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## A Peek Backstage

Have you ever wondered what "back stage" looks like? Well, first of all, you don't get on stage, or back stage, without having prepared a release form (in case of accident). So you either have to be a performer in our Resident Show, or the Director, J.M. and his crew. Luckily, the November 2007 show was open to all residents, regardless of physical condition. And I must tell you that many of us had achy, breaky legs and backs after hours of standing in place while blocking was in process.

Note the photo of eight men, seemingly cheerful. This location is a dressing room with two very large, comfy, overstuffed armchairs, a mirror and a shelf for makeup. To take this photo, I had to go back into the bathroom, because all eleven men assigned to this dressing room didn't fit. Where did they go to change clothes? There is a hallway that runs behind the back curtain, so performers can move from one side to the stage to the other, without being in full view of the au-

dience. This hallway is about three feet wide, and is used for storage of chairs and other narrow items. For our benefit, a few narrow tables were set up.

I was given one entire chair all for myself, along with half of one of these tables — surely, more room than any of the men had in their dressing room. OK, so it wasn't private, but I didn't have to share with anyone, except the dancers, who were constantly running back and forth. There were a few men at the end of the hall, who couldn't fit into the men's dressing room. Most of the women found accommodations similar to the men's.

Also backstage are two very important people. One is Greg, the stage manager who works with J.M. Among other duties, Greg is there to hand us portable mikes (spelled "mic" in the business) and to announce "three minutes" or "places" or "onstage now" as well as "silence, please." The other is Babe, who has been doing this — I believe — at least fourteen years. She also runs back and forth in that same hallway

# At the Delegate Meeting

## December 7, 2007

This meeting was called to order by Pres. George Loewenstein at 9:30 a.m.

**Quorum** — of 201 seated Delegates.

**Pledge of Allegiance:** Led by Phil Shapkin; was recited by all.

**Minutes** — had been distributed by all; corrections were made, motion to accept the corrected minutes by George Franklin, seconded by Phil Shapkin — passed.

**Treasurer's Report:** Dorothy Tetro made her report — no questions.

**Security:** Lt. Kronsperger reported that this had been a quiet month here in CV and reminded us that this is the time to be extra alert and careful.

**President's Report:** Pres. George Loewenstein apologized re the misinformation at last month's meeting regarding the quorum and two motions. We will revisit these two items: 1) under 718, Condo Associations must not charge more than \$100 per investigation per couple, and 2) to authorize UCO to pay the deductible for the D&O insurance.

Our insurance company has agreed to defend Pres. Loewenstein, but we do have a \$5,000 deductible. The attorneys that are handling our part of the arbitration are the most logical to handle this case. Now this case is in the lap of Judge Hurley and a motion had been made that this case be dismissed. George explained his position as President of the United Civic Organization.

Because we are in the process of arbitration, our attorneys have advised us not to broadcast our meetings. We have been exchanging documents — there

are more than 75 file cases of documents. Also, many witnesses will be involved.

**Re Ambulance Services:** For many years, we have had AMR for our ambulance transport services; Medics is another non-emergency transport company, and they are taking this territory back. We had a meeting with Jeff Koons, and we will need to prove to the County that Medics is not able to do what we expect of them, and if they cannot perform, the Commissioners will step in. We may have to use Medics and not AMR. Please read his column in the upcoming *UCO Reporter* for more details.

**Re Reclaimed Water:** It is now a reality. We cut the ribbon at the plant in Sussex. Kudos to our V.P. Sal Bummolo. This project had been started by the late Len Tompkins in 2002.

**Re Dance Floor in the Party Room:** This is a pure wood dance floor and should be OK.

Pres. Loewenstein then extended Holiday Greetings to all, and announced that this is the last Delegate Assembly in 2007.

**Committee Reports** — from two new chairpersons. **Nominating Committee** Chair Roberta Fromkin announced that they are receiving Letters of Intent to run in March 2008: Bios, with a picture of the candidate, must be in by the first week in January 2008. Q&A.

**Transportation Committee** Chair Claudette LaBonte reminded us not to cross the double yellow lines and to be watchful. When the bus stops, please be courteous and do not pass the bus. Q&A.

**Security:** George Franklin and Al McLaughlin reported

that "call-in" time has been increased — it will work for 24 hours and until 8:00 a.m. the following day.

**CERT (Community Emergency Response Team):** Marcia Ziccardy announced the next CERT class will meet January 8, 2008, you can reach her at 640-4258.

**Insurance:** Dan Gladstone discussed insurance deductibles. For figures and details, please read his column in this *UCO Reporter*.

He reported that we are working with four big agencies. Your budget should not be any different than what it was last year. Q&A.

At this point, V.P. Myron Solomon reported that WPRF received \$11 million for insurance money for the Clubhouse.

**Maintenance:** Jerry Karpf reported that the next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, December 11 in Room C. Q&A.

**Re patios:** In the event of a hurricane or natural disaster, the Association is responsible for the damage; look to your bylaws — "who has to maintain the limited common elements?" Q&A.

**Transponders:** Larry Kall reported that we have a slight problem with the arm at the Haverhill gate.

**Cable:** Larry Kall reported that in February 2009, local stations will convert to analog. If you are planning to buy a new TV, be sure to get one with digital cable.

**Re hi-speed Internet:** Call the number in his column in the *UCO Reporter*.

**Ombudsman:** Phil Shapkin reported that when complaints are based on violations of law, remember, we are not lawyers.

**Golf Course:** We have had a second meeting with the owner of the golf course; they are trying to get us to look at a rosy picture; the answer is still "no."

**Town Meeting:** George announced that on January 11, 2008 at 10:00 a.m., there will be a Town Meeting here at CV, with Susan Bucher, who will talk about the proposed amendment in Florida, and will explain the ramifications. This will be published in the *UCO Reporter* and will be on Channel 63. It is important that we have a large attendance.

**Old Business:** A motion was made by Randall Borchardt, seconded by Len Lipofsky, that in the case of the personal lawsuit by WPRF against Pres. George Loewenstein, we will cover the deductible and any legal fees and any other expenses

in excess of what the insurance company will pay. The money shall come from the arbitration fund.

In depth discussion ensued. Vote was taken, there were 6 opposed, 2 abstentions; the motion was passed.

**Lifts:** Phyllis Richland reported that the applications were closed on November 30. There were 16 applications for 11 slots. We will have a lottery to pick the 11 applications.

**Good & Welfare:** There are new, updated UCO Bylaws; pick up a set on your way out.

No further business — motion to adjourn was passed.

Meeting was adjourned at 11:00 a.m. □

**Reverse Mortgages —  
Yay or Nay?**

So many questions regarding Reverse Mortgages have come across my desk that I feel it was important to try to explain what's what.

First of all, a Reverse Mortgage is not illegal. It's just that because we have a recreation lease, FHA reverse mortgages cannot be offered to us here in Century Village.

The good news is there is one lender who will do reverse mortgages in Century Village, and that's Financial Freedom. They have a proprietary product called "The Cash Account."

The ads in the *UCO Reporter* and the CV Real Estate ads are placed by mortgage brokers who have correspondence with Financial Freedom and are therefore prepared to offer that particular product to CV. These brokers include Wells Fargo and others. Those of you who are interested may work through these brokers or directly with Financial Freedom reverse mortgage consultant. They will all offer the same products with the same benefits.

A lady who is a consultant for Financial Freedom is Georgia Olsen. Her direct line is 772-286-7299, but you folks who are interested can call anyone you like.

- The restrictions are:
- The property must appraise at a minimum of \$75,000 and the Association must have statutory reserves that are separate from the general operating fund, and designated specifically as "reserves."
  - The Association may not provide for roof replacement, etc. with special assessments. There must be sufficient reserve funds to replace the roof, painting and paving on a regular replacement schedule, with regular contributions to the reserve fund from the monthly maintenance assessments.
- These are just a few of the important facts that I've been able to get. If you need more in-depth information, please call Wells Fargo or Financial Freedom. UCO does not endorse or recommend any mortgage company or lending institution. All this column is doing is giving information. □

For the past six months, I've been meeting and greeting many of you in my office and around the Clubhouse. It has been and continues to be my goal to improve the appearance, comfort and convenience of the recreational facilities here in Century Village, and your comments and suggestions have helped me gain insight into areas for improvement.

Since my arrival, we have been working on several projects, including:

- Repairs to and improvement of the A/C system, with balancing and testing still ongoing
- Interior and exterior painting, including
- Interior hallways, Billiards Room and Party Room
- Exterior south wall of Theater
- Island bridge and parking lot striping
- Replacement of the Party Room dance floor with wood parquet flooring
- Resurfacing of the indoor pool deck
- Installation of athletic flooring in the Hastings equipment room

All of the existing rules and regulations for the Clubhouse are being reviewed and evaluated, changing those where necessary to meet the needs of our residents. For example, many of you have thanked me for eliminating the "50-mile rule" that has been in effect until recently. Your local friends and relatives are now eligible to obtain guest passes along with your out of town guests. Residents are happy that they can now invite local guests to our events. Please note these special per-event fees:

- Guest tickets for the shows may be purchased by paying a \$1 entertainment fee in addition to the ticket price.
  - Guest tickets for the movies and Saturday night dances may also be obtained by paying just a \$1 entertainment fee.
- (\* Please see the Clubhouse Happenings for advance ticket sales dates)

Responding to a recent survey we conducted, every Tuesday matinee movie is now being shown with English subtitles (dialogue only).

Unfortunately, many of the rules and regulations are necessary to keep in place and doing so does not please all of our residents. A good example of this is the pool closures at dusk. Each pool (except the indoor pool which closes daily at 10:00 p.m.) closes at dusk. In the past, some residents were allowed to swim in certain pools past dark; however, I have asked our security staff to enforce the dusk closures so we are not in violation of State Health Department regulations which prohibit night swimming at our facilities.

Saturday night dances remain very popular. We also provide specialty dances — our Halloween dance, New Year's Eve dance and Sweetheart Ball. We received rave reviews for our Halloween dance, and we are already completely sold out for our New Year's Eve dance. Now that the Party Room floor is completed, please be sure to attend a dance or two and try out the new floor!

Thank you for the warm welcome I have received in this community, and also thanks to the UCO officers and Operations Committee who have been cooperative and helpful to me in my new position. I look forward to working with both the residents and UCO to continue improvements in the coming year. □

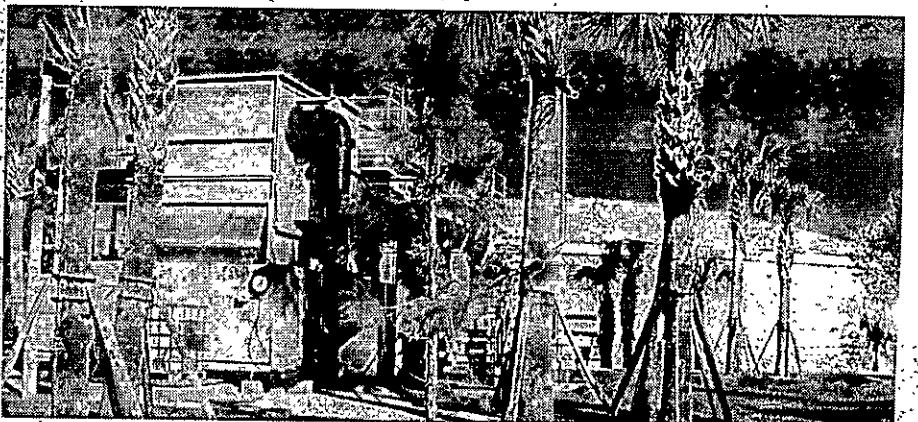
It was a beautiful December morning in Florida. The sun was bright, the sky was cloudless and the air was cool.

## Transponders

While I have been involved with transponders since its birth (before that, bar codes, and before bar codes, decals); until I became Chair of the Committee, I did not know how closely Transponders are linked with Security.

The computer system that makes the transponders work is part of Security as are the Gatehouses. The biggest problem right now for Transponders is that we do not have the old UCO building to work out of and installing and evaluating transponders are a two or three step process.

Process one is coming to the UCO office at the Camden Pool to get the paperwork. After the paperwork is filled out, it is copied for our files. From there, a volunteer or staff member will go over the paperwork with you, collect the proper fee and then give you an appointment some time in the near future to come to the Okeechobee gate to have the transponder installed on your car.

In order to be sure the transponder works properly, we need to shut down the transponder lane to all traffic for about two hours. To do that, we need six to eight volunteers and a Deputy Sheriff at the gate. We need three to four volunteers to direct traffic and four to five other volunteers to handle putting on and testing the transponders.

At this time, there appears to be no way to change this system. We need a working gate arm.

It appears that for the near future, we will continue to

install transponders one day per month. The day depends on how many volunteers are able to help.

In this regard, we get many requests for a "Special Day for Me." Some people can only come on a Monday. Others can only come on a Tuesday; still others are only available on a Wednesday, a Thursday, Friday, Saturday or a Sunday. Some people can only come before 9:00 a.m. and others only after 6:00 p.m. Some people feel that they have a medical condition that entitles them to special, immediate service. Unfortunately, there is no way to give everybody everything they request, so we do the best we can to service the greatest number of cars on a single day.

Transponders have proven to be much more effective than bar codes, but we still encounter cases when the transponder does not work. The two main reasons are that the person has a temporary ID that was registered in our system to expire on a certain date. On that date, the transponder stops working. Unless the person with the temporary ID comes to the UCO office and has the newer temporary ID copied and our records updated, the transponder will continue not to work.

The second reason transponders do not work is that cars are not stopping at the white line and the transponder reader does not have time to read the ship in the transponder.

Our system is not the same as SunPass. Our cars must stop. There is a difference between the response time for the

gate arm to open at the Okeechobee gate and the Haverhill gate. Why? We do not know. We only know that they are different. Could it be that one gate faces east/west and the other north/south? Maybe. Could it be the pitch of the reader? Maybe. Do cars approach each gate differently? Maybe. The spot (distance from the arm) where the arm opens at one gate is not always the same spot at the other gate.

We have also learned that people who go north to colder climates sometimes go back and find the transponder no longer works. Why? We do not know; we only know that it happens. We also know that transponders, for whatever reason, do not last forever.

The only solution is to purchase a new transponder, as they are only guaranteed for 30 days from the time they are installed on a vehicle. Some people are not happy with this warranty, but that's the way it works.

**Are you required to use a transponder? No. You can always use your ID in the left lane.**

People do not realize that the actual transponder itself that goes on your car is only one part of the entire system, and when you get the transponder, the cost reflects not only the transponder strip, but all the other items and cost associated the entire system, like the transponder readers, the computer readers, data entry and updates, the DSL lines between the office and the gatehouses, etc.



Please, when you have your annual meeting and election of new officers, make sure you will elect Board Members who will be here all year. Apartments are sold, rented, deeds are transferred, and occupants placed in apartments with co-occupants. We must have Officers and/or Board Members who will take responsibility to sign documents of approval.

If you can't find people who will be responsible for running your Association business, then you have to get your Management Companies to do this. Of course, this will cost the Association money.

Everyone living in our Village needs to be investigated and they should be 55 years old or older.

If you have questions about procedures with investigations, please come into the UCO office and we will be happy to explain to you. We can give you more time in person than on the phone.

The charge for investigations is \$100 per married couple or \$100 for each individual not married on contract, deed, lease or request for occupancy. We need proof of age and proof of income along with contracts for sale or lease, recorded deed additions or transfers and request for occupancy. If a mortgage is involved, we need the mortgage approval from the bank before you can close on the sale.

What has all this got to do with the Village? This is similar to the system used to connect the drain pans for the central air conditioners to the drains that take the condensed water out of your building and the drain systems for the hot water heaters should they spring a leak, or the relief valve on the tank opens up to release steam.

In some cases, these two drain systems are interconnected, and in some cases, they are two separate drain systems. It depends where you live in the Village and who built your building.

Window units drain right out on the catwalks, some into portable pans that need to be emptied, and some right on the catwalks or sidewalks as units do not have pans or do not empty them when overflowing. Incidentally, I do not think that you could build a condo with today's building codes that allow window units to drain onto catwalks, due to the risk of falling caused by the water on the catwalks.

Let's start with the central air systems. Part of the air handler (inside your unit) has a drain pan that allows water condensed from the cooling coils to drop into this pan. The pan holds a certain amount of water and then it flows from the pan to a drainpipe leading from your unit to the inside of the wall.

The drains in the wall are connected to the pipes that are usually located within the first floor slab and then drain out through a drain opening located where the slab ends, usually under a patio.

The same drain type system is used for the hot water heaters, and in many cases, the hot water drainpipes in the wall also are used for the air conditioners.

One of the main problems for central air conditioners is clogged drains that are caused by a buildup of algae or by bugs travelling into the drainpipe outlets with algae being the number one cause. As the drain pipes are over thirty years old, they do not work as good as they used to. If you live on the first floor and the drainpipe is clogged in the wall or slab below your air handler, as the water has no other place to go as you are at the lowest point in the building.

It is increasingly more difficult to clear drain lines since it is no longer legal to use Freon, which did the best job. Today, the primary products used are nitrogen, air, or a vacuum hose. One of the biggest problems are people going away and nobody checks their units.

Let's take such a situation on a first floor unit. The drain is clogged in the wall or slab so all the water from the units above the first floor flow into the first floor air handler, and since it cannot flow outside, it overflows the drain pan onto the carpets and floors. We have seen units with mold all over the place and soaked carpets as a result. We seldom

see this in a unit that is occupied as the unit owner sees evidence of water very early.

If you live in a two-story condo, the first and second floor air conditioners are connected to a single pipe in the wall. If you live in a three-story building, three units use the same pipe, and if you live in a four-story unit, all four units are connected to each other, starting with the top unit and working down.

What can you do? Not much about the size or condition of the drain pipes. The best thing that you can do is to be sure that the drain outlets in the slab of the building are not covered with grass or dirt. The next thing is to be sure someone checks your unit if you are going to be away for any period of time.

If your air conditioner starts to drip, you can shut it off until the drain can be checked (some people simply put a pan on the floor to hold the water and at least this way you can have some air until the situation is corrected).

We also find that there are many times when people see the unit dripping early in the week, but wait until 5:00 p.m. on Friday to ask for service, as they have other things to do, like go to the pool. Leaking drains are not usually considered an emergency situation, so if you wait to call someone until 5:00 p.m. on Friday, you most likely will have to wait before it can be corrected.

Algae, which is the primary culprit for clogged drains, is a common problem in Southern climates and something that we learn to live with, unless you plan to live in Alaska. They do not get very many long periods of hot weather, so algae does not get much time to grow.

One other thing that you could do is arrange for a "preventative maintenance" of your central air system, especially if you plan to be away for several months.

**So remember, the drain pan is connected to the wall drainpipe, the wall drainpipe is connected to the hot water drainpipe, the drainpipes are connected to the slab pipe and the slab pipe is connected to the drain opening. □**

We have made changes in the time that the call-in messages remain in the computer. Now calls will clear after 8:00 a.m. the day following your call-in. This will allow you to call in an early morning Taxi to get you to the airport at 6:00 a.m. or have your call available all night long in case your guests arrive after midnight.

Security has received two proposals for new camera equipment which we use to record, and bill the automobiles that break our gates. The presently installed cameras work, but are not as clear as the newer ones.

The report from U.S. Security says that the number of vehicles coming through gates was 15,207, with 353 refused (denial) during the month of November. The number of vehicles that were denied entry was less, last month, by 50 vehicles. The reason the vehicles were denied entry is because they were not given permission to enter or not called in properly by a resident. A caller must wait until they hear the beep, then speak clearly with the name of their visitor or the company that is visiting their unit. Please ask your neighbors to make sure they call in everyone.

It is very important that in order to keep a secure access gate the guard must have permission from the resident to allow anyone to enter Century Village. Please ask your guests to treat our guards courteously.

Our security company is doing a very good job, as reported by the Sheriff's Officers. We have been safe and secure, so please, continue to cooperate with the guards and follow their instructions.

PBSO did report that several cars have been ticketed for making an illegal "Right Turn on Red" at the Haverhill Road Gate. Please obey the signs!

We have also observed and tried to remove two alligators from the lake in November. We did not succeed, so be careful walking near the water. (Also, one alligator on the golf course).

### Save the Date

The annual UCO Installation of Officers and Dinner Dance is scheduled for Sunday, March 16, 2008, at the Marriott Hotel in West Palm Beach.



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Our main goal at the present time is to find alternative insurance for the Clubhouse.

The spread of the insurance value is as follows (in round numbers):

Clubhouse building, \$13,050,000; contents, \$750,000; business interruption, \$9,797,900; total, \$23,597,900.

Hastings Health Club Building, \$2,340,000; contents, \$300,000; total, \$2,640,000.

Pools: Southampton, \$360,000; Dorchester, \$330,000; Kent, \$470,000; Camden, \$640,000; Somerset, \$470,000 and the Maintenance Building, \$135,000.

The new innovation this year is the introduction of a new Hurricane deductible of 8.5% and imposing it on the whole value of all the properties together, i.e., \$28,642,900, total value times 8.5% deductible equals \$2,434,647, amount of deductible.

In 2003-4, there was no deductible on the business interruption part. We do not recognize this cover as our expense to start with.

A quick observation shows that if any of the properties, except the Clubhouse, is partially or totally destroyed by a Hurricane, it falls under the deductible and we will have to pay the full damage.

Another scenario could be partial Hurricane damage to the Clubhouse, for example: \$2,000,000 on July and another \$2,000,000 Hurricane damage in October. We will have the burden of financing \$2,434,647

out of our pockets (only one deductible per season).

Just to compare W.P.R.F. policies with our Associations' policies. We insisted that our deductibles would be "per building" only, otherwise our deductible would be at 8.5% \$46,665,000, or at 2% (our present deductible) \$10,980,000.

The process of getting bids is somewhat lengthy. We first have to give the up-to-date value, usually accompanied by a survey report. Secondly we have to show the "loss run" which are the numbers and the amounts of the claims that were paid and those that are still open. After all the information is in, the underwriters have to come up with quotes of premiums and the type of future coverage (what perils are covered, what percentage of deductible on each peril, etc.).

As of October 2007, all the Associations who signed a release for the budget, will get a new Directors and Officers policy for \$1,000,000 with \$1,000 deductible only. Although no one can predict the future and taking into consideration the costs, we estimated, relying on past experience, that the coverage amount is adequate and the deductible is low.

There has been a lot of interest in the High Speed Internet Service Special being offered to our residents by Comcast. It is \$19.95 for the first six months and then it goes to \$24.95 per month. You can either purchase your own modem from one of the electronic stores or rent the modem from Comcast for a monthly fee.

To order the service, call Rob Siebeck of Comcast at 227-2410 or 309-8763. Please remember, this is the same speed that is being offered by AT&T for \$19.95 for the first six months. Comcast does offer a higher speed Internet connection for a higher fee.

The major differences between the DSL service by the phone company is that the farther way you are from a telephone substation, the slower the speed, while with cable the speed remains the same.

If you are in need of normal cable service, you can phone Comcast at 1-800-266-2276 or 655-3842.

There is still some confusion relative to the February 2009 date for conversion of analog station to digital. At this point, it appears that unless you have purchased a recent TV set that is ready to accept the new digital signal, it may be necessary to purchase a small digital tuner in order to receive local stations.

The federal government is proposing to send every TV owner that requests one a voucher for \$40 to offset the cost. Will there be enough money for everybody in the USA? Who knows? Could the whole matter change and the February 2009 date be set back? Possible. Only time will tell. The only thing suggested right now is if you purchase a new TV, be sure it has a digital tuner. □

At this meeting, our guest speaker was Mr. Donald Boyette. His company provides two products. The first product is a relatively new type of roof restoration system which goes under the name of Solargard and Geogard.

I think these products are fantastic because these systems have so many cost saving features. You don't have to remove the old roof; you don't have to pay for a Dumpster; you don't have to pay landfill fees; cost of system is almost half the cost of having a new roof installed on a building. I have saved the best positive feature for last: This system carries a 12-year warranty on material and labor from the manufacturer.

The Solargard and the Geogard systems are also Miami-Dade approved. The one drawback is that this roof restoration system can only be used on flat roofs: It is placed over an existing roof after all the holes, dips, seams and seal are repaired. The roof is then cleaned, after which a very heavy sealer is applied, then a highly reflective coating is applied onto the roof, and according to Mr. Boyette, this final coat is so reflective, that if you would go onto the roof, you would need sunglasses to be able to see.

Another great feature of this type of roof is that it is very cool to the touch, which cuts down on air conditioning costs. This translates into less electrical usage for every one on the top floors of a building. This type of a reflective roof also extends the life of your old roof by many years, which could mean that a building's roof would not have to be replaced every 15 years, but could possibly last up to 25 years if this system is used.

If we have extreme weather conditions, such as hurricanes and tornados, all warranties are cancelled. But if an Association takes care of their roofs, by having a yearly roof inspection and having all visible damage repaired, the chances are good that your roof will sustain less damage by a hurricane.

The next product Mr. Boyette's company has is waterproofing, which is used on the outer walls of buildings. This product is for use only when a building is having water seeping through the walls of a building. If a building has not been painted in a very long time; you should consider waterproofing your east and west walls before painting. The reason I say only the east and west walls is because hurricanes usually come from those directions.

One thing everyone should

remember is that if your buildings need waterproofing, you can have any painting company do the waterproofing. By the time you read this article, we would have had the December meeting, where the guest speaker will be a public claims adjuster. I will tell you all about it in the February issue of the UCO Reporter.

Our next meeting will be held on Tuesday, January 8, 2008 at 10:00 a.m. in the Club house, room C. Our guest speaker will be one of the large property manager companies in CV. This will be your chance to ask any question you may have, so write them down and bring them to this meeting. If time allows, we will have a workshop on inspection reports. One thing everyone should remember is that UCO and the Maintenance Committee does not endorse or approve any product or contractor.

**New Health  
Department  
Long Overdue**

Most of my constituents know that health care and public transportation are two important issues to me. So, I'm very happy to be able to report positive things about both.

We recently broke ground on the new headquarters for the Palm Beach County Health Department. Joining me were Health Department Director Dr. Jean Malecki and Stanley Pierce, chairman of the Health Care District.

The \$22-million complex between Clematis and Datura Streets across from the Tri-Rail station will help anchor our "transit village," a mix of new apartments/townhomes and offices within walking distance of the downtown train and bus hubs. There are

big plans for this 34-acre site known as the western gateway to downtown, including new County offices and a new federal courthouse.

A new Health Department facility is really needed. Right now, many of its employees are crammed into a dingy, crumbling structure on Evernia Street that leaks from hurricane damage. Other Health Department services, such as birth and death records, child care inspections, environmental health, and emergency planning are scattered throughout the county. All these services will be located under one roof, making it much easier for residents to get the help they need.

Although the new building is actually a state facility, the state refuses to pay for it. County government and the

Palm Beach County Health Care District must fund the cost using our locally-raised tax dollars. Yet another unfounded state mandate. This one is particularly frustrating, given all the budget cuts we've had to make due to property tax revenue reductions ordered by — you guessed it — the state.

The project surrounding the Health Department complex should go out to bid early next year. Construction on the rest of the transit village from the Tri-Rail station will begin in about three years.

**Palm Tran Going Green**

We all know that public transportation helps the environment by getting thousands of cars and trucks off the road, saving gasoline and cutting down on air pollution. Well, Palm Tran will soon be making their buses even more environmentally-friendly and less costly to operate.

Beginning in December, Palm Tran bus-tires will be filled with nitrogen. It's perfectly safe, and because nitrogen is lighter than air, it provides better fuel economy. In January, Palm Tran will start fueling its buses with biodie-

sel, a mixture of regular diesel fuel and vegetable or soybean oil. Biodiesel reduces bus emissions by up to 40 percent. These improvements could save our transit system up to \$300,000 per year.

Riding the bus is a safe, affordable and convenient way to reduce the impacts of pollution on the environment. As always, I welcome your comments and questions. Please feel free to contact me or my staff at 355-2202. □



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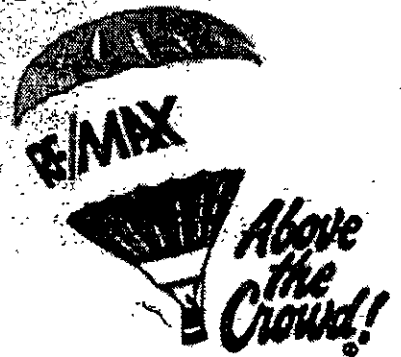


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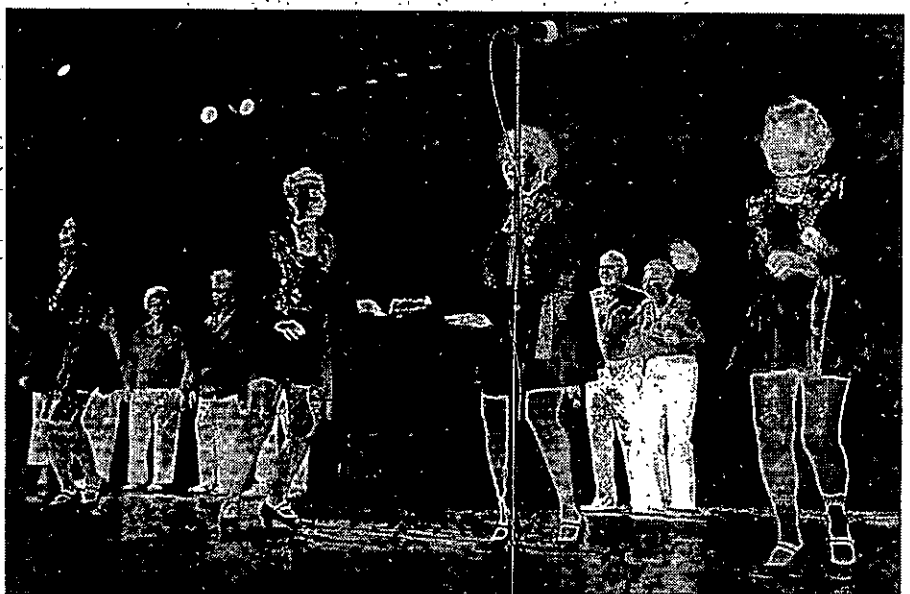

Continued from page 1 where some of us are changing clothes and calls "anyone need zippers or buttons done?" This is, of course, directed to the women; the men managed their own zippers, except for Herbie. But that's another story. Of extreme importance is the edict "no food or drink" backstage. Right — if you've ever met any singer, you know they **must** drink water constantly in order to keep their vocal cords functioning. Luckily, the bottles or water that are ubiquitous in Florida are accepted, but only backstage, not on stage.

As for food, most performers learn early on that eating before a show can create all sorts of problems; to be polite, let's say "wind" and burping at the most inopportune moments. So we don't eat beforehand.

With a call to be there at 6:00 p.m. for an 8:00 p.m. show, it's a bit tough, but you know "the show must go on."

Who can forget the backstage reactions when hearing Sylvia Leighton sing "you'll never walk alone"? Sylvia has been on stage more than 14

years in resident shows, sings at the Morse Home and other venues, and has great difficulty walking, but there was not a dry eye among us as we listened to her addition of "never, never, never" to her solo.

We used to have eight dancers; but attrition took its toll and we were down to four this year. Mary Torres, who provided the dancers' costumes, was especially missed, but still acted as usher for our show. Choreographer Joan surprised us all on the last night by donning a pair of huge bunny slippers, which she wore onstage when making intermission announcements.

What did I gain from all those hours and eight weeks of rehearsals? My memory skills improved tremendously, I met some lovely people from Rhode Island, and definitely lost my prior label of being disabled at dancing and/or moving from one place to another. The personal improvement was most satisfactory, but better yet, was the trust placed in me by J.M. to actually lead others in dance steps.

With the absence of a Clubhouse and related shows for more than two years, many

residents developed other forms of entertainment and didn't feel like spending \$6 for a show of "amateurs." What wasn't understood by these residents is that many of the singers and dancers were **professionals** in their prior life, so brought tremendous experience to this show.

As far as performers go, we would have preferred a larger audience. Putting in all those hours of rehearsals for a theater less than half full is discouraging to any performer.

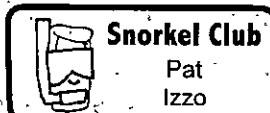
The shuffleboard club is off to a good start. Members are continuing to return from the North to another winter in the Sunshine State.

**The Reader's

*A Thousand Splendid Suns* is the second novel by Khaled Hosseini, which is set in Afghanistan over the last forty years. The author was born there and migrated to the United States in 1986. He took his title from an Afghan poem. There is a history lesson imbedded in this tale. Hosseini takes us through the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan, to the warfare between factions of the Mujihadeen, to the Taliban rule and up to today.

This is the story of Mariam, the illegitimate daughter of a

rich man, and Laila, the educated daughter of liberal Muslim parents. It follows them from childhood through their marriages to the same abusive husband, Rasheed, the shoemaker, who is many years their senior. As in several other Islamic states, Afghanistan is a terrible place to be a woman. Ninety-five percent of them suffer some sort of domestic violence. They are less than second-class citizens who are treated worse than the animals owned by their husbands. At least the animals are not beaten.

Mariam and Laila's compassion for each other and their relationship they form leads to an undying friendship. Hosseini describes their unbearable misery and abuse, beatings and threats, that are part of their daily existence. Neither knew what they had done to bring out this man's evil ways and their deprivation and pain brought tears to my eyes.

Lou Dobbs, who is very hot under the color on this subject, insists that the first step in getting a handle on the problem is preventing further illegal immigration by tight border control.

Securing the U.S.-Mexican border would require — not another handful of border policemen, but about at least two Army divisions with adequate equipment.

None of those vying for the Presidency in 2008 have the guts to even suggest this.

Deporting 26 million people is, of course, impossible, so regardless of their legal status — they stay and are part of our populace. They also make children and these, if born on U.S. soil, are U.S. citizens automatically, regardless of whether the parents are "documented" or illegal immigrants.

Most of these illegals work for below minimum wages, of course, have no health insurance, and do not pay taxes. When they fall sick, they go to the emergency rooms of our hospitals, which have to treat them — and we all pay for it. Their children — hopefully — go to public schools — and we pay for it.

There are industries — and states — that cannot exist without using the manpower of illegal immigrants. Without them, they would be unable to bring in their crops (California and others) and would be unable to maintain adequate landscaping for

da). They would not have the necessary personnel to take care of tourism (Las Vegas). There would not be enough cab drivers (New York City).

This created a thriving new industry: the printing of fake IDs and Social Security documents. Show me an employer who would actually investigate whether the documents presented by a prospective employee are real or fake.

There are no good solutions to this problem and the worst would be if it becomes one of the factors to decide the 2008 elections. There is too much emotion and not enough common sense in how this is handled.

People seem to forget that this is a country created by immigrants. There always were some who opposed a specific type of newcomers. 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We can, of course, put our heads into the sand and ignore the fact that this problem will not go away and eventually will be beyond any reasonable solution. □

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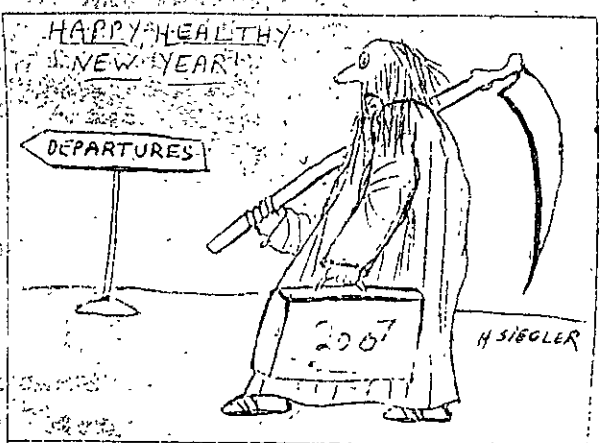

The alternative is to leave things as they are, which means to not "accommodate" illegals — after all, they did break the law by entering the U.S. illegally — and since you cannot get rid of them, there will be 26 million plus people without legal standing, but very much part of our life, until someone has the guts to attempt a solution, never mind the expected storm of protest.
