Town Hall Meeting: Nov. 17, 2006

A UCO Town Hall Meeting was held Friday, November 17, 2006 at 9:30 a.m. in the Party Room of the Clubhouse.

President George Loewenstein, who greeted the capacity assemblage, called the meeting to order.

The first order of business was a report by Dan Gladstone, Chairman of the Insurance Committee. Dan happily reported good news. He said the insurance of our buildings has been reduced to 1.7% instead of 3%, provided that the roofs are okay according to code and have passed inspection.

Pres. Loewenstein gave a background report on the latest information concerning the construction of the Clubhouse theater. The architectural company hoped it would be completed in March and will have an assessed value of two million dollars. It is expected that there will be approximately 200 more seats than the old theater. George said, "We are working hard to save money for all of you."

With regards to the ongoing negotiations with Mark Levy, George said we have reached a "stalemate" on the payment of bills. We have hired a law firm to handle litigation against Levy. The President said, "I have been meeting with Levy frequently, but he has used divisive methods of additional insurance companies to protect his in-

terest and therefore avoid paying us.

Vice President Phyllis Richland reported that she is offering a suggestion to CV residents to utilize voting machines for our next UCO elections in 2008. Several residents spoke against such a method. Phyllis replied that this was only a suggestion for improving our election process, not a definite motion on the floor.

CV residents had an opportunity at this time to voice their opinions and/or complaints concerning various CV operations. One woman, a resident of Greenbrier, complained that an old recreational vehicle was parked in a Greenbrier guest space and was an ugly sight. She said that this was not a UCO responsibility, but rather, the business of the building involved. She suggested that all CV buildings should refuse to allow such parking arrangements as part of their building rules.

Another resident asked Mr. Loewenstein, was it possible for us to buy out the Clubhouse from Levy? George said Levy was **Not Interested!** Many residents took this opportunity to explain their feelings on the treatment that we have received from Levy.

The meeting ended with best wishes to all from Pres. Loewenstein for a Happy Thanksgiving. □

The Process Has Started

With the hiring of Denise Bleau, Esq., of the law firm of Buckingham, Doolittle and Burroughs, LLP, we have started the legal process against WPRF and the Benenson Company to get the money that we feel is due us. Our legal counsel feels that we have a very strong case and our side should prevail. Based on the overwhelming show of hands at the last Delegates Meeting, we know that the residents are enthusiastically behind our effort. By the time you read this, we should have picked the arbitrators and be in the process of preparing our case. At stake are the 70% payments by the residents to WPRF from September of 2006 to May of 2006 until the theater will be finished in the spring of 2007.

Additionally, we are also seeking a refund of the premiums that we paid for business interruption insurance since the year 2000 to 2006, which amount is approximately \$500,000. There are also improvements in the Clubhouse which we paid for and which the engineering firm that we hired has determined were code mandates, and thus should have been paid for by the owners or their agent. Overall, our claim should exceed six million dollars, which, if we are successful, will be returned to the unit owners. I will keep everyone updated at the process advances.

We are currently meeting with the Palm Beach County permitting department to get their blessing on the site plan for UCO's office building. We're asking them to approve a 4,000 square foot building. Speaking of UCO's office, those of you who will be coming to our current location at the Camden pool will notice that we painted the interior and rearranged the furniture to make your visit more enjoyable. The outside of the building was painted by WPRF.

Based upon experience of the past nine months, there does not seem to be a need to keep our office open any evenings. So we have decided that effective immediately, we will no longer have evening hours.

On behalf of myself, my family, and the Officers of UCO, I would like to welcome back all our winter residents and to wish all our readers a happy holiday season and a healthy and prosperous 2007. □

At the Delegates Meeting

December 1, 2006

President George Loewenstein called this meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. (audio-video).

Quorum: There was a quorum of 173 seated Delegates.

Pledge of Allegiance: Led by our guest speaker, Palm Beach County Sheriff Ric L. Bradshaw.

Sheriff Bradshaw announced that the Sheriff's Office is better prepared than ever before. He reported on Homeland Security within the Agency. He is on their Executive Board.

Security: Lt. Kronsperger reported that during the month of November, there were no crimes committed in Century Village. He reminded us to be especially alert during this holiday season.

Minutes: of the November Delegate Assembly had been distributed and read. A motion to accept the minutes as read by Jerry Karpf, seconded by Phil Shapkin. Passed.

Treasurer's Report: See attached copy. George announced that if anyone has any questions, please come to the UCO office to talk to Treasurer Dorothy Tetro. George asked for volunteers to work in the Finance Department. It may be necessary to hire help.

President's Report — 2102 West Drive: The architect is working on the layouts of the interior; we will get a 4,000 square foot building. It may be ready in the spring of 2008. In the meantime, we are trying to make our Camden office more acceptable to all of us — volunteers, workers and visitors.

Our topic at the Operations Committee meeting — 70% of our monthly dues are to be put aside — about \$6 million. One of the expenses that we pay for is the Business Interruption Insurance. We will be going into arbitration. All details are on file in the UCO office.

We discussed the upcoming motion as noted on our agenda. We had asked WPRF for \$250,000 and they had refused. George asked for a straw vote — at this point, everybody can vote — do we all approve of going ahead with this? There

was unanimous agreement. We can borrow up to \$250,000 from the RBW reserve account; see agenda.

Our attorney, Ms. Denise Bleau, addressed us. She gave us a synopsis of her background and outlined what she was going to do. There were Q&A. She said that we will go forward aggressively and quickly. It is our money and we are entitled to it.

Motion: by Phyllis Richland, seconded by George Franklin, that UCO advance up to \$250,000 to pay legal fees and CH2MHILL Engineering Firm. The money is to be borrowed from Roads, Bridges and Walkways (RBW) Reserve Fund. The repayment is to come from residents' reserve fund when available.

More discussion, vote was taken, there were two votes in opposition, and the motion was carried.

Committee Reports — Beautification: Sandy Cohen reported that work is going on at the Dover sites.

Nominations Committee: Mary Benton reported that two Vice President spots are up for elections. Sal Bummolo and Phyllis Richland will be running for these offices. In addition, we will nominate candidates for the UCO Executive Board. If you want to be considered for nomination for Vice President or the Executive Board; please submit your name, photograph and a short bio by December 11, 2006. For further details, please read her column in the UCO Reporter.

Signs: Haskell Morin displayed the Building Association signs that can be purchased. See him in the UCO office.

Transponders: Larry Kall reported that transponders are available.

Insurance: Dan Gladstone is creating a list of Building Associations that have installed a new roof within the last five years. Please call him at 712-1923 if you have any questions.

CERT: Marcia Ziccardy reported that she needs 20 volunteers to start a class.

It was the beginning of "a war of attrition" on the insurance rates that were imposed on us on July 1, 2006, "a date that will live in infamy." On this date, Citizens Insurance Company suddenly and deliberately attacked us with a 448% hike in insurance premiums.

Getting over the initial shock, UCO has started to fight back. There was no reasonable explanation for such a move, nor was there anyone who could come to us with a satisfactory resolution. We approached everyone under the sun, insurance professionals all the way to the Deputy of Florida Financial Services Chief (aka Insurance Commissioner), also other Associations, and last but not least, the politicians.

We knew that this step was directed by the politicians. After all, Citizens was an insurance company that was controlled by the State of Florida. Susan Bucher, our Member of the House of Representatives, joined us in this fight and her help was significant, especially on the political side.

With this joint effort, Citizens "reconsidered" the premiums and decided to return 45% of its original quote. It was a big step for us, and a huge step for mankind. We were still not happy and kept on with the fight. Finally, UCO has harvested the fruits of the conflict; the hike in the

premiums was reduced to "only" 70%. Furthermore, the Wellington area that was "exiled" for a few months would be coming back home on January 1, 2007, with even better rates.

To be fair and balanced, we have to thank Citizens for taking over the bankrupt Southern Family Insurance Company. By doing so, they saved us a half a year of premiums estimated over \$1,250,000. Citizens has also guaranteed our open claims which amounted in the millions and counting.

I recently spoke with Rep. Susan Bucher, who returned from the special session of the House, on the insurance matters in Florida. She said that the insurance lobby dominated the session with no improvement to us, the citizens. According to her, it was a "session of the ducks", all they did was "ga ga ga ga" (all talk and no action).

Our main problem is a lack of insurance companies that do business in Florida, especially in the South. We miss the competition that drives prices down. With Citizens being the only company, they dictate the premiums on the basis of "hear and obey." Florida must cultivate the ground to make it more attractive and appealing for insurance companies to come and do business here. □

This column is the most difficult one I have ever written over the many years as Chair of the Security Committee. That's because it's about a good friend of mine, and an unhappy ending.

My friend and bowling partner lived in our Village and was a most responsible person. If anything came up and he was going to miss a day from our team competition, he always made arrangements for our substitute player to be there. Well, one Tuesday, he didn't show up. The following day, I went to his apartment. It was locked, but his car was parked outside.

I called Security, and the Rover and I checked the apartment, front and back. We could not break in; that's not legal without a Sheriff's Deputy, and we had no evidence of a problem.

I then called the Building President. She had no key because my friend refused to give it to her. She had the son's phone number, and I spent that whole week calling him. The phone always rang and rang, but no answer and no answering machine.

The following Tuesday, he didn't show up to bowl once more. Now I was really concerned. The Building President now found a second phone number: a nephew who lived in the area. He said he would

be there the following morning.

The following morning, we met at my friend's apartment: the Rover, the Security Major, the Building President and myself. The nephew arrived and when the door was opened, we knew immediately that my friend was dead. He had been lying on the floor for at least nine days.

My good neighbors, over and over in my articles, I beg you — please, leave an extra key, to your apartment with the Building President. Another choice is to leave the key with another party and tell the President who has that key. Emergencies arise in a

senior community all the time. Perhaps my friend was alive the first time the apartment was checked. But we'll never know, will we?

Leave a key. Leave a phone number of someone to call in case of an emergency. Maybe next time we'll have a happier ending.

May I remind you once more that the predators are out there, waiting for a vulnerable senior? Protect yourself when shopping, whether at a mall or a neighboring strip mall on Okeechobee or Community, especially, all you ladies out there.

The holidays are here. Please, please, check the wiring on your Christmas decorations and electric Chanukkah menorahs. Keep lit candles in a safe place, with something underneath to catch the wax, and nothing overhead that the flame can reach.

With that, Zoli and I wish you all a Happy Chanukkah and Merry Christmas. □

Driving around West Palm Beach in the evening, you begin to see the decorations that signal that the holiday season is now upon us. I know that I am not alone in wondering, where did this year go? Helpful Hints

How to Stop a Leaky Toilet and What is Calcium

A couple of years ago, I wrote an article about "How to stop a leaky toilet" and several people told me that they used the suggestions and found them helpful. I went back through my old records to see if I could find it so I could repeat it, only to discover it was located in a computer that was hit by lightning and the hard drive was melted. So, here goes.

Under the toilet tank, usually on the left hand side, there will be a shutoff valve. Just turn the valve clockwise to the right until the water shuts off and get the toilet serviced to find the cause of the leak or to keep it from running. Sounds easy, right? What usually happens is that the valve will not turn as it is "frozen" or rusted in place. Sometimes spraying something like WD40 will free up the valve so it will turn. Sometimes not.

Next step — **carefully** remove the lid from the toilet tank and place the lid **carefully** on something solid like a sink counter. If the lid breaks, there is little chance that you can find a lid to fit the tank, and at the very least, you will have to buy a new tank with a lid. Look inside the tank to see if there is a large metal or plastic ball near the top. If so, pull the ball upward until the water shuts off. If this stops the water, you can prop up the ball with a ruler or stick to keep the water off. If you do not see a big ball, look on the left side of the tank and there will be a

valve called a "ballcock."

Connected to the top of the ballcock will be a round plastic ring that you can pull upward and the water will shut off. Again, you will have to prop up this plastic ring with a ruler or stick to keep it in the upward position. Get the toilet serviced to fix the problem.

If the problem is, water leaking around the base of the toilet, do not use the toilet until the seal is replaced. If you are on the top floor, please remember that when you see water around the toilet seal on the floor, it means that some of the water is going to go through the floor to the unit below you. To replace the seal, the toilet will have to be removed, new seal installed and the toilet reset, not a job for most of us.

Probably because of the age of some of our units and the water conditions in the Village, we have seen an increase in toilets that do not flush properly. One of the causes of this is a buildup of calcium from the water inside the toilet bowl. This is not something that you can see as it is inside the trap system of the toilet. When the calcium builds up to a solid mass, it restricts the flow of the water. Unfortunately, calcium cannot always be removed by snaking, and the only cure is to replace the toilet itself. Should it be necessary to replace the toilet, it is suggested that you consider replacing the present toilet with a **Handicap** toilet, which is about two inches higher than a standard toilet. It is also suggested that if you have a one piece toilet, when it is replaced, you do so with a standard or handicap two piece toilet. □

AARP/IRS Free Tax Program

This year, AARP, in conjunction with the Internal Revenue Service, will be filing federal tax returns for our residents at the Okeechobee library between the Wachovia bank and the library on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. All residents are required to bring with them their Social Security card, all papers received from employers, banks, brokerage houses, companies paying dividends and government agency (SSA or RR pension) forms.

Copy of last year's return is a must. There are two changes in the law that pertain to our residents. One: Sales tax in Florida is a deductible tax. Two: All taxpayers are entitled to a refundable payment of \$30 for the first person in a household and

\$10 for each additional person up to a maximum of \$60 per family unit. Forms to be filed will be available commencing February 1, 2007. This rebate is for all persons that paid a long distance hookup charge on their telephone bills for the past three years. No proof is required.

We are in urgent need of persons that are computer literate to work with us one day a week for four hours. 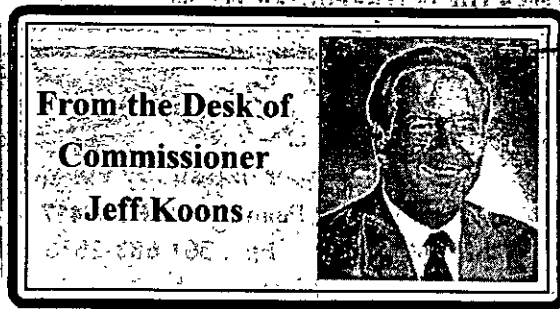
The Kookie Cookie

From the Desk of Commissioner

Jeff Koons Good Government Needs Good Partnerships

County government does not function in a vacuum. In order to provide high-quality services at the lowest possible cost to taxpayers, we need the assistance and cooperation of other governing entities, be they state or federal agencies, local municipalities or special taxing districts.

One of the Board of County Commissioners' top goals is the restoration of our ecosystem and I am especially grateful for the excellent working relationship Palm Beach County has established with the South Florida Water Management District to help us meet this goal. Thanks to District Chairman Kevin McCarty and their Board of Governors, this state regulatory agency has made an enormous commitment to improving water quality, storm water storage capacity, environmental restoration and water reclamation in this county. This year's list of projects is staggering — 64 separately-funded projects associated with the Everglades, Lake Okeechobee, coastal watersheds and regional water supply, totaling more than a quarter-billion dollars.

The SFWMD Board of Governors has been one of our most vocal allies in getting funding for the Lake Region Water Treatment Plant. To date, the District has promised \$4 million from its own budget and continues to lobby state lawmakers on our behalf for more.

Earlier this year, we began a joint project with SFWMD to clear out accumulated sediment from the C-51 Canal. So far, some 1,700 truckloads (more than 46,000 cubic yards) of dredged material have been hauled away from the staging site near the West Palm Municipal Golf Course. Not only will this increase capacity in the canal and greatly improve water quality discharging into the Lake Worth Lagoon, we are using the sludge as top soil fill at the Winding Water Natural Area and for various FDOT road construction projects—a true win-win-win arrangement.

In October, we announced the County's Water Utilities Department had begun construction on a three-million-gallon-per-day reclaimed water facility at Century Village. The SFWMD awarded us a \$1 million grant, 20 percent of the estimated \$5 million construction cost. Reclaimed water is recycled water that has been treated, filtered and disinfected. While not suitable for drinking, it works very well for landscaping and farm irrigation. It's cheaper to produce and helps conserve our drinking water supply.

These are just a few examples of how Palm Beach County and the South Florida Water Management District are working together to restore and safeguard the environment and protect one of our most precious resources. Views Vary on Q&A Forum

Are there any Croatians in the Village? That was one of the questions asked recently on the Q&A Forum on the Village Web site. This question was asked by a Canadian snowbird who said he wanted to meet other Croatians.

If you have any questions or answers, you can get to the forum by accessing the Web site www.centuryvillagewpb.org and clicking on the forum. The exchanges of questions and answers cover a variety of issues. One question is about the posting of "for sale" signs on condo windows and doors. Is that allowed? The questioner asks. Another wants a correction in the minutes of the last Delegate Assembly meeting.

A request to remove the Q&A rules to save printing paper is rejected by the site operator. The woodshop is open; one questioner is assured. The winner who solved a cryptogram is identified. Higher costs for insurance and maintenance are discussed. A plea that computers be set up in the Clubhouse for resident use draws the information that the local library has ten for use by the public.

A warning that United Parcel Service imposters were roaming the Village drew replies that these stories were an old hoax.

A major part of the Q&A dealt with the issue of closing hurricane shutters when an apartment was unoccupied. Unclear in all the exchanges was whether or not the County Fire Department had a rule outlawing closed shutters in an unoccupied apartment. Residents were urged to seek a change in the rule, if there was one, through political representatives, or to ignore the rule and be ready to be fined if it came to that.

One resident gave her view: "After spending \$3,000 and having the newest and most modern and safest hurricane shutters installed, I have no intention of leaving my shutters open or unlocked when I go North. If something does happen, I am sure the Fire

Department can get into anything; they use the Jaws of Life to get in a car, so hurricane shutters should not be a problem. I am glad I am not the only one who feels this way."

The hurricane shutter issue was settled authoritatively when Phyllis Richland, reported the Fire Department's position: "There is no reason to keep your shutters unlocked when you are away; all the Fire Department asks is that you do not shutter your front door."

A Response

Kurt's Opinions

Randy Borchardt's work in updating UCO's bylaws is commendable and the proposed amendments were easily confirmed.

There is one amendment, however, I would like to revisit. UCO's President, to date, could name Members to the Executive Board who are domiciled and in residence in CV "no less than six months" rather than the nine months usually required.

The deletion of UCO's President's authority to name residents to the Board if they only reside in the Village six months disqualifies about 50% of our seasonal residents from ever attaining status as decision makers in UCO's affairs.

We shall presumably see some action to change the current system of electing Officers and Board Members by getting all unit owners involved in direct elections. That includes "snowbirds," taking from them the possibility of ever having a voice and a vote in day-to-day decision-making — and not just once a year, is ill advised.

There is one amendment to our bylaws worth reminding Delegates and others:

In its meeting on July 2, 2004, the Delegate Assembly passed an amendment, among 15, and tabled three.

Among those overwhelmingly confirmed was an amendment/addition to Article XI — Miscellaneous, which made the Sunshine Law an integral part of UCO's basic legal structure.

This additional bylaw was similar to the Sunshine Laws in effect federally and in Florida state laws, but since these do not apply to organizations such as UCO, it was necessary to pass a special amendment making certain

parts of that law apply to us.

In short: It meant that henceforth, all meetings of bodies of UCO, such as committees, subcommittees and any "get together," to discuss UCO business, must be open to any UCO Member.

Certain exceptions were included in this amendment, and they are:

- Any meeting with UCO's legal counsel.
- Meetings of the Nominating and Ombudsman Committees.
- Any meeting of the Investigating Committee in which personal information of applicants, both buyers and renters, is discussed.
- Any meeting in which information pertaining to paid employees is discussed.

This amendment applies to all other committees, including the Executive Board, the Officers Committee and the Operations Committee. It means that any UCO Member may attend any meeting of any committee (except the four mentioned above) without having to get permission for his attendance by the chair of the applicable committee or anyone else.

It is to be expected that a new printout of UCO's bylaws in its entirety will be published. This new issue should cover all bylaws — including changes and additions passed by the Delegate Assembly in the past and therefore still in effect, among them the sunshine clauses.

Please note: The above column is not a replacement of the one which was supposed to appear in the previous issue of the *UCO Reporter*, which was a factual response to the personal attacks against me by three new Officers of the administration. □

Transportation Committee Report

Back in October, we started a survey to find out how many residents would be interested in a once-a-month excursion to Lake Worth. On Monday, November 13, 37 people enjoyed a lovely day at the Beach, and looked forward to our next scheduled trip, on Monday, December 11.

Meanwhile, survey responses, started coming in from our seasonal residents, and many indicated they would prefer a Wednesday trip so they could also spend some time at Shopper's Depot. Shopper's Depot is not open on Mondays. This was discussed at our Transportation Committee meeting on November 30, and it was agreed to try to accommodate all these residents — on a trial basis.

The result is: Second Monday — Lake Worth Beach only. Fourth: Wednesday — Beach and then Shopper's Depot.

This would still provide three weeks a month for the regular Wal-Mart/Wellington Green Monday trip and then three weeks a month for the regular CityPlace/Gardens Mall Wednesday trip.

Changes: Effective Monday, December 18, the Express bus will go into Walgreens; then down to the 99¢ store before continuing its route. The Shuttle bus will no longer stop at Walgreens.

There will be no Excursion bus on December 25 or January 1; but the Dinner buses

will run on December 24 and December 31.

We have scheduled a Wednesday Excursion bus on December 27 to Lake Worth Beach and Shopper's Depot, and again on Wednesday, January 24, first come, first served. Arriving at 9:30 will not assure a seat. The Monday, January 8 Excursion will be to Lake Worth Beach with optional trolley ride downtown for 50¢ each way.

Please check our bulleting board for changes in schedules and do not listen to rumors. If you don't see it on the bulletin board or Channel 63, it's not true.

These seat belts cost us \$60 each. There are two on each bus, times eight buses, equals \$960. What could possibly be accomplished by cutting these belts? 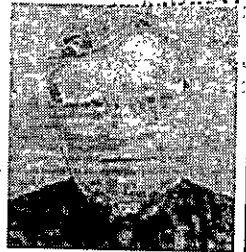

Transponders

By the time this article is printed, all of the December 2006 appointment times will have been assigned. Since January is usually a busy month with seasonal residents returning with their new cars, we plan to have two dates in January 2007 available: one near the beginning of the month and one near the end of the month.

To schedule an appointment to have a transponder installed on your vehicle, bring your valid car registration, current driver's license and Century Village ID to the UCO office, fill out the necessary form, pay the proper fee and you will be given an appointment date and time when you will go to the Okeechobee Gate to have the transponder installed on your vehicle by one of our volunteers. You will know where we are as there will be a Sher-

iff helping to direct traffic and all the volunteers will be wearing orange safety vests.

Please remember that if you change cars, remove your old transponder and bring it with you when you come to schedule an appointment. By doing so, you will be paying \$16 for a replacement transponder rather than \$26.75 for a new one.

The transponder strips are designed so the antenna inside the strip breaks when removed. In most cases, the antenna breaks immediately and renders the transponder useless.

Once in a while, we hear about a transponder taken off one car and put on another, and it works. Unfortunately, they will not work very long. Since the antenna has been at least weakened when removed, it will only be a matter of time until it stops working.

For those of you who have "good until" or temporary IDs and have not replaced your vehicle, please remember that the transponders are programmed to stop working on the expired date on your temporary ID.

When you get your new ID, it is necessary that you come to the UCO office so we can make a copy of your new ID and reactivate your transponder. At that time, you will also be asked if you have any changes in any of the emergency contacts that you have listed, as well as any changes to your local phone number or your vehicle license plate number.

Part of the computer system that keeps track of transponders is also used for the gate call-in system. The system is designed to recognize local landline phone numbers only. It is not capable of accepting cell phones or out-of-town numbers no matter where they come from. When you call the gate, the system ID matches your phone number with your apartment number. If the numbers and apartments do not match, your call will not be accepted.

Remember, if you do not have a local landline in your condo, you will have to go to the gate and give the guard information about your guest or they will not be allowed in.

The cost of a local landline is about \$13 per month, plus taxes. □

Not Me by Michael Lavigne is the story of a father, an award-winning Zionist, rapidly declining from Alzheimer's disease, who gives his son a carton full of his journals to read. As the son, Michael, sits reading in his father's condominium in West Palm Beach in a setting much like Century Village, Lavigne, a first-time novelist, takes him on a journey to a concentration camp and then to Palestine in 1945 as that country fights to become Israel. He also takes Michael on a trip of discovery,

horror and anguish as he learns the story of his father's life that has been suppressed for over 50 years.

The author exhibits much skill in this novel of nearly perfect pace as he transforms the father Michael thought he knew into the stranger he finds in the old yellowed pages. He finds a man who reinvented himself and though he may not always like his father, he loves him dearly. As he goes on this arduous trek, from past to present in his search for the

truth, he is also forced to re-examine his own life and his relationship with his young son. This is really two stories in one—Heshel's (the father) life and Michael's (the son) self-discovery.

This is an unforgettable book that leaves an impact across the generations and looks at Holocaust survival from a new perspective. It is suspenseful and painfully honest. It is a moral journey and definitely one worth taking. □

"You Gotta Start Off Each Day with a Smile." Good advice given the world by the late Jimmy Durante.

The U.S. Postal Service has followed this suggestion by issuing a variety of stamps featuring cartoon characters such as Disney's Mickey Mouse and Donald Duck as well as the laughable Looney Toons tribe, which have pleased young and old alike over the years.

The Postal Service is continuing its *Art of Disney* series in 2007. Sad to relate, the Looney Toons funny people ended its stamp run in 2001.

The first in the series was released in 1997 highlighting Bugs Bunny in his favorite pose leaning against a mailbox while eating a carrot. In 1998, we saw Sylvester and Tweety hanging onto a mailbox. The 1999 stamp showed Daffy Duck collecting mail. In 2000, it was Road Runner and Wile E. Coyote. Last in the series was the loveable Porky Pig.

Let's take a look at the 2000 stamp paying tribute to Wile E. Coyote and Road Runner. The pair first appeared together in *Fast and Furryous*, a short animated film that showed Coyote using 11 different methods trying to catch the elusive Road Runner. All of his attempts failed, but he would try again and again. They went on to star in 40 animated shorts.

In every cartoon, Coyote believes he can catch the fleet Road Runner. In all of the sto-

ries, there was no dialogue — just Road Runner's cheerful call "Beep Beep."

The 33¢ stamp, as we have noted, shows the pair at the mailbox with Wile holding a letter addressed to him.

The last of the Looney Toons series portrayed Porky Pig as a diligent mail carrier. Porky was the first bona-fide star of the Looney Toons cast. He made his debut in *Haven't Got a Hat*, an animated short in which he performed in a musical and stammered his way through a poetry recital.

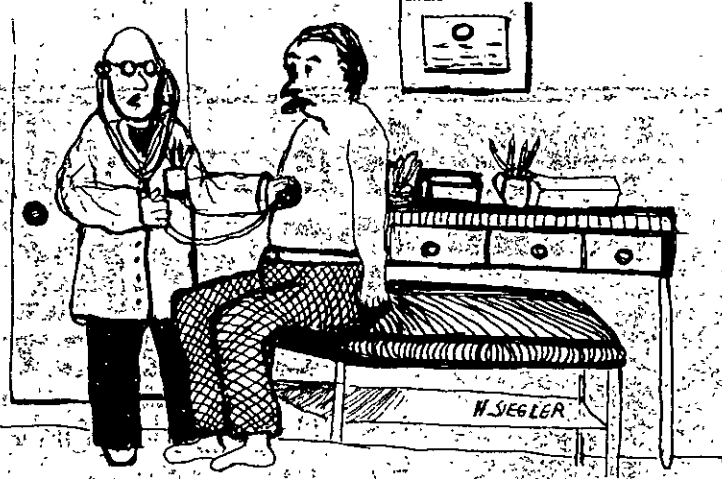
But Porky didn't always work alone. Sometimes he teamed with Daffy Duck. Never one to hog all the attention, he is joined on the final Looney Toons souvenir sheet by other characters who appeared in the stamp series — Bugs Bunny, Sylvester and Tweety, Daffy Duck, and of course Wile E. Coyote and Road Runner.

The 34¢ stamp illustrates Porky holding up a letter addressed to him. The stamp has a quotation famously said by Porky, "That's All, Folks!" — the farewell trademark concluded the popular *Looney Toons* series.

We can never get enough of our favorite cartoon characters on our postage stamps. We look forward to more next year with the *Art of Disney* set.

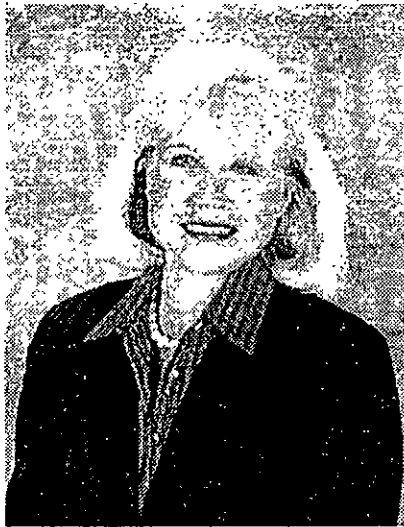

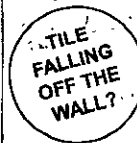

**Committee Meeting,
11/13/06**

This was one of the largest meetings we have had to date; unfortunately, our guest speaker was unable to attend due to illness. I told all present that I would give a presentation of a past guest speaker's products.

At our October meeting, we had a representative of a paint company. I explained the wide range of paints that his company had to offer, some of which were waterproof, other paints that would fill in small cracks, and paints that had a seven-year warranty. I explained that the most important part of any paint job is the preparation of the surface that has to be painted. A manual named *Preparation Before Painting* was made available to all present.

The next product I talked about was storm shutters. I discussed the different type of shutters that were available: accordion, removable steel, roll down and Lexan clear plastic panels.

I then discussed some of the advantages and disadvantages of the different types of shutters. Roll down shutters should not be used because of the weight that is placed on the walls of the buildings and the problem of maintaining the shutters. Accordion shutters have proven to be a good choice and are being used in Century Village. Lexan, clear plastic shutters, are another good choice for several good reasons. Lexan is see-through and can be left up all year, it is also less expensive, and meets all Miami-Dade code, with the exception of doors at this time.

A question was asked if Associations had to allow unit owners to have shutters. All present were informed that under Chapter 718, Florida Statutes 718.113(5), they must allow a unit owner to have storm shutters. The Board of Directors can mandate the type and color of shutters. Everyone was offered a copy of the law after the meeting.

Mr. Sean Middleton, a representative of a metal roof company, could not attend our meeting due to illness. I described what I knew about the metal roofs that Mr. Middleton's company made. This is one product that every Association should look into.

Metal roofs from this company carry a 50-year guarantee, and they also claim to guarantee their roofs to withstand 110 MPH winds, will not change color over the years, and are cost effective over the years, as compared to roof shingles. For more information, Mr. Middleton will be at our January meeting with samples and literature.

Our next meeting will be in Room 103 on January 2, 2007, at 11:00 a.m. □
