prolonged power outages
11. For those on insulin: Get a small insulated cooler and ice packs so you can keep insulin cool during outages without many trips to the refrigerator.
12. For all emergencies. Call 911
13. For further information. Contact the offices of UCO at 683-9189. Ask for Vince Salvo, Dan Salvo, Irv Lazar, Dave Bernstein

### Kit Check List

1. Water — the most important! One gallon per person, per day.
2. Packaged foods — canned meats, fruits, vegetables, juices, milk, soup, sugar, salt, pepper, peanut butter, jelly, crackers, granola bars, cookies, hard candy, sweetened cereals, instant coffee, tea bags
3. Manual can opener (not one operated by electricity)
4. Toiletries — toilet paper, soap, feminine supplies, denture needs, extra eyeglasses.
5. First aid kit — bandages, gauze pads, tape, scissors, tweezers, needle, antiseptic, safety pins, sunscreen, aspirin
6. Battery operated radio
7. Extra batteries for flashlights, radio, etc. and charge rechargeable batteries
8. Candles
9. Eating utensils — paper cups, plates, plastic knives and forks
10. Extra medicine — prescriptions
11. Flashlights
12. Matches
13. Mosquito repellent.
14. Plastic trash bags — to store many of the items in this section.
15. Portable cooler
16. Change of clothing
17. Entertainment — games and books.

### During the Hurricane

1. Stay in your safe room or hallway
2. Close and stay away from all windows
3. If electricity goes off, use only flashlights during the storm
4. Keep on your person at all times keys to home and car, driver's license, cash
5. Bring into the safe room a pillow or mattress in case you need to cover yourself from flying debris. Also bring in as many items from the hurricane list as you can — especially water
6. If no electricity, use your battery-operated radio and tune in to FM 100.7 Y-100; 107.9 WIRK, 102.3 WHLG, AM 1290 WBZT, 1450 WSTV. Don't listen to rumors. Get the truth from the radio

### After the Hurricane

1. Stay tuned to the radio for instructions.
2. Don't use the telephone unless you have a life-threatening emergency
3. Don't use electrical appliances until they are dry
4. Don't drink tap water unless you are told it is OK. Boil the water for five minutes before using.
5. Do not refreeze thawed out food. If electricity is out, try store foods in freezer compartment
6. Your Security and COP rover cars will be around to make sure all buildings are secure.
7. If you are able-bodied and would like to assist your troubled neighbors, report to the Command Post — the old UCO office by the Camden Pool
8. After the storm, if you have problems, call the UCO office at 683-9336 and speak to the Emergency Committee. Ask for Messrs. Salvo, Lazar, or Bernstein

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
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
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**Vacation Recommendations**

If you plan to be away from your home or apartment for a month or more, observing the following tips would be in your best interest:

**Air Conditioner**

No humidistat installed in the house:

- Set your thermostat at 80 degrees, cool and auto

With humidistat installed in the house:

- Set your thermostat at 75 degrees, cool and auto
- Set your humidistat at 65 percent

**Refrigeration**

- Empty your refrigerator
- Clean it thoroughly
- Turn it off
- Leave both refrigerator and freezer doors open

When you will return, it will take approximately 24 hours for the refrigerator to resume normal temperature

**Hot Water Heater**

- Unplug the water heater
- Turn the valve off located on top of the water heater
- Turn off circuit breaker to water heater

**Water**

- Turn off the main water valve
- Test approximately 24 hours before leaving to ensure valve doesn't leak

**Dishwasher**

- Run your dishwasher through a short cycle
- Add one cup of vinegar during the last cycle
- Empty a large pot of water into the bottom of your dishwasher and close the door

**Garbage Disposal**

- Put a quarter cup of salad oil in the disposal
- Allow it to run for an instant
- Unplug the disposal under the kitchen sink

**Toilets**

- Remove any bluing containers from the tanks
- Cover the top of the bowl with Saran Wrap (prevents water in the bowl from evaporating)

**Wall Plugs**

- Disconnect TVs
- Disconnect radios
- Disconnect lamps

**Circuit Breakers**

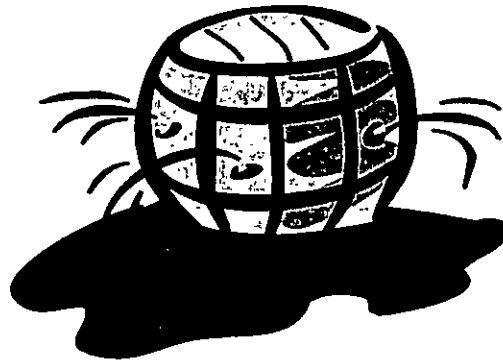
- Turn off individual circuit breakers except those for the air conditioner and, if it is left on, the refrigerator
