State of The Village Report for 2007

This past year has been a fruitful one in Century Village. Let's start with the recreational facilities. Between January and May, we continued our Thursday evening cabaret shows in the Party Room. In May, we were able to dedicate our rebuilt theatre with several performers volunteering their time to provide us with entertainment.

June saw a changing of the guard when Peggy Jackson, a Vice President of WPRF, retired, and Anita Cruz stepped into that position. Since her arrival, we have seen a close cooperation between UCO and Anita, resulting in several changes that were proposed by UCO as a result of suggestions by residents. Most visible among them was the extension of the hours in the ticket office, which now is no longer closed during the lunch hour, as well as the elimination of the 50 mile restriction for guests, and the sale of show tickets to guests of residents. At our suggestion, UCO is now also issuing nonresident owners passes if the unit is unoccupied. Our administration is always sensitive to the suggestions of residents.

In that vein, we have opened the East Gate a half hour earlier to accommodate the many residents who have to leave for work very early in the morning. We have also changed the timing of our call-in system, so that the calls are no longer erased at midnight, but stay in the computer until 8:00 a.m. the following day. This makes it easier for residents whose guests arrive after midnight.

We also moved the flagpoles at both gates to a position that would make them more visible when entering or leaving the Village. We continued the beautification of the Village by continuing the coco plum hedge along all the sidewalks on the perimeter road. The bougainvillea inside the Southampton wall was restored, which has the additional benefit of increasing security in that area.

Speaking of security, 2007 saw us entering into a new contract with U.S. Security after interviewing and getting bids from four different firms. We acquired "No Trespassing" signs from the Sheriff's Office and which are posted in multiple locations throughout the Village. This will allow the Sheriff to arrest any unauthorized person in the Village.

In order to help keep the Village clean and in good repair, we hired an assistant for our Property Manager. The additional salary is more than offset by the savings realized by not having to pay outside firms to do the jobs now done by the new hire.

A lot of work has been done on our water system. This year saw the completion of a three year irrigation pump project to qualify us for \$55,000 grant to offset some of the costs.

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Town Hall Meeting: January 11, 2008

A town hall meeting of importance to all residents of Century Village, as well as all residents of Palm Beach County, was held Friday, January 11, at the Clubhouse Theater. Present was State Rep. Susan Bucher, Rep. Priscilla Taylor, Todd Bonlarren, Director, Legislative Affairs; and P.B. County Fire Rescue Battalion Chief Ron Beasley.

Vice President Phyllis Richland addressed the large audience outlining the discussion, providing the "Property Tax Reform Update," which focused on the Constitutional Amendment, which will be voted on the January 29 ballot.

The Florida House and Senate both passed the legislation, which contains:

- Section One: Double Homestead Exemption.
- Section Two: Portability Featuring the Transfer of the Homeowners Exemption to a New Home.
- Section Three: Tangible Personal Property Exemption.
- Section Four: Assessment Cap for Non-Homestead Property.

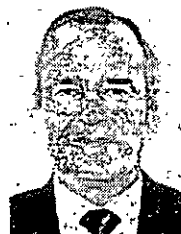
State Representative Susan Bucher (D-District 88) emphasized the gravity of this legislation, which would cost taxpayers (including CV residents) not only money, but in the long run, significant declines in services, as well as benefits in Fire Rescue, Police, Schools, Provisions and other vital services. Other speakers introduced by Rep. Bucher revealed in detail the far-reaching effects of this constitutional amendment, depriving CV residents of their tax exemptions.

They said that although legislators who pushed through the amendment claimed it would cut taxes, the opposite would prevail if it is passed by the voters.

Insurance

"All's well that ends well."

This month, the insurance companies agreed to pay UCO for Ordinance of Law policies, the sum of \$132,000.

This amount is an additional sum to the total loss that was paid a while ago, and covers all the code requirements for the reconstruction of the UCO office building.

All the insurance money that we received would cover a big chunk of the construction cost. Of course, the new office is 20% bigger and this part is not covered under the insurance policy.

We are beginning to get quotes from insurance companies for WPRF policies. As you recall, the policies that were issued for WPRF, and which we pay for, include 8.5% deductible from the value of all the properties in CV put together. The result was a 2.5 million dollar deductible on every claim in any location.

One proposal that we received gives up to five percent deductible per building. It also separates the property from the Business Interruption policy. This would reduce the dollar amount of the deductible to \$652,000 on property. If Business Interruption is involved, then the max deductible would be \$489,000. The deductible of the Hastings building is five

percent of \$2.5 million, which equals \$125,000, compared to \$2.5 million at the present time (i.e., we get nothing for partial or total loss).

This month, there was a case of severe injury of a resident that fell from the staircase of his condo when the banister collapsed. The resident was leaning on it when it suddenly fell apart. We use this example to everyone's attention the importance of good maintenance.

Insurance companies pay for negligence and the "stupidity" of the insured up to a point. If there is a severe negligence, i.e., you knew of a problem, you are warned about it and choose to avoid the issue; then the Insurance Company may reject your claim. So, do not delay or procrastinate any repairs in your building.

There is going to be a substantial savings on the liability policies.

We also requested to separate our insurance policies from the other Century Villages. This is a big advantage to us because it will allow us to be more involved in the policies that we pay the premiums for, and the deductible that we are responsible to meet.

This meeting was called to order by President George Loewenstein at 9:30 a.m. in the Clubhouse Theater.

Quorum — of 196 seated Delegates.

Pledge of Allegiance: Led by Lt. Kronsperger.

Pres. Loewenstein announced that V.P. Phyllis Richland is anxious to go about with the project of the deadline for the grant of the lifts.

Phyllis Richland reported that, because we have 16 applicants for 11 lifts, there will now be a lottery drawn by Lt. Kronsperger. Each of the 16 applicants were called up to participate in this drawing.

This entire procedure is being taped. Each applicant's card was drawn by Lt. Kronsperger as follows: Northampton F, Dorchester K, Chatham P, Andover I, Bedford D, Chatham C, Sussex L, Norwich N, Norwich O, Northampton K, Cambridge B — a total of 11 winning Building Associations. The Associations that didn't win were Canterbury A, Camden N, Dorchester H, Norwich K, Cambridge I — a total of five Building Associations.

Photos were taken of the winners. All material will be taken by Phyllis Richland to the County this afternoon before 4:30 p.m.

Minutes — had been distributed and read. Motion to accept the minutes by Phil Shapkin, seconded by Ted Silverman, passed.

Treasurer's Report: Dorothy Tetro announced that quarterly payments are due now. She reported that due to Dan Gladstone, we have the good news of getting \$132,000 from insurance under the Ordinance of Law. This is to be explained by Dan.

President's Report: Pres. George Loewenstein reported that effective January 1, 2008, AMR is no longer our ambulance transporter. Now we will have to use Medics. He explained that years ago, the original contract was legislatively awarded to Medics, who subcontracted our area to AMR. Medics will accept your insurance. All details are

on file in the UCO office. Please read the President's column in the *UCO Reporter* for additional details.

The phone number for transportation to dialysis, from one hospital to another, etc., is 561-659-7400.

Some rules for Palm Tran have been changed. We will set up a Town Meeting for February 2008 for your information, etc.

Town Meeting: January 11, 2008, at 10:00 a.m., an important guest speaker, Rep. Susan Bucher, will talk to us re Real Estate Taxes. **Important, please attend.**

The Building at 2102 West Drive: We are still waiting for permits to rebuild.

Committee Reports — **CERT:** Marcia Ziccardy reported that a class of 30 is scheduled for January 8; her number is 640-4258.

Transportation: Claudette LaBonte reported that JCC has agreed to take our people to Gliick's in Delray; the first run is on January 10, and there is a waiting list. Call 640-5695. For further details, please read her column in the *UCO Reporter*.

Cable: Larry Kall reported that the government coupons cannot be used by us because we are on cable. Comcast advised us to **do nothing**. If you intend to buy a new TV, make sure you get one with a digital tuner.

Beautification: Sandy Cohen reported that 15 benches will be set up around the waterways for us to enjoy the scenery and to beautify Century Village. Also, birdhouses will be installed for migratory birds. Funding for these projects had been included in our budget, which had been duly passed. Q&A.

Investigations: Louise Gerson reported that it is very important for each Building Association to have at least one Board Member always present to sign documents, etc., and to have the Association seal on hand.

Nominating Committee: Roberta Fromkin reported that the deadline for Letters of Intent to run for office is

January 9. We will have nominations from the floor at the February Delegate Assembly; each nomination must have ten people to second the nomination.

Election: Hershel Sarazen reported that he needs "counters" for the March 7 election, which will start at 8:00 a.m. Please volunteer and notify the UCO office.

Insurance: Dan Gladstone reported on the Ordinance of Law and the \$132,000. He stated that Susan Bucher was very instrumental in helping us get this money. Re the insurance for the Clubhouse: We want to separate ourselves from the other Century Villages with regard to the deductible. **No Good Deed Goes
Unpunished**

A little history:
Back in August of 2007, a CV resident came into the UCO office for a gate pass. He knew one of the ladies who man the phones and is one of our receptionists (P.S.: a volunteer). He mentioned to her that a friend of his in New York heard from a friend of his in Deerfield Beach that Deerfield CV was awarded a grant from the County for \$400,000 to install wheelchair lifts in that village. Well, what would I tell you?

When I heard this, I called Jeff Koons' office and spoke to Kim Ciklin, Jeff's associate, and asked her if, in fact, this were true, why were we not told that this is a possibility for us? She immediately took the bull by the horns and got back to me with the information I needed to put our grant request into action. (In all of my corporate experience, I have learned that you do not go to the head, but you go to the person that shakes the head. That is Kim.)

With the information I had, I called the County and I was told that I would not be able to request anything until October 2007.

So, between August and October, I became what is known in the vernacular as a "noodge." I called the County on a regular basis in case things changed. In the meantime, I found out that Deerfield Beach is a city and the rules are different for them than for us because we are an "unincorporated" area of the County.

Finally, finally, finally I was able to speak to the person from the County that was able to give me some information that I could pass on to our residents. That was in September of '07.

What I learned was that because we were an unincorporated area, we could only get "up to \$300,000." That did not mean that was what would be awarded, but it could be. Also, because we were unincorporated, we would have less competition for the grant in our category.

So, I went forward and announced at one of our Delegate meetings that this was a

possibility, and I published in the *Reporter* the rules for applying as I knew them. I printed them and any Association that wanted to participate was welcome to come into the UCO office and get a printout.

The parameters for applying were very specific. They were not mine. They were dictated by the County.

When I set a "drop dead" date for applying, I gave myself four weeks to follow the rules of applying as the organization. We, in UCO, needed to produce tons of documents that the County mandated to show that we could act as agents for the applying Associations.

One of the most frustrating things at this juncture was that we are in arbitration with WPRF and our attorneys have all of the documents, some of which we needed to produce for the County to be included in our portion of the application.

Well, let's fast forward and get to the present. A quick recap: We now may be able to get \$300,000 for lifts in our Village. We were given 16 applications from Associations who want them and will take on the responsibility of the maintenance, insurance and the inevitable \$32 per year tax from Tallahassee. 2

If we are lucky, at \$25,000 per lift, and if we get the full grant, we can fund 11 lifts. We need, according to the County, have a licensed project manager on board, and we do. He is David Miller, the licensed architect for the rebuilding of 2102, the UCO office building, and he is willing to do this work for us and wait to get paid until the project is over in 2009.

I really thought that I would have the whole month of December to do the UCO part of the application, but I fell ill and was out of commission for almost two weeks.

Last week, I had a meeting with the County to go over some of the questions that I had; and after almost two hours, the senior planner sat back in his chair and told me that he had received an anonymous letter with no name or return address from one of our residents who was not happy with the way this

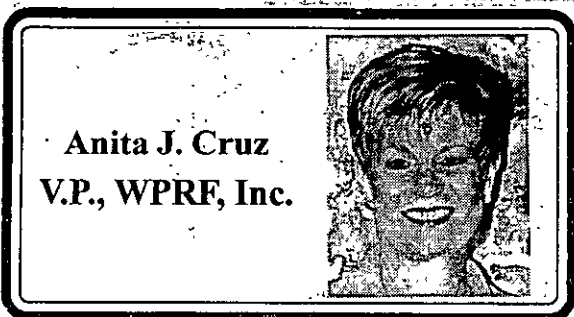

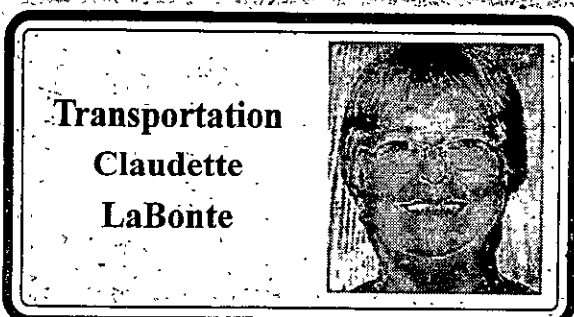

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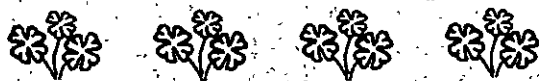

Thank you for your help using the "Call In" system. Because people are doing a better job of calling their guests in, we have had fewer cars turned around (denial). The number of guests entering during the month of December is more than a thousand vehicles higher than November.

We had 16,651 vehicles with only 298 denials. When a car enters the transponder lane and the gate does not open, please show your Century Village ID to the guard so that he may operate the gate. Sometimes the weather affects the gate and sometimes the transponder strip is at fault. If it happens more than once, then please see UCO and have the transponder strip checked out. We need to see your ID to have proof that the driver is a resident. This is for the security of the entire Village, please help.

We are actively seeking a method of allowing the use of cell phones without compromising our Village security. The main reason for requesting a land-line number is that the Condo Documents require that you be present in your unit to receive and be responsible for your guests or workers. I will keep you informed in this column as we progress.

We did not get a report from the Palm Beach Sher-

iff's Office of any incident in the Village that required their help last month, and we did not have any crimes reported by U.S. Security — another good month. Everyone is requested to keep their information at UCO current. Your present phone number and license tag are used by the guards to verify that you are a resident.

There have not been any new alligator sightings this month. The last seen alligator has not been caught yet, so please be careful near the water.

We get several calls a month from family members asking us to check on one of our residents. Most of the time, this results in a simple telephone call off the base so that no one can call in. Please keep your family and friends informed if you plan to travel or if you go to the hospital, let someone know.

Finally, we have received many compliments on the courtesy of our guards. Considering that in the last six months (since July) they have talked to almost ninety thousand people coming through the visitor gates (89,632 vehicles) and greeted all the people entering the Clubhouses, they have done well. The Security Committee thanks them. □

Best Thing Is to Wait a While

You will be hearing a lot in the next few months about the conversion from Analog TV to Digital TV. At this point what it means is that if you have an older set that does not have a digital tuner (which most do not), you may not be able to get any of the local channels even by cable.

If you presently have a Comcast set top box for premium channels, you already have a digital tuner in the set top box. (Residents that have some kind of satellite service also have a set top box with a digital tuner.) At this time, it appears that Comcast will not be able to broadcast any of the local channels without some type of tuner.

Could this change by February 2009? Maybe.

You will also read that Congress has allocated money for people to get a voucher for TV digital tuners. The plan is that beginning January 1, 2008, you can apply for up to two vouchers for up to two digital tuners. The vouchers are for \$40 each and it will apply to the purchase of a digital tuner estimated to cost \$70 each. Every household in the USA is entitled to apply for up to two vouchers. If you only have one set you can only get one voucher and they are not transferable to another party. There are three methods to apply for the vouchers — mail, phone or Internet. While you can apply after January 1, 2008, vouchers will begin to be

mailed out to households in March 2008 and continue until the initial funds Congress allocated is exhausted. After that there is supposed to be a second small allocation. Will the two allocations be sufficient? That is unknown right now. Will they give you a voucher if you tell the government that you receive your TV signal by cable? Right now it looks like the answer is no. You have to say you are on an antenna even if you are not. Stupid but true.

We have also found out that vouchers will be mailed out starting in February or March 2008 to people who have applied. The problem is that the vouchers are only good for 90 days from the date of issue so you have to actually buy the tuner right away. Second problem is that the list of authorized retailers who will accept the vouchers is not available yet. It is therefore suggested that you wait a little while until we try to unravel the problems. Hopefully within a few months.

If you bought a new TV in the last few months you may already have one with a built-in digital tuner. If you plan to buy a new TV, be sure that the set you buy does have a digital tuner. That way you can still receive all of the present channels plus the new stations that will be converted to a digital signal on February 17, 2009. Could the February 2009 date be changed to a later date? Stay tuned. □

Transponders

Things have been going relatively smooth as far as transponders are concerned. By installing transponders once per month at the Okeechobee gate, we have cut the failure rate to less than one half of one percent. This includes all the transponder strips that are pre-tested before being installed on vehicles.

We do, however, still find an occasional vehicle where the strip will not work anywhere on the front windshield no matter how hard we try. It also appears that the two transponder readers at the gates are becoming less sensitive as they get older and may eventually have to be replaced or upgraded.

The manufacturer of our transponder strip has also developed a strip that can be read at 160 kilometers per hour or 100 miles per hour. We do not think that we will consider this type of strip, as it may be too slow for some of our drivers, as evidenced by the number of gate arms destroyed each month.

Requests for special days and times to have transponder strips installed continue to come in with all kinds of reasons, and some are quite interesting. There was a request from one person for immediate installation of a transponder due to the fact that he just had open heart surgery and had three grafts. What makes this request so interesting is that some of the people we use to install transponders have also had open heart surgery. We have volunteers with seven stents, volunteers with five grafts, volunteers with four grafts and four stents, volunteers with both grafts and stents of various amounts.

Because of the number of people needed to install transponders and the necessity to shut down the transponder side of the gate special requests are not being granted at this time. There are too many requests for too many dates and times even if we wanted to consider them. □

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Stamps in the News

The "stamp-ede" goes on! We were glad to report the highlights of the 2007 U.S. Postal Service stamp program honoring people and places of great importance in our history.

Now we look to the 2008 schedule with promises galore of a continuing parade of stamps that will make the everyday purchaser, as well as the inveterate collector, clap hands with glee.

One indication is the announcement that "Ol' Blue Eyes" is back. Yes, the inimitable, charismatic Frank Sinatra will be crooning his way (he did it his way) into our hearts on a new U.S. postage stamp scheduled for release this spring.

The new stamp will feature a 1950s photo of a smiling Sinatra in his trademark fedora. His autograph also appears on the stamp.

A larger-than-life image was unveiled in Beverly Hills, CA in the presence of his children Nancy, Frank Jr. and Tina. Together they said, "We are proud of his career and this stamp will be considered one of his biggest days."

The son of Italian immigrants, Francis Albert Sinatra was born December 12, 1915 in Hoboken, NJ. As a boy, he would sit on the docks, staring across the Hudson River at New York City's skyline, pondering his future. Decades later, when he first sang the theme from *New York, New York*, Sinatra might have remembered those lines as he belted

out the line, "If I can make it there, I'll make it anywhere."

In a 50 year career studded with accolades, Frank won several Grammys, an Academy Award and was recognized by the Kennedy Center Honors in 1983. Sinatra gave generously to many charities and was noted for his philanthropy. President Ronald Reagan awarded him the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1985.

The long list of hit songs connected with Frank over the years included such favorites as *I've Got You Under My Skin*, *One More for My Baby* and *One More for the Road* and (his favorite) *I Did it My Way*.

Sinatra was famous not only for his musical talent and acting ability, but as the central figure in the so-called "Rat Pack," a group that included Dean Martin, Peter Lawford, Sammy Davis Jr. and Joey Bishop. He became known as "Chairman of the Board."

Will the new Sinatra stamp become the biggest seller in U.S. stamp history? If so, it will have to top the most popular stamp issued by the USPS — the Elvis Presley tribute in 1993, when 124 million were sold. The Postal Service says the Sinatra initial printing will be 120 million. If needed, more will come.

If it is just a matter of numbers, we will see if this is "one more for the road."

More information on this stamp will be provided as soon as it becomes available. □

In 1980, The Soviets were seeking SCADA equipment (Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition) which consists of the software, hardware devices, and networks that collectively control power grids, gas pipelines, chemical plants, transportation systems, and other national critical infrastructure to run a massive planned Siberian Natural Gas Pipeline. These Process Controllers would permit the Russians to market Natural Gas throughout Europe and bring in lots of hard currency. It was assigned to the Intelligence Community (IC) to kaibash this entire matter with Extreme Prejudice!

The Russians came to a number of Western firms, well known globally in the field of Process Controllers, through surrogates of course, and were succinctly denied the equipment by COCOM! However, a cutout agency in Canada was created which was to enable the transfer of the "desired" technology "under the table."

Meanwhile, Engineers and Programmers within the IC developed an extremely sophisticated chip based software to be placed in the transferred equipment to be supplied. This software was embedded in such a manner as to be absolutely undetectable! In order to disrupt the Soviet gas supply, its hard currency earnings from the West, and the internal Russian economy, the pipeline software that was to run the pumps, turbines, and valves was programmed to go haywire, and after a decent interval, to reset pump speeds and valve settings to produce pressures far beyond those acceptable to pipeline joints and welds.

This plan was approved over the signature of President Ronald Reagan in January of 1982, and the equipment was in due course transferred; the concept succeeded beyond our wildest dreams, and the result, in the summer of 1982, was the greatest non-nuclear explosion and fire ever seen on Earth, as confirmed by NORADCOM (North American Air Defense Command) Satellite sensors from space and seismic sensors globally, the explosive yield was estimated to be in excess of 3 Kilotons. Temperatures of over 3500 degrees vaporized any evidence.

The United States and its NATO allies later "rolled up"

Founding Fathers

Israel, established in our lifetime, rightfully considers David Ben Gurion as its "founding father." Of course, even he was not alone in accomplishing the

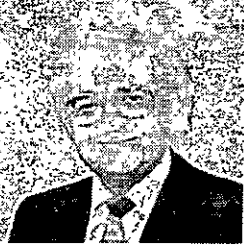

Iran's "Elite"

The Islamic Revolutionary Guards are the Iranian equivalent of the storm troopers of the thirties and forties.

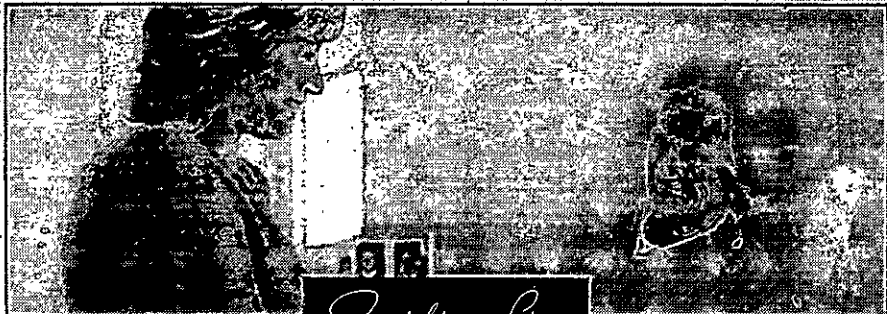
Fact: In 1992, the Israeli embassy in Buenos Aires was bombed, killing over 20 and injuring many more.

Fact: In November, the Argentinean judge investigating these attacks issued an international warrant for the arrest of the perpetrators, among them, Rafsanjani,

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Maintenance

Before starting my article, I must tell everyone how upset and infuriated I am with an accident that happened during the week of December 15, 2007, at one of our two story Condo Associations.

A man was going up the stairs when the hand railing on the landing gave way. This person fell onto the ground and received a head injury, which required him to go to the hospital for treatment. I might add, from what I have been told, this man also suffers from Alzheimer's, and at this time, I don't know the man's condition. What really gets to me is that this accident was 100% avoidable.

I went over to look at the building's staircase to see what caused the accident. I found that the cement in all the railings and banisters was rotted; the rebars were all rusted to the point of being almost useless in supporting the cement. I then inspected the other staircases of that Association and found that the second staircase was also in bad condition, and who knows, the next person that falls on any of those staircases could get killed.

Another interesting piece of information: According to my records, no Board Member from this Association has ever attended any of my Maintenance Committee Meetings. Who knows, if they would have attended the UCO and Maintenance Meetings, the Association would have known that they were not maintaining their buildings properly and this accident might have been prevented.

Here in CV, all Boards must realize that they can't stay in a bubble, cut off from all information. These Boards

have a responsibility under Chapter 718 and code enforcement, and could be held legally responsible for not taking care of their buildings. The President and Board members can now be fined by the County per Chapter 718 for not obeying the law.

Everyone who missed the last meeting shortchanged themselves on a lot of valuable information and the possibility of getting more insurance monies back for their Associations from the last hurricanes if they dealt with the insurance companies on their own.

Our guest speaker, Mr. Tim Greene, who represents a large Public Insurance Company Adjuster, who looks to find things that adjusters for insurance companies miss, like hidden mold damage in walls, around windows, in bathrooms and in closets. The Insurance Company Adjusters even miss damage to roofs and walls of buildings. Mr. Greene advised everyone how surprised they would be on how much Insurance Company Adjusters miss. This happens after a hurricane: The demand for Adjusters is high and many of these Adjusters are poorly trained and are part-time workers and are inexperienced.

At present, Mr. Greene is representing one of the Wellington Associations and may be able to get the Association additional insurance money. This possible payment came from items that the Insurance Company's Adjuster had missed when he had inspected their building after one of the hurricanes.

Remember, you have up to five years to reopen a claim on damage that was possibly missed after a claim was

settled on hurricane damage. I think the high-rise buildings in CV should look to see if they have more insurance monies due them. Contact Mr. Greene for information.

Our next meeting will be held on Friday, January 15, 2008 at 11:00 a.m. at the Clubhouse in the Party Room. We will have two special guest speakers: Danille Carroll, Esq., the Ombudsman for Chapter 718, and Mrs. Susan Rapphan. This meeting is open to everyone in CV. Don't miss this meeting.

Forums**

Preparing a County budget that delivers quality services at the lowest possible cost to taxpayers is always a challenge. But my fellow Commissioners and I really have our work cut out with more state-mandated revenue reductions taking effect in 2008.

To ensure that we fully understand what programs and services are most important to you, the taxpayer, we will soon be holding a series of evening community forums around Palm Beach County.

Please take a look at the following schedule and plan on joining us (all start at 6:00 p.m.). Dates and locations are tentative, so please check our Web site, pbcgov.com, to confirm a day or so before the scheduled forum:

• South County: January 22,

Morikami Museum, 4000 Morikami Park Road, Delray Beach

• West-Central: January 23, Royal Palm Beach Cultural Center, 151 Civic Center Way, Royal Palm Beach

• East-Central: January 24, Clayton Hutcheson Ag Center, 559 North Military Trail, West Palm Beach

At each budget forum, there will be a presentation by County staff and an open question-and-answer period with County Administrators, Budget staffers and Legislative Affairs representatives. The aim is not to try to sway you one way or the other on the upcoming homestead exemption referendum. That's up to each voter to decide for themselves. Our only objective is to provide accurate facts in clear and simple terms, so you can make an informed decision. We want everyone to

understand how their tax dollars are collected and spent, what programs and services are likely to be cut due to the state's actions, and others that could be affected if the property tax amendment passes.

Forum attendees will be encouraged to complete a written survey on how they think County tax dollars should be spent. Survey results will be incorporated into a report to help us determine what ultimately stays in the budget and what gets cut or reduced.

Attendees are not required to turn in their survey at the forum. You can take a copy home and mail it in later. If you cannot attend one of our forums, the survey will be available online at pbcgov.com. The Web site will also have information on current and past years' budgets, official documents, and a video clip of the staff presentation.

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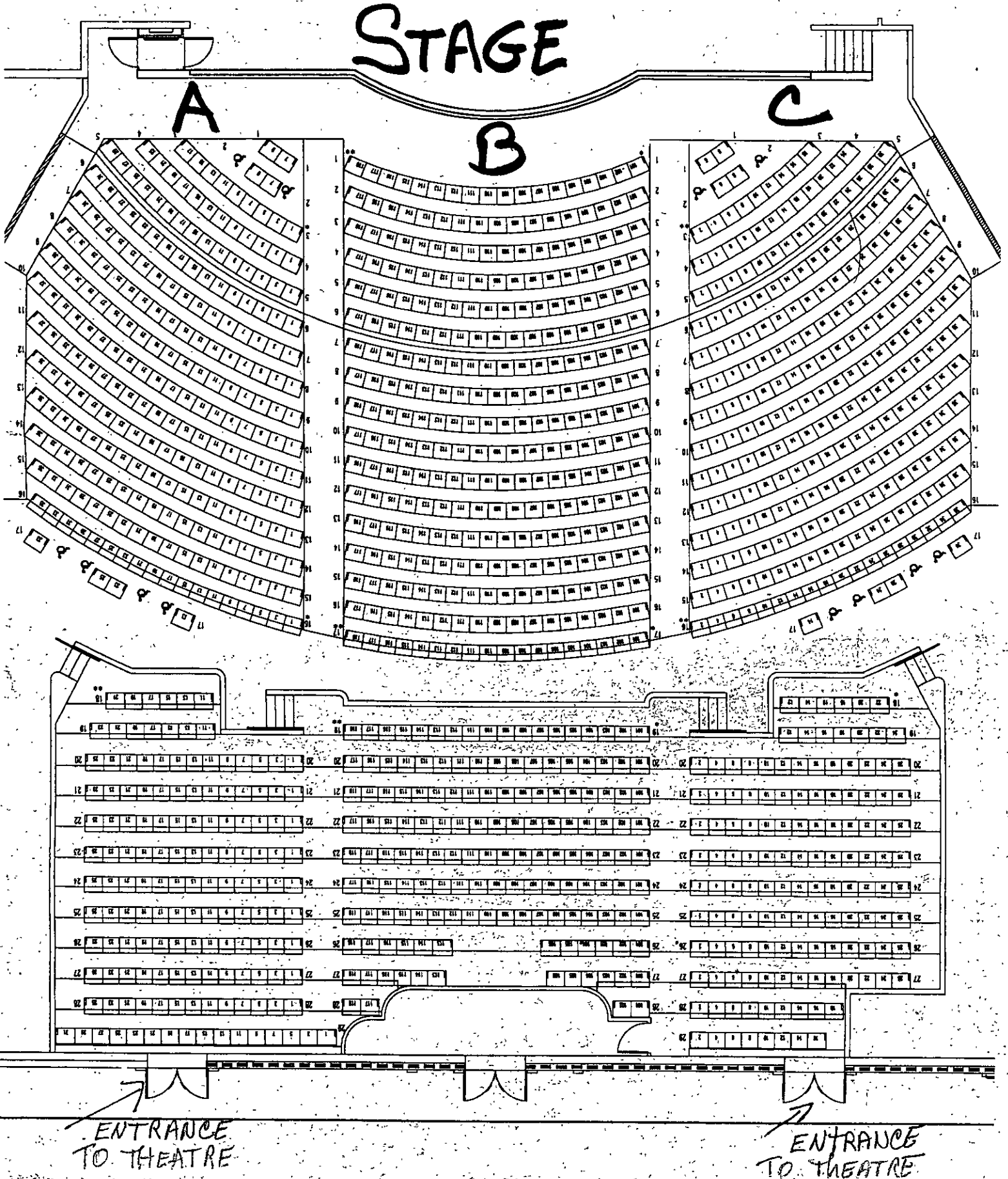

Iran's former President, and Valiyati, Iran's former Foreign Minister, and three other Iranians — all of them senior commanders of the Revolutionary Guards.

Fact: Both attacks were coordinated by Iran's embassy in Buenos Aires.

Fact: In 1998, an Iranian defector confirmed that these attacks were planned in Teheran, that Rafsanjani decided upon them in 1993, and that the bombers underwent special training for the mission in a camp in Lebanon. The defector is the son of Major

General Rezai, who was the commander of the Revolutionary Guards at that time, and is another senior officer mentioned in the judge's international arrest warrant.

Unfortunately, it is also a fact that these senior terrorists who caused the tragedies in Buenos Aires will never have to answer for their misdeeds. They are safe and in high positions in Teheran. Naming the Revolutionary Guards a terrorist organization is amply justified. The vote to declare them such should not become an issue in the 2008 elections. □



Century Villager Celebrates Century Birthday

He has been called a "man for all seasons" and a proud pioneer in the founding of Century Village.

William (Bill) Snyder now is accorded another accolade in his personal life — celebrating his 100th birthday.

Bill recalls, with a special glow in his eyes, the early days of CV when construction began in 1967-68. At that time, CV was probably the largest condominium in the state of Florida.

"All of the recreation facilities in the Village were owned and controlled by the developer, and the residents were required to pay a recreational fee, whether or not they used the facilities. And, as the building of condos was fairly new in the late 1960s, the laws governing the condo's living were developed, for the most part, at the suggestion of the developers and, in my opinion, favored that group."

He came to the Village in 1972, purchasing a unit in Windsor K and became its first President.

Not many residents of Century Village are aware of the fact that Bill has made an enormous impact on this Village, which resulted in the good life that the residents are now enjoying.

In the past, especially in the late 1970s, there was no UCO

to assist the residents and to resolve the many problems that confronted them at that time, with regard to leases, transportation, security, recreation fees, government restrictions and laws, etc. Bill contributed much input to help surmount these difficulties in order to achieve a resemblance of unity in the Village.

Also at that time, there was no UCO Reporter to inform residents of all the "happenings" available.

Bill attended the Pittsburgh School of Accounting. He also attended the Penn State Branch College in Pittsburgh, PA, from which he received credits in Industrial Engineering. In 1940, or thereabout, he received an appointment to the Pennsylvania Employment Service. Eventually he received an appointment as supervisor of a branch of the Employment Service.

In 1942, Bill and his family moved to Lancaster, Ohio, where he was hired as an industrial engineer for the Anchor Hocking Glass Corporation and eventually became the Wage and Salary Administrator, a position which he held at the time of his retirement in 1972.

On a visit to Florida, in the early part of 1972, Bill and his wife decided to investigate the condos at Century Village, and after very little deliberation, they decided to buy one of the units.

After settling down in his new environment, he immediately became involved in community welfare. He was the first President of Windsor K and served in that capacity on three different occasions. He also served as President of the Windsor area on two different occasions. He is currently President of the Windsor K Association.

In 1980, Bill lost his dear wife, Anne, after a long illness. His son, Matthew, is a

CPA, now residing in the Los Angeles area, and his younger son, Richard, practices law in Cincinnati, Ohio. Bill has a daughter-in-law in Cincinnati

and five wonderful children. Bill is an active and enthusiastic sports fan. He plays golf, billiards, pool and, on occasion, swims. He attends Clubhouse

dances, shows and movies, at which he is accompanied by Betty Gorman, his companion for the last ten years. □



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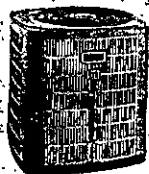

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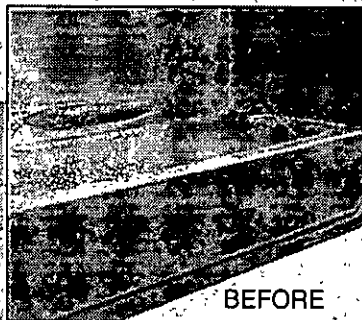

Bush jokes.

We assembled at the tiki hut we normally use to prepare for our immersion into the water, and after donning our equipment, we went into the water.

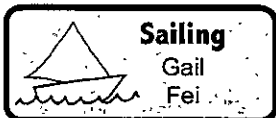
As I was about to submerge in the water, I heard a young boy excitedly announce to another that he saw a shark!

preparing to receive reclaimed water for irrigation. At the same time, Palm Beach County Water Utilities Department completed their water reclamation project, enabling the Village to now receive the water. Further, we have hired an engineering firm to do a study of the shorelines and to evaluate different techniques to restore them to their original state.

2007 also saw an end to our long association with AMR Ambulance because of legal restrictions. They can no longer service our community. Medics has now taken over and will service our Village.

CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) graduated its second class of 30, and as you read this, will have started a third class.

We are working on securing a grant, which will pay for 11 lifts. The project, however, will not see fruition until 2009.

We have started the process to rebuild the UCO office. Everything is ready to start construction just as soon as Palm Beach County will issue us a building permit.

We have also been approved for an additional \$130,000 in insurance money, giving us total insurance proceeds on the building of \$400,000.

In order to keep the residents informed, we (until recently) taped our Delegate Meetings and rebroadcasted them on Channel 63. Additionally, we have had several Town Meetings on subjects of interest.

2007 also saw the start of our process to recoup from WPRF the moneys UCO feels are due to the residents. We appeared in Federal Court before Judge Hurley, who ruled that the dispute should be submitted to Arbitration. Three Arbitrators have been appointed, and the discovery process has begun. The Arbitrators have set the hearing dates in May and June of 2008. Based on the advice of UCO's legal counsel, we are no longer taping the Delegate Meetings.

It has been a busy year for our administration, as you have read, but it was a very satisfying one. I have decided to seek another term as President, especially since I feel a moral obligation to see the Arbitration with WPRF to its conclusion. □

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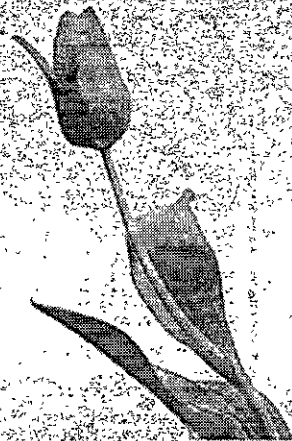

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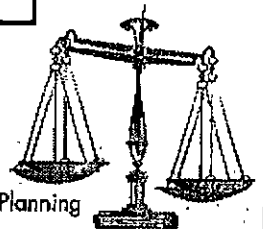

the entire Line X collection network, both in the U.S. and overseas. The heart of Soviet technology collection crumbled and would not recover. After all, how could they trust any "acquired" technology after this devastating experience. It is variously estimated that this IC effort led inexorably to the economic and political collapse of the FSU.

And what of In-Place Agent Farewell? Col. Vladimir Vetrov was a KGB officer working at a desk in KGB headquarters. As noted above, his job was to evaluate the intelligence collected by Directorate T. Between spring 1981 and fall 1982, he supplied the French DST (Directorate of Territorial Surveillance) over 4,000 secret documents and revealed the names of more than 200 Line X officers stationed in ten KGB posts in the West. Col. Vetrov supplied a list of Soviet organizations, in scientific collection and summary reports from Directorate T, on the goals, achievements, and unfulfilled objectives of the program. He was executed in 1983, ostensibly for killing a Soviet policeman. Col. Vetrov's contribution led to the collapse of a crucial Soviet collection program at the time when the Soviet military badly needed it. It is believed that Col. Vetrov's espionage was discovered by the KGB, and that this was the real reason leading to his execution in 1983. Hardball, indeed! □
