The Bi-Lateral Agreement

First, please understand, this agreement has nothing to do with the Millennium Agreement or your condominium documents.

This agreement was drafted in 1999.

This is the document (agreement) that allows UCO to accomplish some of the tasks that you expect from them.

Some of these tasks are Transportation, Cable, Screening (investigations), Insurance, and Landscaping, Irrigation of the Perimeter Roadways and Swales. This is not a complete list, but rather an attempt to alert you to the types of services involved.

Approximately 75% of the Associations signed this agreement when it was originally presented, however, there has been little effort expended to have the balance of the Associations sign this document.

Those Associations who have not signed will have a copy of the document mailed to them for their signature. If there are questions please contact the UCO Office for clarification.

Please, if you do not have this agreement in effect, watch for it in the mail! **This is very important.**

Meeting of Candidates

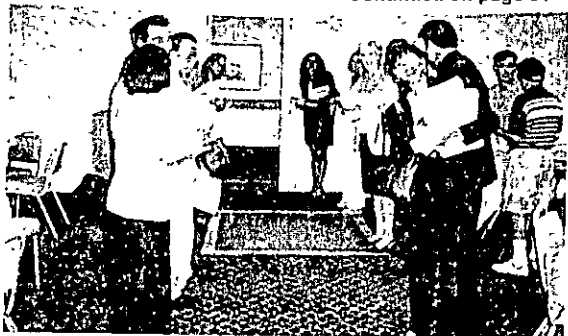

Legal Notice

In accordance with UCO Bylaws, the following proposed amendments were submitted by the Advisory Committee to the Executive Board. Their approval was recommended by the Executive Board and must be published before being presented to the Delegate Assembly for their adoption.

Underlined words are additions to the present text. Words stricken out are to be deleted.

Advisory Committee

Article VII

C. TREASURER — The Treasurer shall keep a full and correct account of all cash receipts and disbursements and deposit all funds in banks, or financial institutions in the name of and to the credit of the organization. All such deposits must be secured by United States Treasury Bonds or other papers issued by the United States government, or in bank CD's. Provided, however, said deposits of funds may be invested by loans to WPRF or its successors for "Operating Expenses" and/or the "Operational Budget" under the MILLENNIUM UCO AMENDMENT OPERATING AGREEMENT Said loans to be repaid as decided upon in each case by the Operations Committee. He shall disburse the funds, as need may arise, accepting proper invoices or vouchers for such disbursements. Checks issued in behalf of UCO must be signed by the Treasurer and the President. However, when necessary, a Vice-President may substitute for either. A check will not be issued which does not carry two (2) signatures. He shall be responsible for the maintenance of a complete set of double-entry bookkeeping. Quarterly, he shall submit to the Executive Board a complete accounting of all receipts and disbursements. He shall be the Chairman of the Finance Committee and shall with the assistance of that committee prepare an annual budget for approval by the officers, the Executive Board, and the Delegate Assembly prior to the start of the next fiscal period. He shall arrange for an annual audit of the books and records of the organization by a public accountant certified by the State of Florida.

An Attempt to Explain the Millennium Agreement

For those of you who might not know, this agreement is the lease negotiated between UCO and WPRF whereby UCO leases the Clubhouses and related facilities from WPRF. Representatives of all Associations in the Village signed this lease in late 1999 and it became effective January 1, 2000. This lease covers a 22-year period.

As with any lease, this property continues to be owned by WPRF and because it is a net/net lease, UCO is responsible for the operation and maintenance costs. These costs are then allocated to the individual unit owners and collected by WPRF.

The agreement calls for the creation of an Operations Committee that shall perform functions related to the operation of the CV-WPB Facility, including, but not limited to, the making of all policy and control of all budgetary matters regarding operating expenses. This committee shall also have input into all matters affecting the operation and maintenance of the CV-WPB Facilities, including, but not limited to, adoption of reasonable rules and regulations concerning the utilization of meeting rooms, costs of the operation of the CV-WPB Facilities and programming policy in the entertainment and recreation facilities portion of the Facility.

The agreement sets aside the amount of \$2,717,000 as an operating budget. While this amount seemed fine at the time, there was no allowance for any increase in this budget for the next ten years, except that UCO could recommend any necessary increase and that the unit owners would pay this increase. Please do not be confused; there have been annual increases of 75¢ per month, however, this is paid to and is retained by WPRF Management.

The area that prompts more questions and misunderstanding is what do "we" pay for and why. The why is simple. The answer is because of the type of lease and the fact that the answer is spelled out in this lease. Item #2, Definitions "O," "Operating Expenses." "Each, every and all costs, whether direct or indirect, of the operation, maintenance, refurbishment, replacement, repair and supervision of the CV-WPB Facility and all personalty, fixtures and equipment therein, including, without limitation, insurance deductibles, ad valorem real estate taxes, and sales taxes, if any, on rents paid under the long term leases."

This only begins to explain the lease, but by now, it is obvious that the explanation is too long for printing in a single issue. As time permits, I'll attempt to further explain, however, in the meantime, I suggest that you forward questions regarding this document to me at the UCO Office and I'll try to answer them in a subsequent issue.

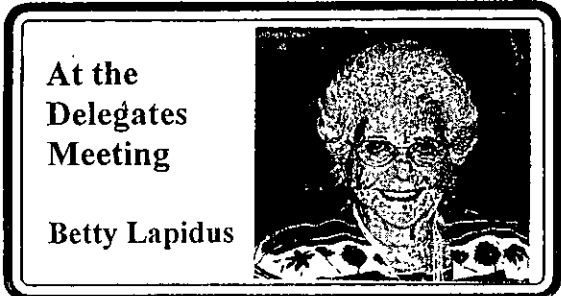

President's Report

Landscaping — we are expecting proposals for landscaping work. At least ten companies were invited to bid for this three year contract. The bids will be opened at the next Beautification Committee meeting.

Camera/Audio — equipment has been installed at the gate houses.

Computers — have been installed and are operating and the system is being perfected.

Clubhouse AC — chiller #1 is repaired and operational and chiller #2 is being repaired. The copper tubing is being tested by a metallurgist to find out what went wrong with this; it was only eight years old.

Health Expo — July 26 in the Clubhouse The South Florida Blood Bank will also be here

Okeechobee Gate Traffic — we have two more meetings scheduled with Commissioner Jeff Koons regarding the traffic situation at this entrance to CV and the banks and office buildings.

House Bill #1223 — we have a meeting scheduled with State Senator Aronberg and Representative Susan Bucher.

Operations Committee — meetings being held between UCO and WPRF

Capital Budget — re: items that cost more than \$5,000 that need to be repaired or replaced, i.e., roof on the Clubhouse. WPRF pays two-thirds and UCO pays one-third. We need a plan to budget for these items. We are working on this

Office Telephone System — we have changed parts of this system without adding any phones. We now have six rollovers to increase service

UCO Reporter — Irv Lazar reported that there will be two UCO Reporter issues during the summer: a July/August issue in July and a

September/October issue at the end of September. There will be no classified ads, no organization news until the November issue.

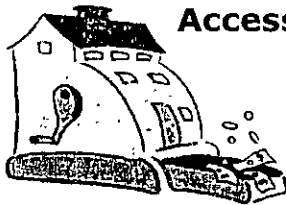

Now, with our summer months here, it's easy to do just that. This is for information gathering and for those of us who would like to get updated information regarding all aspects of senior health care including hospice, Medicare, diabetes, food security, elder law and some types of addiction. for help. **Don't look away!** The expo date is Monday, July 26, 2004, from 11:00 am to 3:00 pm in the Party Room at the Clubhouse. There will also be people from Manor Care and Hospice of Palm Beach. Karen Alexander has agreed to attend to answer any questions regarding elder law. Another thing I'd like to touch on here is the problem with erosion. OK, everyone smile! You're on camera and we have your picture and your car license tag on record. You can order 8 x 10s, but the wallet size is much cheaper.

To keep you up to date on what's going on — here's the latest

Four cameras have been installed at each gate. They serve the following purposes: One camera, on the exit lanes from the Village, will record anyone breaking the gate arm. The same reason for a camera at the transponder lane for our residents as they enter the Village. Up to now, we have always recorded the license number of all cars driving in the visitor's lane. One guard called out the letters and numbers, and the second guard entered the information into the computer. Time consuming and keeping an officer from other important duties. From now on, the camera records the information and it can be downloaded by date and time if there should be an incident.

The fourth, located right at the front door of the guardhouse, has a camera and microphone at this spot. It can then record any and all incidents of rude behavior, discussions, and any abuse, physical and verbal, that are directed at our personnel.

The purchase of these cameras has been necessary because of the increasing number of gate breakages and rude behavior by our residents and their guests.

Even though our population has dwindled for the summer, people are still speeding down our streets and not making full stops at the signs. We don't make any money when you get a citation, but the costs, paid to the city or county, are still high. In addition, points add to the amount you pay the insurance company. Please, be careful out there.

Association Bylaws

Association bylaws provide the very foundation of the basis for our condo style living. In a 24 unit building, each owner owns one twenty-fourth of the whole. Since we operate as a democracy, we must, as required in our bylaws, get a 66 and two-thirds vote to make changes.

How then can one person, or even a Board, offer "privilege" to anyone, by summarily changing the very rules by which we are all required to live? Obviously, no one may do so. What I find even more of a concern is that anyone would even ask for such special treatment.

Example. A unit owner requested that a bicycle be permitted as a "temporary storage" in the storage room. Firstly, the bylaws state, in the rules and regulations section, that areas are to be kept clear of personal belongings, except items stored in your immediate storage area. The hallway is to be kept clear of "all personal belongings." No one is authorized to offer any exception, and if they do, they show their own lack of understanding of their rules and regulations. Such requests should be greeted with the emphatic **no**, by Board members.

Most attorneys will encourage Association Officers to protect and aggressively defend their bylaws. Anytime we permit one person to violate the rules, we invite the rest of the unit owners to seek privilege or special treatment as well — and this is poor judgment! A better resolution is to seek out your quadrant area Vice-President and request their opinion. After all "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure."

Oh! Did I mention, that this may also be treated as a violation by the Fire Department, and that may mean a fine for your Association?



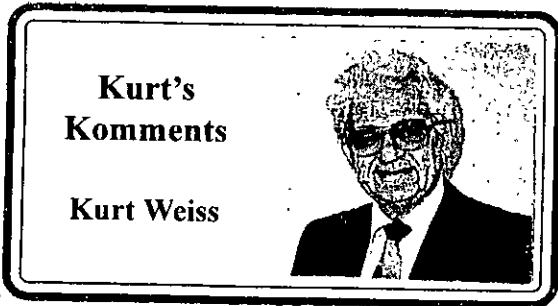
Pets

The subject has been a point of continuous discussion recently. Let's explore the facts.

Our attorney, Mr. Tennyson, has written: "Our declarations have always prohibited pets. We have seen cases where people have requested pet dogs under the Fair Housing Laws claiming the condominium must make 'reasonable accommodations' for a unit owner's 'handicap.' These cases involve two kinds of handicap. The first kind is physical handicap and is pretty straight-forward. If a person is sight-impaired or hearing-impaired and requires a specially-trained Seeing Eye dog or Hearing Assistance dog, then we must make a reasonable accommodation and allow the dog.

"The second kind of handicap is far more controversial. Some unit owners will claim a 'mental handicap' and that a dog is needed as a companion to help their mental illness, usually depression. Some courts have upheld this mental handicap need for a dog if the unit owner has documented many years of chronic depression. A psychiatrist or psychologist would have to document the need to have a dog to help the unit owner with this mental illness."

Remember, "reasonable accommodation" does not mean to just permit the dog. As a Board making this "reasonable accommodation," you retain the responsibility to set the standard rules and regulations. That means walking on a leash, on the Association's common area only, removing any discharge and proper disposal. Last but not least, nuisance to other unit owners means revocation of the permission, and this must be clearly stated in any effort to reasonably accommodate the handicap's request.

Ronald Reagan, R.I.P.

Watching the many TV programs covering the death of former President Ronald Reagan, I was struck by the ever-recurring observation voiced across the political spectrum by Republicans and Democrats alike: During his tenure in the White House, his actions created many opponents, but never enemies.

If anything, and I am speaking as a Democrat, this by itself assures Ronald Reagan a secure spot in the hearts of all of us and in this country's history.

Not that at this point in time that makes any difference. When one of my co-religionists dies, it is customary to mention only his good deeds.

There were plenty of those in Ronald Reagan's life.

In my last column, I briefly mentioned the despicable manner in which some of our residents, and their guests, behave towards our security officers.

Any halfway, clear thinking person should understand by now that these guards do exactly what they are told by UCO to do.

Standing orders put into effect by us are quite clear: There are things expected from residents and their guests as they come through our gates, and abusive behavior is not one of them. Security officers have no leeway whatsoever to change or make exceptions in what they are permitted to do based on written instructions.

I am taking up this subject again because — again — incidents were brought to our attention where security officers were insulted with racist remarks just because they refused to accede to illegal demands.

This has got to stop. It is within UCO's authority to keep out, permanently, guests who insult our personnel. As to residents: We are determined to "reeducate" those who still do not know how to behave towards personnel doing their duty. This may well include the cancellation, both by UCO and WPRF, of certain privileges.

Address Change**

**Improper Zip
Codes and
Addresses**

**From the U.S.
Postal Service**

Our mail is coming in with the wrong zip code on it, no building letter or suffixes added to the street names. It is imperative that you contact this mailer and get your zip code changed. Make sure you include you zip + four add on. This will ensure your mail will be routed to the correct address. **Mail that is improperly addressed will be returned to sender. This will be done by the carrier who receives it which means if it has the wrong zip and is sent to another station the carrier in that station that receives your mail will return it, not your letter carrier.**

To avoid possible late charges on bills and a delay in your mail, please take the time to call these creditors and correct your mailing address. Your mail should come addressed with a **numeric series, the name, and the building letter.** The reason why the building letter is important is because in several cases in the Village there are two or more buildings with the same number sequence.

Your mail should never come addressed with suffixes like street, lane, road, boulevard. Putting that on your mail pieces could cause your mail to go to a different postal facility. The reason this would happen is because in West Palm City, there are duplicate names of streets. For example, in Palm Beach Gardens 33418, there is a street called Coventry Lane. So if your mail comes addressed to Coventry Lane, it will go to Palm Beach Gardens postal facility. Another example is Canterbury. In Wellington, there are two Canterburys. If your mail comes addressed to Canterbury Lane, Canterbury Circle, it will go to Wellington 33414 or 33407 in Riviera Beach. If you do not know your zip + four add on, look at the mail that is correctly addressed to you and there will be four digits that follow your zip code.

Here are some examples: 214 Greenbriar, with no building number, could be for building A, B or C because they all have a 214. Mail carriers are to deliver mail as addressed even if the name does not match what is on the box. Please have address corrected within 30 days of receipt of this notice.

There is an old saying, "Put your money where your mouth is." I don't feel that people have a right to complain unless they make an effort to change things. This is true for government or any other factor in life.

I ran for Vice President of UCO because I disagreed with some of the things that were happening. My feeling is the same with local, state and federal government. I can't understand anyone who will let someone else determine who represents them in the state or in Congress. If you thought your vote did not count, look at close races when a few votes separated two candidates.

As a citizen of this country, not only is it my right to vote, but it is my responsibility.

From the Desk of Senator Dave Aronberg



The 2004 Legislative Session has ended, and the reviews are mixed.

One critic of the Republican-controlled Legislature, columnist Howard Troxler of the *St. Petersburg Times*, wrote that the Legislature passed 500 bills this session — and only 15 of

them were good.

While Mr. Troxler's estimate is debatable, I am pleased to report that of the 15 "good bills" identified in his analysis, three of the 15 (20%) were bills that I sponsored.

Senate Bill 284 outlaws the growing abuse of using cell phone cameras and other high-tech devices to secretly photograph and disseminate images of people who are undressing in gym locker rooms and other places where we have a reasonable expectation of privacy.

Senate Bill 2666 fixes a "wicked law" that was snuck through the 2003 Legislature that allows landlords to impose huge fees on tenants who fail to provide 60 days of advance notice that they are moving out after their lease expires.

Senate Bill 2682 protects consumers from the abuses

within the credit counseling and debt management industry. The bill limits the fees charged to debtors and ensures that these companies comply with state consumer protection laws.

For me, the greatest disappointment from the legislative session was the House of Representatives' refusal to accept the Senate's voucher accountability bill. This was a top priority for me in the Senate, and its failure in the House means that parents still don't know how their children are performing in private schools that receive public vouchers, and taxpayers still don't know where their money is going.

Our fight against consumer fraud continues! Since the beginning of 2003, my office has assisted in the return of \$748,368 to people who have

called about being ripped-off. If you have a consumer problem — no matter how large or small — call my legislative assistant, Paul Copeland, at 433-2627. Before joining my office, Paul was the head of the Attorney General's Seniors Versus Crime initiative.

Hurricane Check List

Below is a list of things you should do before, during and after a hurricane. This short list was put together from all the information the Emergency Committee could find.

Things to Do Now

1. Review your insurance policy.
2. Call the UCO Office if you must depend on electricity for your life support in any manner. Example: oxygen, refrigeration for insulin, etc.
3. If you want to install shutters, speak with your Association President. Storm panels are recommended. (Note: Century Village is not an evacuation area. Our buildings and our area are considered very safe in a hurricane.)
4. If you are leaving for the hurricane season, remove or secure all items on your patio. Take them inside. Remember, it is not the wind that destroys, but the objects the wind throws around that causes destruction.
5. Trim all your trees.
6. Select a safe room in your apartment, away from windows and doors and all flying debris. Example: Use your bathroom if it has no windows, or a hallway.
7. Check stair lights and emergency lights on building.
8. Make arrangements to secure awnings.

Things to Do One or Two Days Before the Storm

1. Remove all patio furniture.
2. Install your shutters — lower awnings.
3. Remove recyclable containers to your laundry room and secure your Dumpsters. Tie down lids.
4. Fill your car's gasoline tank.
5. Turn your refrigerator and freezer to its coldest settings and freeze water in plastic jugs. They will keep food colder longer, if electricity goes off, and when thawed out can be used for drinking.
6. Wear your Medic Alert tag.
7. Clean your bathtub and then fill with water for sanitary purposes. This is not for drinking.
8. Place all your valuables, such as treasured pictures, personal papers, insurance papers, etc., in waterproof containers or plastic garbage bags. Store them on the top shelf of the closet. Also wills, contracts, deeds and bonds, passports, Social Security cards, bank accounts, immunization cards, birth certificates, etc.
9. Secure checkbook, cash, ATM card. Do not leave valuables in a home safe during the hurricane.
10. For those on electric assisted oxygen: Get the necessary portable tanks for their needs (two-hour, six-hour or seven-day supplies) in case of prolonged power outages.
11. For those on insulin: Get a small insulated cooler and ice packs so you can keep insulin cool during outages without many trips to the refrigerator.
12. For all emergencies: Call 911.
13. For further information. Contact the offices of UCO at 683-9189. Ask for Vince Salvo, Dan Salvo, Irv Lazar, Dave Bernstein.

Kit Check List

1. Water — the most important! One gallon per person, per day.
2. Packaged foods — canned meats, fruits, vegetables, juices, milk, soup, sugar, salt, pepper, peanut butter, jelly, crackers, granola bars, cookies, hard candy, sweetened cereals, instant coffee, tea bags.
3. Manual can opener (not one operated by electricity)
4. Toiletries — toilet paper, soap, feminine supplies, denture needs, extra eyeglasses.
5. First aid kit — bandages, gauze pads, tape, scissors, tweezers, needle, antiseptic, safety pins, sunscreen, aspirin.
6. Battery operated radio.
7. Extra batteries, for flashlights, radio, etc. and charge rechargeable batteries
8. Candles.
9. Eating utensils — paper cups, plates, plastic knives and forks
10. Extra medicine — prescriptions
11. Flashlights.
12. Matches
13. Mosquito repellent.
14. Plastic trash bags — to store many of the items in this section.
15. Portable cooler.
16. Change of clothing.
17. Entertainment — games and books

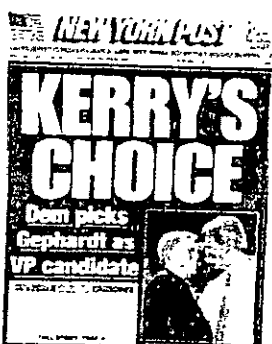
During the Hurricane

1. Stay in your safe room or hallway
2. Close and stay away from all windows.
3. If electricity goes off, use only flashlights during the storm.
4. Keep on your person at all times keys to home and car, driver's license, cash.
5. Bring into the safe room a pillow or mattress in case you need to cover yourself from flying debris. Also bring in as many items from the hurricane list as you can — especially water.
6. If no electricity, use your battery-operated radio and tune in to FM 100.7 Y-100; 107.9 WIRK; 102.3 WHLG; AM 1290 WBZT; 1450 WSTV. Don't listen to rumors. Get the truth from the radio.


After the Hurricane

1. Stay tuned to the radio for instructions.
2. Don't use the telephone, unless you have a life-threatening emergency.
3. Don't use electrical appliances until they are dry.
4. Don't drink tap water unless you are told it is OK. Boil the water for five minutes before using.
5. Do not refreeze thawed out food. If electricity is out, try store foods in freezer compartment.
6. Your Security and C.O.P. rover cars will be around to make sure all buildings are secure.
7. If you are able-bodied and would like to assist your troubled neighbors, report to the Command Post — the old UCO Office by the Camden Pool.
8. After the storm, if you have problems, call the UCO Office at 683-9189 and speak to the Emergency Committee. Ask for Messrs. Salvo, Lazar or Bernstein

Seymour Miller

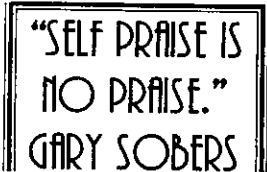
Seymour Elias Miller passed away a few weeks ago. Who was this man? How was he important to us?

New Amendments to Your 1999 UCO Model Documents

These Associations should come in to the UCO Office, together with a copy of their documents, in order to verify which new amendments should be added to your documents.

Your present documents could be four to fifteen years old and they must be updated with the new rules and regulations as promulgated by our state legislators each year.

This is an extremely important notice and each Association must fully realize that not having the new amendments to your documents could be a deterrent to the proper management of your condominium.

For instance: (1) Who can reside in your unit when the unit owner is not in residence? (2) At a foreclosure sale of a unit, can the new owner reside in the unit without your approval? (3) Under the new election law, how do you vote for your Board of Directors? (4) Do you want a regular business practice of buying up multiple units for speculative purposes here in Century Village? (5) Will your condominium permit unit owners to have dogs?

Please make your appointments with the UCO Office to see me on Wednesdays from 9:00 am to 1:00 pm as soon as possible.

Summer Shows

A quarter of a century or so ago, Frank Sinatra, Dean Martin and Sammy Davis Jr. told a young Las Vegas man that he was talented and would make the big time. They were lying. To this day, the fellow is despondent and threatens to take his own life. In Heaven, God orders the Rat Packers to Vegas to build up the man's ego and render him a success. If they fail, they will be sent to Hell. So off they go to Nevada and are shortly joined there by a sexy blond angel (who, whatever her effect on the other guy, cheered me up!). And that's basically the whole plot of *Heaven Help Us! The Swing-in' New Rat Pack Musical*, being given its World Premiere at Florida Stage (Manalapan).

Like some other World Premieres seen here, this musical seems more a Work in Progress than a finished stage work. Co-writers James Hindman and Ray Roderick run out of story and Rat Pack clichés roughly in the middle of Act Two when, finally, Frank, Dean and Sammy just rear back and do their stuff. As Frank, Marcus Neville is fine, but his role is written with much too hard an edge. Julian Rerolledo actually sings like Dean. Eddie Korlich as Sammy virtually steals the show even if he is white and looks like Don Rickles. (Don't ask.) Adam Pelty brings all the right touches to the young man. Sultry Jodi Stevens may or may not play the harp, but hooray for her kind of angel!

The song and dance are good, but there's relatively little of it considering the subjects. The talented cast is largely undercut by tired jokes and a trite book. If you're longing to see the real McCoy, rent a videotape or DVD and watch the original *Ocean's Eleven*, hardly a brilliant movie, but at least everyone's present and accounted for.

A footnote: This show is produced in cooperation with the Denver Center for the Performing Arts. Closing date here is September 5.

Coming October 23 is *Miklat* by Joshua Ford. The setting is Jerusalem. Secular Jewish parents are shocked when their son announces he's going to be married and live an Orthodox life. It's a comedy/drama with "family values" put to the test in an evolving world. (For reservations and additional information, telephone 585-3433.)

At the Caldwell Theatre (Boca Raton), Richard Greenberg's multi-award-winning play *Take Me Out* begins with

a star baseball player publicly revealing that he is gay. In so doing, he sets off a chain of events that climaxes in two of the most dramatically haunting scenes in recent theatrical memory. This play defies easy description. It's not strictly about gays or athletes, both serving as background to greater concerns. How do people relate to one another at work, at play, where they live? What triggers the kind of rage that, by extension, eventually leads a lone gunman to shoot co-workers or a group of fanatics to behead a total stranger? These are not in this play, but simmering, quiet rage is. Most people function well enough in society. But who does not? Why not? Can they tell you why they feel or act as they do? Is their behavior rational by their standards and/or by ours?

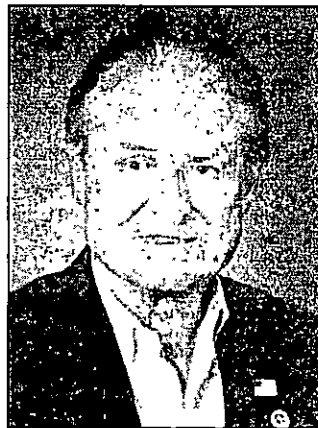

One of the warranties and condition of every policy is that the insured must act immediately in case of damage. He must stop or reduce the amount of the damage in any legal way and as quickly as possible. The insurance companies announce frequently that they will deny any claim that is caused by neglecting to act expeditiously.

Unfortunately, much of the damage in Century Village, especially water damage, is not taken care of quickly enough to stop the devastation that is the direct result of it. Damages that could add up to a few hundred dollars, ends with a total cost of thousands and sometimes tens of thousands of dollars.

UCO has delivered this message many times through the *UCO Reporter*, Delegate Meetings and private talks, that empty apartments should have "babysitters." The unit owners, with the encouragement of the Associations, must inspect and look after their uninhabited apartments. This can be done by neighbors, board members or special people who get paid. This must be done otherwise you might find yourself cleaned out of money.

There is also a magic number, fourteen (14), that is involved in it. Here is the quote from an insurance policy:

Walk, Don't Run — You Have Plenty of Time

It has recently been brought to my attention that many pedestrians experience difficulty in crossing some of our major thoroughfares. Residents of Century Village specifically cited a crosswalk signal at West Drive and Okeechobee Boulevard. Many of the residents have reported that it was impossible for them to get across the street before the white "walk" signal changed to the orange hand (don't walk) signal. I realized that this is perhaps confusing, if not frustrating to pedestrians and I wanted to better inform our public on exactly how these signals work.

Upon checking with our County Traffic Engineering Division, I was told that when a crosswalk signal turns to the flashing orange hand, you still have plenty of time to make it safely across. "The 'don't walk' signal really means don't start walking across now," said Dan Weisberg, Director of Traffic Engineering.

Here's how it works. Traffic Engineering calculates the amount of time in a crosswalk cycle by measuring the curb-to-curb distance and dividing it by four. (Normal walking pace is four feet per second.) Crosswalk cycles have varying lengths of white time and flashing orange time.

For major streets, such as eight-lane Okeechobee Boulevard, the crossing cycle is set at 39 seconds. At the West Drive crosswalk, for example, it's white for six seconds and flashing orange for 33. On a two-lane street such as Banyan Boulevard, the signal might be white for 15 seconds and flashing orange for 10.

As long as you start to cross while the signal is white, you'll have no problem making it. If, however, you approach a crosswalk that is already flashing orange, you probably should wait for the next cycle. (Be sure to press the button.) Do not attempt to cross on a solid orange. The solid orange signal indicates that the overhead traffic light is about to change, so if this change happens while you are still in the crosswalk, get to the curb quickly. When you approach a pedestrian crossing, remember to push the button, if one is provided, to activate the signal sequence.

The County has been experimenting with crosswalk signals that have built-in countdown timers. A lot of people prefer these because they tell you how much time you actually have to get across before the traffic signal changes. Traffic Engineering will be installing some of these countdown signals at a few heavy pedestrian locations, such as the new Convention Center. But because the County has been converting from incandescent to LED pedestrian signals to save energy, a second complete conversion to countdown signals would not be practical. They cost more than twice as much as our existing signals.

We will continue to monitor the operation of pedestrian crossings on our county thoroughfares and I hope you will provide your input on traffic conditions at intersections near you.

New Jog/Roebuck Road Extension One of Many Improvements

Anyone who travels Okeechobee Boulevard on a regular basis knows it's not much fun, but you'll be glad to know that the traffic relief is finally here with more on the way!

On May 18, the Jog/Roebuck Road extension was officially opened to traffic. Jog Road has been extended north from Laguna Middle School to meet the new section of Roebuck Road, which extends west from Haverhill Road over Florida's Turnpike. This 1.4 mile, \$6.7 million project was completed months ahead of schedule and is expected to significantly reduce traffic congestion on nearby Okeechobee Boulevard, Haverhill Road and Military Trail. In particular, the Okeechobee Boulevard/Haverhill Road intersection, one of the busiest and most dangerous in the county, should see immediate relief.

Additional traffic relief is anticipated when Jog Road is

extended north to 45th Street. The right-of-way will follow a berm improvement project currently underway directly north of the Roebuck Road curve. Funding for this project will be available next year with construction to begin in early 2006 and completion by the end of the year. This link provides an important north-south route west of the Turnpike.

At about the same time the Jog Road extension opens, there will be a new Turnpike half-interchange just south of Okeechobee Boulevard enabling southbound drivers to enter the Turnpike and northbound motorists to exit. The new SunPass-only interchange will help reduce backups at the Okeechobee Boulevard toll plaza.

Finally, and perhaps most important, the County will begin construction next year on the widening of Okeechobee Boulevard between Jog Road and State Road 7: Two more lanes, 25 percent more capacity (approximately 15,000 traffic trips per day), will mean shorter backups at stop lights and more efficient travel for everyone.

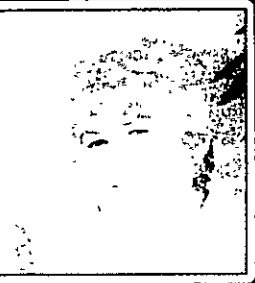

Water Reclamation Project

We need water. Have you noticed how low the lakes and canals are now even though we are in the rainy season?

In November or December, this problem should be remedied. Century Village is slated to be receiving reclaimed water. This water is recycled, but is treated, filtered, and disinfected. Phosphors and nitrogen will be removed and will be tested monthly.

This will be for irrigation only, however, it will not harm fish and wildlife. It has no odor and will not stain, but is not recommended for swimming or drinking. If someone fell overboard from a sailboat, it would not harm him.

The project will be operated by Palm Beach County. The County is obtaining the necessary permits and easements for the piping to our canals. High water will be discharged into a South Florida Water Management District canal.

Water will be maintained at eight inches below the high water mark and piped underground except near the treatment plant. All signs, pipes, etc. connected with the reclaimed water will be designated by the color purple.

Construction should take four to five weeks with completion slated before December 23.

Use of all wells in Century Village will be discontinued for irrigation purposes as the County requires all irrigation water to come from the lakes after we receive the reclaimed water. The water will flow into our lake system only when needed to replenish water used from the lake and canals for irrigation mean that in times of drought we will still be able to maintain irrigation twice a week without depleting our supply.

Costs for the project include

a \$3,292 County processing fee and four cents per thousand gallons usage fee measured by a flow valve meter. The weir will be inspected daily. We project 750,000 gallons usage per day at a cost of \$30. This is peak use and will vary with rainfall.

UCO has applied for a \$55,000 grant to help offset start-up costs. Pat Blunck and Sal Bummolo deserve our appreciation for all of the time and effort they have spent to make this project happen.

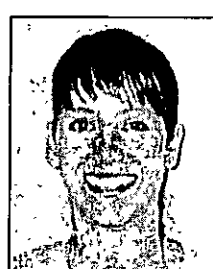

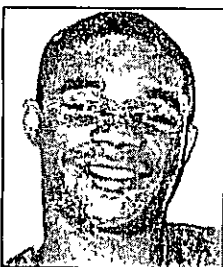

A Sar-El Adventure By Sydelle Banks

My adventure began as I was stepping over rifles and Uzis. Backpacks were on the floor and draped over chairs in the large mess hall which accommodated 500. If it weren't for the uniforms, this could've been a high school cafeteria. The soldiers were so very young, some of them had peach fuzz and had not yet begun to shave.

This was my first meal at the army base called Batzap, located in the city of Ramla — a non-combat area about 15 miles outside of Tel Aviv.

I had come as a "volunteer for Israel," also called "Sar-El" in Hebrew. In 1982, during the sudden Lebanese war, all citizens and reservists were called immediately into the army to defend the homeland. Farms and agricultural projects came to a total stop and had to be abandoned. In desperation, and a cry for help, recruiting teams were sent to America. 650 volunteers responded. All ages, Jew or non-Jew, the program continues and the need is greater than ever.

Within my group of 35 volunteers, who came from America, Australia, England, Holland, South Africa, New Zealand, Canada, Germany, Belgium and France were men and women aged 26-84.

The liaison between the base commander and the volunteers called the "Madri-cha" was a 19-year-old female soldier named Yuli. She took us to the supply area where we were given uniforms, belts, hats and even boots. We had to be in uniform at work, which was from 8:00 to 5:00. She assigned our quarters, duties, arranged lectures, guided and nurtured us throughout our tour of duty. The usual length of time volunteers serve is three weeks, but can be as short as two weeks or longer.

My dormitory housed five cots and five cabinets. Sparse, clean and adequate for our needs. My room-mates were: an American woman from Virginia, whose husband was in the men's dorm; like myself, she was on her first tour of duty. Age — mid-forties. Also, a 39-year-old American girl from Boca Raton, Florida, who had been there three months and was staying on for four more months. Then there was a 59-year-old fun lady from England who had a wonderful outlook on life and a terrific sense of humor. She was on her second tour of

duty. Lastly, there was a French girl, 35, on her fourth tour of duty and was making "Aliyah." She was studying Hebrew every spare minute. Although she spoke very well, she was determined to read.

We shared our barracks with the soldiers, but of course, they had their own separate sleeping quarters. They shared their lounge with us, which we used three times for lectures and once for a birthday party. It contained a TV set. We also shared the showers and toilet facilities, which were a short walk away in portable units. There were a washing machine and dryer, which were used one day a week by the volunteer who was assigned to do all laundry for the sar-els' linens, etc. We all washed our own clothes by hand.

Everyday was different and exciting! What a marvelous adventure I had embarked upon...

About one-quarter of a mile down the road was the mess hall. Breakfast at 7:00 am never varied. Yogurt, scrambled eggs, sliced cheese, white bread and, of course, the cold, sweetened tea, which was the only beverage served at all meals.

Before reporting to work each day, we all gathered in a large courtyard where we stood at attention alongside the soldiers in quiet respect, as the Israeli flag was raised.

I found this ceremony to be very humbling and I was filled with great pride. There were times when I was moved to tears as thoughts of bombs and death came as uninvited intruders into my mind. It was frightening to dwell on such

thoughts.

I successfully concentrated on shrugging off the feeling of sorrow and sadness when I looked around at these beautiful 18-19 year old youngsters and saw them laughing, talking and smoking cigarettes.

The very soil I stood on filled me with a feeling of belonging that I had never before felt. It surged through my body and I felt great joy in being a part of this wonderful opportunity to help this land of "milk and honey."

I had chosen to do anything, any kind of work, to help the Israeli defense forces in their quest to live in peace and to defend themselves against terrorism by doing whatever work that was needed. I was so grateful for the opportunity of helping. It was good and it was right!

The ability we have of adapting to new surroundings

with such ease is astonishing. I had an idea what to expect and had no difficulty at all


We made new friends and learned so much about each other. All with such diverse backgrounds: we had two accountants, a bank president, a pastor, a male and a female nurse, an archeologist, two school teachers, a lawyer, a realtor (myself), a psychologist (who walked with a cane because of the condition caused by his multiple sclerosis) countless other professions and some retirees. The camaraderie we experienced was a definite plus and the memories will be forever cherished.

We worked side by side with the soldiers who had trained us for simple, but time consuming tasks. Our working conditions were very satisfactory.

Our cable contract with Adelphia expires in January 2008, and while Adelphia is in Chapter 11 bankruptcy, they have been performing according to the contract terms in effect. UCO has also been performing according to the contract terms. There have been all kinds of rumors relative to Adelphia going out of business, raising prices by 30 percent or being sold. At this time, none of the rumors have taken effect.

In order to offer cable in Palm Beach County, the provider must have a "Franchise Agreement with the County" and Adelphia does have one and they are the only one that can offer this cable service in our area of Palm Beach County. Again, Adelphia is not in violation of the agreement with the County. Adelphia owns all the cable wire throughout the Village as well as the cable wire in each building and condo unit in Century Village and they have the right to leave it in place. **No one else can use these wires.**

Could the bankruptcy court order Adelphia to abandon the wire and give it to us or another entity? Not likely, since the infrastructure they have in place is worth mucho bucks and would appeal to any firm interested in taking over the more than 500,000 Adelphia customers in Palm Beach County. Can we go to a satellite system? Not until January 2008, as long as Adelphia continues to perform under our contract. Should we go to a satellite system in the future? That is something that will have to be decided in the future.

If we went to a satellite system, can we be sure that we will always have service? Another item to be looked into. Right now there are a few major satellite systems around and they too are in the process of buying out each other. There is also the problem of the cost of rewiring the Village for satellite since we

could not use any of the Adelphia wires.

If we want to protect ourselves for the future, we would probably have to pay for the infrastructure ourselves, a very hefty amount. Aside from the money, do we want to go through the process of digging up the Village again to install new wires? Would our residents want another set of wires under the carpeting and in closets and over doors? That is something that we would have to find out.

Actually, there are a lot of things that we would have to find out. Some residents want access to Canadian, European, or South American programming, as well as our present line up. For now, we will look to the future, while at the same time staying in the present. We have a very attractive rate for our cable service and it is working the way it is supposed to.

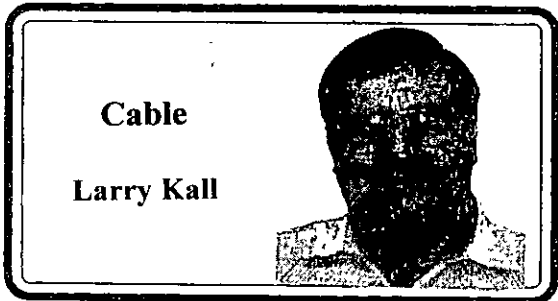

Helpful Hints

Leaks, Leaks and More Leaks

Is there some way I can be sure that my hot water tank will not leak and flood my condo? This is a question that we get asked a lot and the answer is a resounding **no**. From a statistic standpoint the newer the tank the less chance it will leak. However, there have been occasions that tanks under one year old have leaked and there are tanks in the Village thirty years old that are not leaking. Unfortunately,

you cannot look at a tank and always get the answer. Some tanks will have minor rust spots on the outside, usually from other sources like an air conditioner, but that does not mean that the tank is going to leak soon.

Some tanks look brand new on the outside but are completely rusted on the inside. Unfortunately, Lady Luck has a hand in this matter. You may be the unlucky one while your neighbor will go thirty years before the tank has to be replaced. Many of the tanks in the Village were replaced in 1994 and most are still in use. Can they let go at any time? **Maybe**. Will they

last another ten years before they have to be replaced? **Maybe**. There is no decisive answer.

Is there anything you can do to be sure your tank will not leak and damage your condo? **Maybe**. As a general rule, the newer the tank, the less likely it will fail. To those of you that have hot water tank replacement, generally the tank will not be replaced because you feel that it might leak in the future, it **has to fail**. There are people who voluntarily replace their tanks about every ten years. Can they be assured that these new tanks will not leak for the next ten years? **No**, but the newer the tank the less likely it will fail. Some people have gone to a tankless system. Can they

leak? **Yes**, from the fittings that bring the water in and out of the system

Most people feel that a leaking hot water tank is the biggest problem, but actually, it is not. Broken water lines to toilets and faucets are number one. Recently, a water supply line to a toilet on the second floor broke while the residents were away and flooded four units. The damage to these four units will probably be about \$100,000. Incidentally not all the units

had condo owners insurance coverage.

The next question in your mind is, can I tell if a water supply line will fail? The answer again is **maybe**. Can you replace every water supply line in your unit and then be sure there will be no water leaks in your condo? **No**. The toilet can crack and leak water, the faucet may leak, the shower pan might leak, the drain lines in the wall might leak, the air conditioner might leak, and the list goes on.



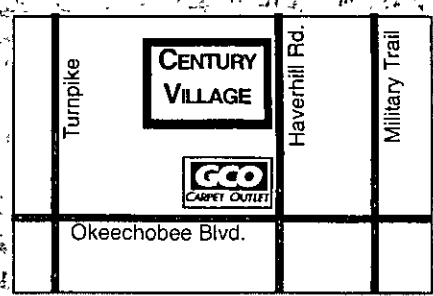

One area of our work consisted of disassembling tank helmets. After removing the inner linings and earphones, we did the sanding, plastering and then the painting of the helmets. This was done in preparation for installation of new liners and earphones. We were all quite surprised to learn how much is involved with helmets.

Then there were the earphones. Now that was a challenge for anyone/everyone. Removing the foam rubber protective coverings in order to expose and replace the old worn wires proved to be very exacting and very time consuming delicate work, but we did it! Boy, were we happy!

Since this was an "electronic/communications" base, another job we had was battery testing. Used batteries from other bases were turned into our base. Some equipment still had a good charge and some were weak or dead. So we tested, discarded, coded, shrink-wrapped and packaged these batteries of all shapes and sizes preparing them for shipping to other bases for recycling whenever possible. We were told that by refurbishing and recycling the good equipment, millions of dollars a year are saved.

At mealtime, we enjoyed talking to the soldiers who were full of questions about our respective countries. Everyone was so friendly and very grateful to us. Laughter came so easily when the soldiers found that their sentences were worded correctly. They were so pleased. The atmosphere was gay and light and my heart was singing with happiness.

Lunch always consisted of chicken made differently, with cold sweetened tea...our dinner menu every evening was identical to breakfast. The only change was the addition of cottage cheese. Naturally everything was kosher and I still don't understand how in the world I gained 12 pounds. Someone said I did it one bite at a time. We all felt so carefree and happy.

The evenings were spent in spirited conversation getting to know each other. The soldiers really enjoyed practicing their language skills. They thanked us continually for coming and were determined to please us.

Three female volunteers

met each other last year and became such good friends that they coordinated their schedules to be together again this year. They had a variety of trips planned to see different sites around the state on their weekends off. None of us were ever frightened.

These interesting aspects found me in awe of the entire program and I will go again. My grandson will be 17 in June and wants to go with me. It will be the finest and most memorable gift I could ever give him.

We had three evenings with national speakers. One lecture of interest to me was given by a woman who made *aliyah* 37 years ago from England. She spoke in graphic detail of the settlements being surrendered as part of the peace process. While listening, I realized that what is referred to as "settle-

ment villages" are really what we in the states call "sub-divisions." As an experienced realtor, I know that any raw land improved upon with roads being built water and electricity brought in is ultimately used for housing. There are stores, schools, gas stations, etc. The Arabs/Palestinians/Crusaders had the land for hundreds of years and did nothing with it.

Israel has housed Russian, Ethiopian and African immigrants in these settlements. The fear of pogroms and hunger will never haunt them again.

We all had a fun time when *sar-el* took us by bus to Jaffa. What a treat it was to have dinner at one of the many outdoor cafes overlooking the Mediterranean Sea at sunset. It was truly exhilarating just being there.

"Pete's Place" was where eight of us had dinner. We had pizza, falafel and hamburgers, which we all shared. We chose Pete's upon hearing what had happened there. Our *madricha* told us that two months prior, a security guard had stopped a patron from entering the café. The customer would not remove or even open his bulky overcoat, so an argument developed. The waitress and the owner come over to find out what the problem was. That was when the human bomb exploded, killing the four of them. There were other patrons inside who were injured by the bomb, but fortunately, did not die from their wounds.

By going there, it was our way of lending support. None of us at any time were frightened and this small action confirmed that we were not

afraid.

A few days earlier, while working in the wiring lab talking, laughing and discussing different things, one of the soldiers who spoke beautifully said "sacrifices are a way of life here. In the face of relentless persecution, we have survived and we always will."

To him, those were the words spoken in general conversation, but I cannot forget them, or the emotion it aroused. I wonder, do tears form in a throat? His family made *aliyah* from America when he was 13. Upon completing his tour of duty he will study for the bar exam. He wants to be a lawyer.

"Sacrifices are a way of life here." Words worth repeating, aren't they?

The work week ends on Thursday night and we return

at 10:00 am on Sunday morning. So there was plenty of personal time available to us.

My first weekend I took a tour with eight other volunteers. We toured northern Israel in a mini bus that holds 10 people — called a "sharoot"

Our first stop was at Mount Carmel, which means garden of G-d, where Elijah the prophet is buried.

Then a visit to the Golan Heights, where we were, in plain view, have the armed Syrian outposts, with barbed wire all around. That was just a drive-by.

Then we visited Mount Gilboa, which is the last battleground of King Saul, commonly referred to by many as "Armageddon."

Next, we visited the "Sachne Oasis" and had a refreshing swim there. Our guide said that it was one of the 10 most beautiful sites in the world. We had a marvelous meal at the *moshav* there on the premises and we did some souvenir shopping to help the economy. The weather was pleasant and the June temperatures of 90-95 degrees was hot but tolerable. It never rained.

Then we went to a sixth century synagogue, which had a mosaic floor in perfect condition with the 12 astrological signs of the zodiac. It had been unearthed and excavated in 1962 by *kibbutz* when they were planting.

Everything we did was so fascinating and interesting. Everyone was happy and gay and sharing laughter and funny stories. How wonderful it was.

Then to a very lovely hotel called "The Star of the Galilee" which of course overlooks the sea of Galilee. The view from our terrace on the 11th floor was gorgeous. Our Shabbat dinner was an extravagant buffet, which we enjoyed so much. Everything was festive and gay and there was music and laughter and people were all dressed up to welcome the Sabbath. How surprising to see women with total head coverings. Very unlike America.

It may have been the Shabbat wine that we all had, because we talked and talked, until well after midnight.

The city lights of Tiberius across the sea cast shimmering reflections on the water. And it was so pretty. Even the sky was ablaze with stars.

We were on the penthouse balcony overlooking the sea. And everything was so peaceful.

It was truly a most memorable experience for each one of us. We spoke of many things. Some were surprisingly personal things. We were one family.

We looked forward to breakfast with great anticipation and we were not disappointed. This buffet breakfast was totally different than the food we had become accustomed to. We ate to our hearts content and then ate some more. Can you just imagine the squeals of delight when we were served something other than cold sweetened tea? We were having hot coffee or tea! Oh, joy!

One of the fellows said, "Who said Jewish people are spoiled? Look at how little it takes to please us — just some hot coffee or tea!" I couldn't help but think about the three people with us who were not Jewish.

We checked out of the hotel and boarded our *sharoot*, which took us to the Jezrael Valley where we saw some newly planted trees that were being done by the JNF. I was on such a high at seeing this lovely country at work. Frequent stops became necessary because of the hearty breakfast and the abundance of hot beverages that had been consumed by us.

We were in such high spirits that thoughts of terrorism were not a consideration at all and we had such a good time together. Fun! After driving through the valley and the mountainous roads our next stop was the Bahai Gardens.

It absolutely took our breath away. We were awestricken by the beauty of the structure.

The flora that was indigenous to the area, which was in full bloom, had been done so beautifully that the eye could not envelope it in a few minutes. It was in such harmony with the structure, that we just sat there drinking in the sight. Their tribute to their belief in G-d was magnificent.

We were then dropped off in Jerusalem where we did our own personal last night of liberty before returning to base the following morning. My niece and her two sons, six and four, were waiting for me at the hotel where we were dropped off. A wonderful way to end my first week of adventure.

During the second week, one evening we went out with the *madricha* and had dinner at a restaurant in Jaffa where we celebrated a birthday for one of the volunteers.

Work varied a little, because we had to take turns doing latrine cleanup duty, sign painting, gardening, sidewalk sweeping and then washing the sidewalks.

No matter what we were working on, we had a lot of fun and such interesting conversations. It was so refreshing to have a daily routine that required little decision making. What a wonderfully simple life, living on base, eating all meals at a fixed time and not being concerned about what to wear to work.

I am unable to adequately describe here the contentment we each experienced. The astonishing fact is that each one of us, at one time or another,

during our tour made similar mention of the joy we found in helping these wonderful human beings who were constantly thanking us for coming. Indeed, it should have been us thanking them, for giving us such glorious feelings of peace and inner tranquility never before felt.

One morning *sar-el* treated us to a tour of the "Armoured Corps Monument and Tank Museum" at Latrun, located outside of Jerusalem. Our hearts were heavy with sadness hard to explain when we got to "The Wall of Names," similar to the wall of names of the Viet Nam Memorial. The sight of the wall had a very somber effect upon us. It was terribly long with over 4,900 names. These were the names of the fallen soldiers of the armored corps division. Brave, beautiful soldiers gone and still no peace.

Then we went into the building, which held the photos of the soldiers, which town, village or kibbutz they came from, their ages and names.

The guide told us the story about a group of tourists that were going through the roster of faces, places and names, when one of the older tourists started to weep uncontrollably...he sank down in a corner and cried. It turned out that the name and photo of his 19-year-old son was there. He had no relatives and never thought the name of the family or of his son would ever be known to anyone.

This, then, turned out to be a living memorial. It is chilling me, just remembering. There was a very large sculpture of an Israeli tank crew. The helmets on the sculpture looked identical to the ones we were refurbishing on base.

For the remainder of the weekend, we were free to go touring on our own, just be sure to be back on base Sunday morning at 10:00 am.

I welcomed Shabbat in Jerusalem and had the pleasure of being with my niece Riza, her husband Zel and their two sons.

I must share this very personal event with you. They welcome Shabbat with the tradition in their home of having each boy recite the *baruchas* and kindle a candle after the mama has lit hers.

The glow of the candles fill the house with the warmth of love and fill the hearts of all who are lucky enough to bear witness to this beautiful ritual. May G-d grant them safety, peace and health. The next night was very festive because the six-year-old just happened to be having a graduation party from kindergarten. We celebrated at the school and in the courtyard, which is called the "*gan*" It happened to be located inside the hotel in Jerusalem where, coincidentally, the volunteers stay when they are on liberty

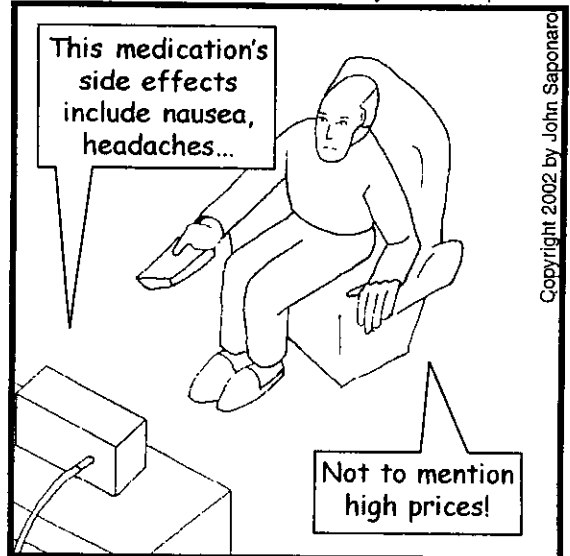

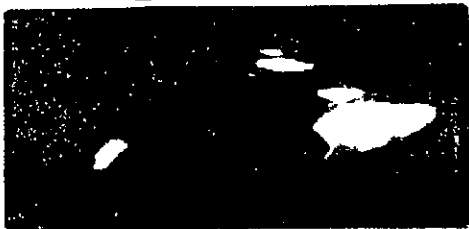

Mike Rios, candidate for Tax Collector, gave a personal background and listed his experience.

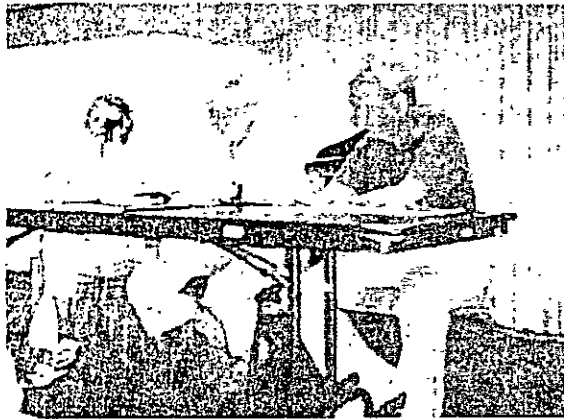
Steve Soule, candidate for Sheriff of Palm Beach County, listed his background and experience and asked for our support.
