From the Desk of President George Loewenstein



I'm very pleased to announce that we have finally obtained the permits necessary to begin construction of our UCO office building. All of us are happily looking forward to be moving in before the end of this calendar year.

This may be a good time to review the functions of UCO vs. those of WPRF. Many people in our village are still confused when confronted by the initials of the two groups — who does what, for example. First of all, WPRF stands for West Palm Recreation Facilities, and thus all the recreational facilities belong to WPRF, sometimes known as Mark Levy. Representing WPRF is their Vice President, Anita Cruz, whose office is upstairs in the Clubhouse — her office is known as Administrative. The downstairs office as you enter the building is the Ticket Office where you can also sign up for classes.

Replacing Judy Roy there is Jennifer, and Rose's smiling face is front and center, while to your left is Linda. Finally, there is the ID office at the far right end of the hall, manned by Joy and Roni. All of these are WPRF employees who are salaried. The Fitness Center (also known as "Hastings") is also a WPRF facility, as are many of the satellite pools. After the hurricanes of 2004-2005, WPRF quickly got the Fitness Center up and running as well as the satellite pools for which they are responsible.

The confusion arises because these facilities are governed by WPRF in consultation with the Operations Committee of UCO (unpaid volunteers). When unit owners, or their property management companies, pay monthly maintenance fees to WPRF, these funds entitle them to the use of these facilities. Not mentioned above, but included, are the tennis courts and petanque at the Somerset pool area, the bocce and handball courts at the main clubhouse, and the sailboats there.

UCO, on the other hand, is an umbrella organization representing the unit owners in the following areas: (1) Security, (2) Transportation, (3) Investigation, (4) Infrastructure and Beautification, (5) Dissemination of information via the monthly publication of the *UCO Reporter* and the maintenance of community television channel 63, and (6) Insurance. All UCO officers, reception staff, investigative staff, *Reporter* staff, and committee chairpersons, as well as their members, are volunteers, are volunteers, with the exception of only four paid employees. With a budget of over five million dollars a year, the fact that we have so many volunteers saves the unit owners a tremendous amount of expense.

It is important to note that UCO can **not** interfere with, or enforce, the documents of the individual Associations. Upon request, we may act only in an advisory capacity. For example, your building has a problem with a unit owner and comes to UCO for help. We can offer advice, but cannot enforce your building's documents. This responsibility rests upon your Association's Board of Directors. In the same light, our Investigation Committee may provide info about a prospective buyer, but can **not** tell you "no" or "yes" as to your decision — this is entirely up to your Association's board.  $\square$

Many times in the past, UCO has warned the Associations to remove all kinds of obstacles from the common areas. A few chose to disregard these warnings. We also pointed out the fact that works done on the common places could result in injuries.

In one apartment, a handyman was doing a job for the unit owner privately. For some reason, the handyman decided to use the electric socket of the laundry room and pull his electric cord, a few yards long, to the place that he worked on.

A neighbor that was passing by did not notice the cable on the floor and tripped over it. This woman sustained injuries all over her body and approached the owner of the apartment where the handyman was working with her medical bills. The homeowner's insurance company referred the injured person to the Association, claiming that the injury happened on common ground.

The fact is that the Association did not know about the use of the common area and certainly did not give permission. In spite of all this, the Association may be found liable. So please, remove all the beautiful planters, the empty chairs, the door mats, etc. Be sure that the pavements and catwalks are smooth and not slippery.

In the absence of Betty Lapidus, these minutes were taken by Mary Patrick Benton.

The meeting was chaired by Vice President Phyllis Richland. According to the UCO Bylaws, this was the first meeting for the summer months where 117 Delegates are needed for a quorum. There were 179 Delegates in attendance today. The first ten rows across the theater were reserved for Delegates only.

Capt. Chris Callaway led the Pledge of Allegiance. We had two larcenies and two vehicle break-ins in the Village in April. The Sheriff's Department is watching the golf course very carefully for trespassers.

A budget meeting to plan the 2009 budget for your condos has been scheduled for September 17 at 10:00 a.m. in Classroom C. Additional \$50,000 insurance money for Ordinance of Law (bringing items up to code in building 2102) is coming to UCO.

New appointments to the Executive Board are George Franklin, Carole Szepesi, Al McLaughlin, Evelyn Leibowitz, and Claudette LaBonte. Jackie Karlan has been appointed Chair of the "One Vote" Committee.

The building permit for 2102 has been granted and a Groundbreaking Ceremony was held yesterday, May 1. Check Channel 63 for pictures.

CERT Chair Marcia Ziccardy announced that there will be a new class beginning May 6.

fic tickets were issued for right turn on red at the Haverhill Gate. Century Village maps are available for visitors at each gate. New license tags need to be registered at the UCO office. There is no fee for upgrading this information.

Larry Kall, Cable Committee Chair, was informed by Comcast that the transition will have no impact on Century Village when broadcasting goes digital.

Insurance Chair Dan Gladstone reminded Associations to ask their maintenance companies to supply copies of their insurance policies showing that the Association is listed as coinsured. Mitigation reports that were distributed today should be kept on file by all Associations. Remember, no obstacles should be placed on the catwalks because this may lead to lawsuits affecting your Association.

Dot Loewenstein reported that the Transportation Committee is taking an in-depth look at bus services and ridership. Suggestions should be placed in the box in the Clubhouse or at UCO. May 13 is the deadline.

Jerry Karpf, Maintenance Committee Chair, announced that the next meeting of his committee will be May 20 in Room C at 10:00 a.m.

George Franklin, Safety Committee Chair, asked that all suggestions be given in writing and signed with names and addresses to the UCO office. The Safety Committee will present a Town Meeting

### Cable Larry Kall



For several months I have been trying to get accurate information relative to the digital TV transition that is scheduled for February 12, 2009 and how this might affect our Village and our cable contract with Comcast.

The first thing that I discovered was that Comcast was doing a lousy job of informing, not only their customers, but their local employees as well. After discussions with local sources, it became evident to me that decisions were going to be made at the corporate level, not necessarily at

local level.

I was fortunate enough to be able to talk with someone from the Comcast Corporate in Philadelphia and we both agreed that Comcast had to do a better job of communicating with their customers.

Also during this time period, various residents questioned me about what was going on, and each time, I told them what I knew at the time, along with some possible scenarios and solutions. I got the feeling that some people did not like the manner in which I was handling the situation.

However, my business sense told me that I was doing the job properly and that I would in time get the proper answers from Comcast.

In fact, I received a phone call from the Cable Chair for Phase Two, an 800-unit development in Golden Lakes looking for information. When I asked him how he got my name, he stated that Comcast suggested he call me, as I spent a lot of time on the matter and had the most knowledge on the subject to date.

Well, the time is here, and it was pretty much what I had anticipated and hoped for. Therefore, below is the exact fax that I received from Comcast on April 29, 2008, that explains what they plan to do and what it means for us and the Village. This letter was read to the Delegate Assembly on Friday, May 2, 2008. □

The lazy days of summer will soon be upon us and I hope you all enjoy the longer daylight hours. I know many of you will take advantage of swimming at our pools in the cooler evening hours before sundown, and I hope while at the pools, you will take note of the new Pool Rules Signs recently posted at each pool. Please take a moment to review the new signage since the information has changed from the previous sign wording.

One important item on each pool sign is "No food, drink, glass or animals in pool or on pool deck" and our security officers are now enforcing this rule. I understand the ban on food and drink was relaxed during the aftermath of the hurricanes a few years ago, but now that the Clubhouse is open and our Party Room is available for groups to gather with food and drink, this pool regulation will once again be enforced. Keep in mind that water fountains are located at all pools. Exceptions to the food and drink rule will be made for established groups and associations who request one of our pools for a scheduled event and who sign a reservation request form agreeing to be responsible for cleanup when the event is over. These forms are available from Jennifer in the Staff/ Ticket Office.

During the off-season summer months (from April through October), our theater shows are limited to Saturday nights, with an occasional midweek show. Please pick up a monthly flyer from our Staff/Ticket Office and check out the shows planned for this summer. There are some really good offerings you can

take advantage of, and please remember, we offer non-reserved seating during the offseason for your convenience, especially if you decide at the last minute to see a show.

If you are interested in participating in our advance season ticket program for next season's shows, please stop by the Staff/Ticket Office for a mail-out application. The deadline for completing and submitting an application for the advance season program to be mailed to you is July 15. If you choose not to have a program brochure mailed to you, the date when you can pick up a brochure will be announced and advertised.

And the next time you are in the Staff/Ticket Office, you should also look over the many classes being offered. Jennifer has a funfilled and action-packed summer planned for you, with some newly-added classes being offered. Please look for her monthly flyers with dates and information for you.

We have completed all scheduled building-by-building ID revalidations. If you still have an old red ID card, please be sure to stop by the ID office as soon as possible to see Joy or Roni, who will be happy to replace your red ID card with our new white photo ID card. If you still have a red ID card, security will issue a warning to you until June 1, at which time, security officers will begin to confiscate all red cards as they are presented.

The following information comes directly from the Website for Comcast employees.

Under the FCC's mandate for broadcast digital transition, television broadcasters must switch from transmitting their signals in analog to digital no later than February 17, 2009, when that spectrum will be returned to the federal government. Portions of the spectrum will be used by emergency response providers while some will be auctioned off for use by other technologies.

The good news is this transition should have no impact whatsoever on Comcast customers. Because they are connected to cable, all of our customers will continue to receive broadcast channels without interruption after the digital broadcast transition. They will be able to receive the new digital signals through new digital-ready TVs or boxes purchased in retail stores or through their existing digital set-top converter. We will deliver broadcast signals digitally and we will convert the new broadcast digital signals back into analog signals at our headends so that customers who do not have or want a digital box or new TV will continue to receive the channels in the same way they receive them today without having to do anything.



### **Safety George Franklin**



This month, we will discuss safe driving in bad weather.

How many of us have found ourselves in situations that occur suddenly when weather changes? In South Florida, this can range from a sudden downpour of rain, hail or other problematic weather conditions.

Now, do you know that after a long dry spell, oils and dirt embedded in the roadway will be brought up top by rain causing a more dangerous driving condition?

What happens, and mostly with asphalt roadways, is that they can turn into a very slippery surface. A false sense of security sometimes occurs because the speed limit sign says 50 MPH. Actually, what needs to be done, as soon as bad weather comes upon you, is **drop** your speed to adjust to the weather and road condition. In other words, slow down! Don't worry about the guy behind you. Drive accordingly.

Now, back to the original subject of the oil. The asphalt is made with oil, and as we all know, oil is used for lubricating. And lube the roadway it does! Now, driving too fast for conditions in the rain causes you to hydroplane...which is described as your vehicle actually riding on top of the water. There is **no** contact of the tires to the roadway. This is a very dangerous condition, as you have no control of the vehicle. This can cause a loss of control of the vehicle, and that can cause a crash. The other involved in a crash and it is police investigated, you may be charged and ticketed for "careless driving," defined as driving too fast for road and weather conditions.

Another safety tip: If caught in a sudden downpour, and as we know, some are very heavy, you feel that you cannot negotiate the roadway, safely pull off the road at the nearest overpass or shopping area and wait out the storm.

Hail can be very dangerous, as it sometimes can be mixed with rain. This causes two problems: One as described above, and the other, depending on the size of the hailstones, can cause a lot of damage to your vehicle. Do **not** park under a tree. Falling stones may break branches loose. Hail storms do not last very long in most cases. Wait it out safely.

What to do if your vehicle starts to skid in the rain: Do not panic and jam on the brakes. Take your foot off the gas pedal and steer the car in the direction of the skid. Slowly and gently apply the brakes. This should put you back in control of your vehicle.

We hope that these safety tips will help you in your daily drives. If anyone would like to send in any safety suggestions to the committee, we will be glad to review them and possibly have them printed in the UCO Reporter with proper credit given to the writer. 

### **Security** Al McLaughlin



In April, we still had a lot of traffic at the entry gates. The visitors gate had 15,490 vehicles entering. There were 436 people **not called in**. They were denied entry until they were called in. The owners gate (transponder) was broken off several times by cars that did not wait until the gate was fully opened before they drove through. The summer will have less traffic.

We plan to have a "Family (or Friend) Only" gate pass that will last for one year from the date of purchase. This pass will be allowed for a total of six passes per phone number and will only be allowed to be canceled once with no refund. A new pass would have to be purchased to be restored. The annual pass is not available for workers or employees. The one year pass will be in the computer and will be checked when the visitor shows their picture ID at the gate.

We don't plan to issue a paper pass. This will allow us to remove a name from the list of any person that is no longer qualified. A receipt for the cash payment will be given to the buyer but that will not be accepted as a "gate pass". The cost of this pass will be equal to four 90 day paper passes. \$13 is the total of 4 x 90 days at \$3.25 per pass.

The Palm Beach Sheriff's Office told us of increased ticketing for speeding, failing to make proper full stops, in the Village, and making a right turn on red at the Haverhill gate.

There are two types of patrol cars at work here in the Village: First one is C.O.P.S., they drive the white car with green marking (Sheriff). They are our neighbors that volunteer to drive and observe here

in the Village. They report directly to the Sheriff's Officers by radio or phone in case help is needed. The other patrol cars are white with blue markings (U.S. Security). These cars belong to U.S. Security Associates. They work for UCO under a contract to provide us with: (1) Access Gate control, (2) Moderate Mediation (within the Village) and (3) Welfare Checks of residents that have not responded to family calls or by a neighbor request. W.P.R.F. also has a contract with U.S. Security for (1) Access Control at the Club House and Health Club and (2) at the W.P.R.F. Pools.

A new map of the Village will be at the gate house for our visitors. We hope that this will make it easier for visitors to find our homes when they arrive for the first time.

We ask everyone to notify the UCO Transponder Committee of any new car tags you get on your car. When you enter the gate, the computer shows your original license plate number and make of the car at the time you got the transponder. This information may cause the guard to believe that the transponder has been placed in a non-owned car which should not be entering through that owners gate. There is no charge for changing registration changes, so please, update your file at

Finally, we have been complimented on the safety and security of our Village by the PBSO.

Thank you for watching out for each other and reporting when you see things that do not seem correct. Remember, if you see an accident or a crime, call 911 first. □

### **Profile of a Malcontent**

According to the Webster's Second New College Dictionary, a malcontent is discontented with existing circumstances, a very discontented person. This person has many faces. You will find not one particular gender and he or she may be young, old, ill, healthy, but the common thread is the sole purpose to catch a mistake or a perceived mistake.

Most of the time, a malcontent doesn't have all the facts and fills in the blanks as he or she imagines them to be, usually by hearing gossip or half truths. Most of this information comes from pools or buses.

What a malcontent likes to do is threaten lawsuits or start misinformation campaigns, specifically having to do with financial records, conspiracies, etc. These people love to see others unhappy or frightened and uncomfortable. This is a form of control which is strange.

So, having said all this, what do we do? First and most important is to ignore this person or group of people. Don't lower yourself to their level. These folks are expert in what they do. They have many years of experience.

If you or your Association feel you are being harassed by an individual or group, there gry or hurt when a malcontent are laws in place to control this behavior. It is your right or your Association's right to seek legal advice.

Whatever you do, make that ultimately fail. □

sure you follow your bylaws to the letter. Don't give the malcontent any ammunition. Keep all your meetings open, according to the Sunshine Law. Every owner in your Association is entitled to see your books, your bills, your contracts, etc. They also have the right to speak at your meetings. The only exception to this is a meeting about legal matters with the Association.

Malcontents do not have the right to scream and yell or disrupt a meeting in any way. The Chair has the right to eject such a person displaying this type of behavior. If the malcontent cannot be controlled, it is the right of the Board to seek the help of law enforcement.

Make sure your Secretary keeps impeccable minutes of all meetings. They should contain only the bare facts of the meeting and all motions made, seconded and what the results of that vote were. Often the malcontent seeks to find fodder for their accusations in the written record.

So, keep your cool. Don't get caught up in trying to react or respond to the malcontent. It will not work. Remember, they are expert, they love to annoy. Just like a mosquito buzzing around, get rid of it with the proper solution.

Finally, it is good to be anattacks. Anger is good. It is what makes you strong. Those that have no anger at injustice are weak. They are the ones

Also, do not forget to ask your maintenance company for their yearly proof of insurance and be sure that your Association is named as a coinsured.

This month, UCO took the initiative to "wake-up" the private homeowners policy holders. Although it is not in the scope of work that UCO does, we hereunder give you an explanation how to go about reducing your apartment insurance premium using the Mitigation Reports.

The Board of Directors should keep in its file, for future reference, the copy of the 2006 Mitigation Report by Citizens and the roof inspection of 2007. These will help in future insurance claims.

This article is for information only and not to be used in any legal matter.

### **All About Mitigation Reports**

This is the answer for you to provide to the Unit Owners and Associations:

The form attached — OIR-B1-1802 — is the only form that can be used for individual unit owners to provide Mitigation Information to their carriers.

In the past, if a unit owner was purchasing cover through Citizens for their individual unit, Citizens would accept the

MIT-5 form (the existing commercial form for the association structure), however, our Plastridge Agency just received word from Citizens that they will be using the above form from this point forward as well. This form considers the roof information and shutter information.

The OIR-B1-1802 must be completed "individually" for each unit owner, by a licensed inspector, and paid for by the unit owner.

This is due to the individual situations regarding shutters. Some unit owners may have hurricane impact windows, accordion shutters, aluminum shutters, plywood shutters or no shutters at all.

Don Meyler Inspections (the company that did the Associations' reports) will offer to our Century Village-WPB unit owners for \$75 each — as long as at least 10 unit owners schedule an inspection at the same time. If less than 10 at one time, the inspections cost \$125 each.

Don Meyler's phone number is 800-469-0434. They work Monday-Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. and Saturday from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

Don Foster of SDS Construction can do Mitigation Inspections for \$25 per apartment. Their phone number is 786-488-5320. The reason for individual inspection is the need for the description of the shutters in each unit.

In the past, as Plastridge has advised, they had provided the old MIT-5 forms to some of the unit owners and Plastridge had not heard any negative feedback, when providing the copies of all Wind Mitigation Forms — MIT-5 to UCO Office. Things have changed after July 2007, when the new Universal Form was introduced.

We have the name of other inspection firms that we can provide. We do not endorse any of them, but believe they are all licensed and acceptable inspectors. Let me know if you wish these names. Each unit can look for his own licensed inspectors.

We strongly suggest that you check with your Homeowners' Insurance Company what percentage of reduction you get to justify the cost of the new report. Be advised that the reduction will carry to the renewals of future premiums.



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
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## Basic Disaster Supply Kit

Everyone needs to prepare for emergency situations, but shopping can be expensive and strenuous. Shopping for items a little at a time before an event can reduce the stress of recovery by avoiding long lines and empty shelves.

#### Food:

- 1 gallon of water\* per person per day for at least 5 days, for drinking and sanitation
- Sandwich bread (freeze until needed)
- 2 cans of ready to eat soup
- 1 box of crackers and/or granola bars
- Dry cereal/Pop Tarts
- 4 cans of fruit (2-4 pack)
- 5 cans of meat (tuna, chicken, Vienna sausages, corn beef hash)
- 4 cans of vegetables (beans, baked beans, corn, peas)
- 1 jar of jelly or jam
- 1 jar of peanut butter
- 1 large can of juice (4 pack)
- Instant coffee/tea/powdered drinks
- Powdered or boxed milk
- \* If you choose to use your own storage containers, choose two-liter plastic soft drink bottles — not plastic jugs or cardboard containers that have had milk or juice • 2 rolls of paper towels in them.

Sanitize the bottles by adding a solution of one teaspoon of non-scented liquid chlorine bleach to a quart of water. • Matches/lighter Swish the sanitizing solution • 2 pairs of latex gloves in the bottle so that it touches all surfaces. After sanitizing the bottle, thoroughly rinse out the sanitizing solution with clean water.

Fill the bottle to the top with regular tap water. If needed, add two drops of non-scented bleach to the water. Tightly close the container with the • Oxygen original cap. Be careful not to contaminate the cap by touching the inside with your fingers. Place a date on the outside of the bottle — replace every six months.

#### **Storage:**

- Large plastic zip-lock bags
- Plastic wrap
- Aluminum foil
- Assorted plastic containers with lids
- Heavy duty garbage bags
- Waterproof portable container with lid (to store disaster supplies)

### **Other Supplies:**

- Paper plates
- Plastic or paper cups
- Plastic eating utensils
- Tissues
- 4 rolls of toilet paper

- Liquid dish soap
- Mosquito repellent
- Sunscreen

- Broom, mop and bucket
- Unscented liquid bleach

### Health:

- 1 bottle of shampoo
- 1 box hand sanitizer wipes
- 1 tube of toothpaste
- Deodorant
- Extra supply of prescrip-
- Contact lens solution
- Extra pair of glasses
- Extra hearing aid batteries
- Items for denture care

#### First Aid:

- Antiseptic
- Anti-diarrhea medicine
- Aspirin and/or acetaminophen
- Adult vitamins (if needed)
- Hydrogen peroxide
- Band-Aids (assorted sizes)
- Roll of gauze or bandages
- First aid tape
- Petroleum jelly
- Rubbing alcohol
- Tweezers

### **Your Property:**

Before hurricane season, make a complete inventory of your valuables and personal property. Take a photo inventory and mail a copy to your out-of-town contact. This will be very important should you need to make an insurance claim.

Be sure you put all your important papers together in a waterproof bag or plastic container: Photocopies of credit cards, insurance and Social Security cards. Don't forget your insurance properties and other documents, such as birth and marriage certificates, three years of your IRS returns, mortgage, and wills, to name a few.

### **Other Disaster Supplies:**

- Battery powered lantern
- Battery powered radio
- Flashlight(s)
- Extra batteries (correct
- Extra flashlight bulbs
- Portable camp stove or grill — do not use inside
- Fuel for stove and grill
- Video or disposable camera
- Fire extinguisher know where it is in your building
- Extra change of clothes

### **Special Needs Shelter:**

The county special needs shelter only accepts residents with a physical condition requiring medical or nursing care.

Need nursing assistance with medications or medical care assistance

- Monitoring vital signs or medical condition or activities of daily living, but do not require hospitalization
- Need constant electrical power for medical equipment Pre-registration is required

for individuals needing to use the special needs shelter.

#### **Have Patience**

Damage after a hurricane is unpredictable. It can take several days — this is why you need supplies for at least five days, preferable to have 7-10 days of supplies. In some cases, it can take several days to restore power, phone, water and cable television. You should have a landline phone — cell and portable phones may not work.

Prepare. Plan ahead.

Ask your neighbor from upstairs to join you and keep you company. Don't forget your out-of-state contact. □

#### **Hot Water Tanks**

Several times per week, we get calls asking, "How can we tell if our hot water tank is going to leak?" The answer is generally — there is no way to tell. There are tanks in the Village over thirty years old that look almost brand new when you look at them. There are relatively new tanks that have rust marks all over them, but do not leak.

Many tanks begin to leak from the inside first, so that outward appearances can be deceiving. However, as a general rule, the newer the tank, the less likely it will leak.

Another question is "How can I find out how old my tank is?" That is not easy to do. Some manufacturers can give you the date the tank was manufactured if you can give them the model and serial number on the tank. Since

many of the tanks are under the kitchen counters, this is a difficult task. Most people tell us that they are not interested in when it was manufactured, but when it was installed in their units. Most of the time, this information is not available, especially if a unit has been resold one or more times.

Fortunately, tanks normally begin to leak, so that there is some evidence of a water leak. Unfortunately, there are cases when a tank just breaks and floods a unit.

There is some new technology available right now that connects to the water inlet valve that automatically shuts off the water flow to the tank if it starts to leak. The cost of this item is in the \$300 range. There are also some cheaper "leak detection devices" that will alert you to a beginning water leak if placed by the

tank itself.

We continue to look at new technology that might be able to predict if a tank is going to fail. We did get a man to the moon, so perhaps we can find a way to predict when a hot water tank will go. Hope springs eternal. □

### Recipes Avis Blank



### I would like to share a recent experience with you.

As you all know, the Rx on a doctor's prescription pad means "recipe." The pharmacist dispenses the medicine recipe as per the doctor's instructions.

A few days ago as I read the label of a new prescription, I realized that I could not follow the instructions. Typed on the label was "take 30 ML three times a day." "Woe is me," I didn't know what ML meant as I was only familiar with oz., tbs., tsp. and cups. A quick telephone call to the pharmacy solved the problem.

The next day, I shopped high and low in many stores before I finally found a set of measuring cups and spoons that were marked in MLs. For your convenience, I have listed a ML conversion chart and a recipe for cherries using a ML measurement for one of the ingredients. See if you can convert the ML measurement (correct answer is below) and cook the most delicious dessert that can either be eaten four hours after preparation or saved in jars to be used for the Thanksgiving, Christmas or New Year holidays.

Note: a ML is a mililiter.

### **ML Conversion Chart**

- 1/2 tsp. = 2.5 ML
- 1 tsp. = 5 ML
- 1/2 tbs. = 7.5 ML
- 1 tbs. = 15 ML
- 1/8 cup = 30 ML
- 1/4 cup = 60 ML
- 1/2 cup = 125 ML



• 1 cup = 250 ML

### Cherries in Red Wine

Prep 5 minutes plus chilling. Cook 10 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

- 500 ML\* dry red wine, such as Chianti
- 1/2 c. sugar
- 2 strips orange peel (3" by 1" each)
- 1 (3-in.) stick cinnamon
- 1-1/2 lbs. dark sweet cherries, stems on

- 1 In covered 4-quart saucepan, heat wine, sugar, orange peel, and cinnamon to boiling over medium-high heat. Boil 5 minutes. Cool to room temperature.
- 2 Place cherries in bowl or storage container with tightfitting lid. Pour wine mixture over cherries. Cover and refrigerate at least 4 hours or up to 2 days.
- 3 To serve, ladle cherries with wine into cups or dessert bowls. After eating cherries, you can drink the wine!

**Each serving**: About 155 calories, 1 g protein, 34 g carbohydrate, 1 g total fat (0 g saturated), 2 g fiber, 0 g cholesterol, 6 g sodium.

He has been found guilty, along with his brother, of raping and murdering a child. Paget believes he is innocent. His only statement has been "I didn't do that little girl."


Her appeals will be based on three claims — his brother's 11th hour confession professing Rennell's innocence, her belief that Rennell is retarded and therefore not subject to the death penalty under case law from the United States Supreme Court and that he received inadequate legal

representation as his trial attorney was a cocaine addict who offered no defense on his behalf.

Patterson is obviously against the death penalty as he presents our legal system as not nearly perfect. With this book, he educates us on the inner workings of the circuit courts, the California Supreme Court and especially, the United States Supreme Court. This plot is intertwined with subplots that are not necessary, yet it takes us on a difficult journey whereby the procedure becomes more important than the guilt or innocence of the defendant.

The author illuminates as well as entertains. This story. though fiction, is a work of social commentary. I feel this book is a fine offering that is intriguing and engaging and is a wonderful treatise on the death penalty.

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Stamps in the News Syd Kronish



All Americans are proud of our historic landmarks wherever they may be located. Every state has its special ones. Many colleges, universities and national parks have designated landmarks recognized by the U.S. as well as countries throughout the world.

These beautiful locations are considered as landmarks because they are icons of ideas that have shaped this nation.

Two such landmarks, Hoover Dam and Mount Rushmore, are honored by the U.S. Postal Service with the issuance of new stamps to be released this June.

A 2008 express mail shows Hoover Dam. Named for former President Herbert C. Hoover in 1931, the Dam is a civil engineering wonder and national historic landmark on the Arizona/Nevada border about 30 miles southeast of Las Vegas.

Measuring 726.34 feet from its foundation rock in a Colorado River canyon to the roadway at its crest, Hoover Dam is the nation's tallest concrete dam. It was the tallest dam ever built when completed in 1936. It attracts over seven million visitors from around the world every year, helping the vast tourism of the Las Vegas and Arizona economies.

The beauty and history of the Dam has created a gigantic reservoir of Lake Mead, a water recreation wonderland.

The painting on the new stamp displays a view looking upstream, with Nevada on the left and Arizona on the right. At the base of the Dam is the power plant. In the foreground, water flows from outlet works in the canyon's walls. Behind the Dam is the beautiful Lake Mead.

The 2008 Priority Mail stamp features an illustration of the Mount Rushmore National Memorial, which is located in the Black Hills of South Dakota, near the town of Keystone. Carved into Mount Rushmore itself, the monument consists of large

scale sculptures of the faces of four American Presidents — George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt. The monument was intended "to commemorate the founding, expansion, preservation and unification of the U.S."

The sculptor for this edifice was John de la Mothe-Borglum, who selected Mount Rushmore, a granite mountain named for a New York attorney who had visited the Black Hills in 1885.

Work on the memorial began on August 10, 1927, when President Calvin Coolidge was present for the first ceremonial drilling.

Between 1927 and 1941, the workers created the monument. The four sculptural portrays were dedicated separately — Washington in 1930, Lincoln in 1937, Jefferson in 1939 and Roosevelt in the same year.

Mount Rushmore was officially completed on October 31, 1941. Because Gutzon Borglom had died earlier that year, the final drilling was overseen by his son, Lincoln Borglom.

The Hoover Express Mail stamp and the Mount Rushmore Priority Mail stamp will be available in post offices as well by calling 1-800-STAMP-24 on June 12. □

The crowd of more than 2,000 left CityPlace shortly after 6:00 p.m. and paraded to Clematis Street, meeting others who were already at the Meyer Amphitheater. Chairs had been set up, and vendors were waiting.

The food, while I'm sure was delicious, was provided by two caterers, but we had to stand in line, unfortunately. Given a choice between sitting in a reserved seat down front, or standing

in line, we split up and took turns (a) holding the seats or (b) waiting to order food. (a) won, hands down, even though we spent 45 minutes on (b).

Then there was the ceremonial candle lighting, which is what you expect at a 60<sup>th</sup> birthday party. We cheated — there were only six candles, one of which was lit by a soldier in the Israel Defense Force. Oh! Now you remember what the party was all about! Yes, it was the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the date (1948) when Israel became an independent state.

Music was provided by an exceptional group of Israeli singers and dancers, and we sat mesmerized for more than an hour, listening and watching in awe. The amount of energy was unbelievable, and the costume changes were accomplished at a frenzied pace. After we all stood to sing Hatikvah there were fireworks. The event ended promptly at 9:30, as advertised, and we had enough leftover enthusiasm so that the mile walk back to our car was totally lighthearted, not an effort at all.

Since you missed this party, be sure to mark your calendar for the 70<sup>th</sup> — it should be even more fantastic, and you surely don't want to miss it. □

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



### **April 8, 2007**

With more unit owners installing hurricane shutters, changing their windows and doors to hurricane-resistant strength — it is recommended that Associations add new rules and regulations to documents describing the type and color of hurricane shutters that can be installed.

I recommend the type of hurricane windows and doors that would be acceptable to the Association be put into their documents. This will keep the building looking uniform.

Remember, from now on, all windows and doors that are installed must be hurricaneresistant and carry a Florida or Miami-Dade hurricane stamp of approval and must have a permit. The same goes for anyone who is looking to install or rebuild a patio. They must have an engineer draw up the specifications to meet current hurricane codes.

You will need permits, and the work must be done by a licensed contractor who can make all the arrangements in getting an engineer and obtaining the necessary permits. Remember, never hire a worker or contractor without seeing his license and insurance coverage, and above all, never pay any money in full until the work has passed code inspection and is properly finished. I suggest paying no more then 25% to 50% down and then 50% when the job is finished.

Our first guest speakers were Marc Rosenberg, Esq., and Mark Bogus, Esq. These two gentlemen came to lecture Century Village on the time limit that everyone in the state of Florida faces about placing any additional insurance claims they may have with regards to the past three hurricanes we had in Florida. Marc Rosenberg advised all the Association Presidents and Board Members, that they have only until June 1, 2008, to file any hurricane related claims, to their condo's insurance company. Mark Bogus described how they were acting as Public Adjusters and will help any Century Village Condominium Association who may still have some hur-

ricane damage, file a new claim to collect any monies that are due them.

Our next guest was Mr. Paul Van Tongeren, who owns a roofing company which is offering a free white electrometric coating for flat roofs. This is a great product with many advantages: It reflects back most of the heat of the sun; it saves the cost of electricity in a building; it also seals the roof, preventing leaks, and above all, it's free.

There are some qualifications: The roof must be in good condition (meaning no tears, no obvious leaks, and not falling apart); the roofs must not have any pebbles on the surface. If the roof meets these qualifications, it first must be inspected by Mr. Tongeren's company. If it passes his inspection, Florida Power and Light will inspect the roof. If the roof passes both inspections, the Association will receive the Electrometric coating free of charge. If any Association is having problems with any of the quotes or proposals from Mr. Tongeren's company, please see me, I have another source.

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### **Wexler Takes Risk with World Jewry**

U.S. Rep. Robert Wexler, the media-described "top Jewish proxy" for Barack Obama's campaign, has been trying to explain Obama's statements about meeting with Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad. In the past, Wexler has independently recommended meeting with Iran on these issues.

Wexler's attempt to soften Obama's position on dealing with the Muslim nation and Israel is troublesome. Wexler's attempt to sway the Jewish community with his soft interpretation of Obama's statement is an abomination.

It is clear from many of Obama's speeches that he regards good relations with worldwide Muslims as a priority. Obama also says he is committed to Israel's security "as one of the important countries in the Middle East." Obama fails, however, to explain the extent of the compromise he is willing to make and how he would exert pressure to reach that compromise. By describing Israel as equally important to other Middle Eastern nations, he downgrades the special relationship the U.S. has with Israel which is to keep it technologically and militarily superior to its hostile neighbors.

Wexler has embraced some of Israel's enemies such as past Palestinian National Authority President Yasser Arafat and has supported major sanctions on behalf of the Israelis in negotiations.

Wexler should clarify his statements as his own opinions. He should disclose his political conflict of interest in the Obama campaign.

Obama's position is in my opinion a degradation of the special relationship Israel has with the U.S. Any downgrade in policy will embolden Israel's enemies and worldwide anti-Semitism. The United States is the strongest and best ally of Israel. Any attempt to weaken that relationship would be disastrous and permanent. Wexler should not take risks with the safety of the World's Jewry. I, Ben Graber, would never take such a chance; Robert Wexler obviously will.

"Many among us, and not only those of the Jewish Faith, remember the horrors perpetrated by a people thought of as among the most sophisticated in their era against others who, for generations, lived in their midst: the Holocaust."

For most, this is an annual day of remembrance: "Holocaust Day" or "Yom Hashoah." For others, and their number is less from year to year, it is another day within a year's three hundred sixty five days during which they mourn, daily, the tragic death of their loved ones.

What was the most tragic event in our lives remains as fresh in our memory as though it happened yesterday. All we are able to do is, by pushing it back, we use it as some kind of a defense mechanism, so that we may be able to function — but it never leaves us.

All that civilized people can do is make sure that such horror does not recur. "Never again" we say — and then we make believe, as though saying that is enough, as though what happened since (and is still happening — in various places on Earth, such as Darfur) is none of our concern. We pay lip service; we commiserate with the poor victims of unbelievable atrocities and we continue with our lives, only mourning our own dead, as though people subjected to these horrors are not part of the human race are not our brothers and sisters.

We condone "little holocausts" by ignoring other people's suffering. We agree to waging wars resulting in thousands upon thousands of dead, always finding an appropriate excuse. "The other side started it." We only defend ourselves — and while we were against it, we did not actively oppose it. We only passively stand by, just voicing our distress.

But in the final analysis, we all are coconspirators in what goes on anywhere on this earth.

So, on this day of somber remembrance, when my people mourn the horrible death of a generation, let us admit that the "never again" occurred, again and again, and we did nothing to stop it.

### As I See It

I am going to interject something into the decisionmaking process in this campaign circle which I hoped would not be necessary: I refer to prejudice.

I am concerned that prejudice is rather widespread. So many among us contemplate deciding — not whom to vote for, but rather who *not* to vote for — not because they do not like where a specific candidate stands with regards to the war in Iraq, or the recession or whatever else. No: There is an undercurrent which clearly indicates that prejudice is alive and well and flourishing.

No one challenged for prejudice will admit that he/ she dislikes a candidate because of race, gender or religion. That would be too crass. They find excuses.

istence of Israel, which is a military-nuclear superpower in the Middle East and America's only true ally in that area.

What I said about U.S. Presidents holds equally true with regard to those who wish to become President.

If there are any people on the face of this earth who for thousands of years have suffered from prejudicial discrimination, it is we Jews. How can we, who suffered all through history, everywhere, not excluding this country, "do unto others" what we were — and are — subjected to? We should have a clear understanding what a candidate's stand is on matters of the utmost importance to this country, regardless of age, gender or race.

There are some among us who contemplate expressing their prejudice by staying home and not voting.

In so many places in the world, people fight — and die — for the right to vote. We are lucky — we have that right, but it is not just a right, it is an obligation. □



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### **Knowing and Reducing Your** Risks for Stroke

(NAPSI) — You can protect yourself from stroke. That's just as well, considering every 45 seconds, someone in the U.S. has one. It kills about 160,000 people a year, mostly women; annually, about 40,000 more women than men have strokes and over 60 percent of all stroke deaths occur in women.

It's important to know the risk factors, some of which are preventable and controllable, and to recognize the symptoms so that many of the serious side effects can be avoided.

Blood Pressure: According to the American Heart Association, high blood pressure is the number one controllable risk factor for stroke. Family history and obesity factor in developing high blood pressure and women who take birth control pills or have reached menopause are at higher risk. A healthy lifestyle helps but for many, medications are required.

Cholesterol: High levels of "bad" low-density lipoprotein (LDL) cholesterol raise the risk of heart disease and stroke; high levels of "good" high-density lipoprotein (HDL) cholesterol lower it. Studies show women's cholesterol is higher than men's from age 45 on and that low levels of HDL cholesterol seem to be a stronger risk factor for women.

Diabetes: Diabetes is associated with high blood pressure and interferes with the ability to break down clots, increasing the risk of ischemic stroke. Lifestyle modifications and medications can help.

Diet and Exercise: Thirty minutes a day of moderate-tovigorous physical activity can help prevent heart and blood vessel disease and control blood cholesterol, diabetes and obesity, as well as lower blood pressure. People with excess body fat — especially around the waist — are more likely to develop heart disease and stroke. Eat healthy foods low in saturated fat, cholesterol and sodium.

Smoking and Drinking: Smokers and those exposed to smoke daily are at a greater risk for stroke. Excessive alcohol intake can contribute to

high blood pressure.

Stroke Symptoms: It's vital

to recognize the symptoms of stroke and to seek help immediately. Time is of the essence when it comes to preventing debilitating and long-lasting effects. Symptoms include sudden numbness or weakness of the face, arm or leg, especially on one side of the body; sudden confusion, trouble speaking or understanding; sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes; sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination, or a sudden, severe headache with no known cause.

"But mom, I gave him a bath!" were Sammy's last words before getting grounded.





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On November 18, 1995, Itzhak Perlman, the violinist, came on stage to give a concert at Avery Fisher Hall at Lincoln Center in New York City. If you have ever been to a Perlman concert, you know that getting on stage is no small achievement for him.

He was stricken with polio as a child, and so he has braces on both legs and walks with the aid of two crutches. To see him walk across the stage one step at a time, painfully and slowly, is an awesome sight.

He walks painfully, yet majestically, until he reaches his chair. Then he sits down, slowly, puts his crutches on the floor, undoes the clasps on his legs, tucks one foot back and extends the other foot forward. Then he bends down and picks up the violin, puts it under his chin, nods to the conductor and proceeds to play.

By now, the audience is used to this ritual. They s it quietly while he makes his way across the stage to his chair. They remain reverently silent while he undoes the clasps on his legs. They wait until he is ready to play.

But this time, something went wrong. Just as he finished the first few bars, one of the strings on his violin broke. You could hear it snap — it went off like gunfire across the room. There was no mistaking what that sound meant.

There was no mistaking what he had to do. We figured that he would have to get up, put on the clasps again, pick up the crutches and limp his way off stage — to either find another violin or else find another string for this one. But he didn't. Instead, he waited a moment, closed his eyes and then signaled the conductor to begin again.

The orchestra began, and he played from where he had left off. And he played with such passion and such power and such purity as they had never heard before.

Of course, anyone kn ows that it is impossible to play a symphonic work with just three strings. I know that, and you know that, but that night Itzhak Perlman refused to know that.

You could see him modulating, changing, re-composing

the piece in his head.

At one point, it sounded like he was de-tuning the strings to get new sounds from them that they had never made before. When he finished, there was an awesome silence in the room. And then people rose and cheered.

There was an extraordinary outburst of applause from every corner of the auditorium. We were all on our feet, screaming and cheering, doing everything we could to show how much we appreciated what he had done.


He smiled, wiped the sweat from this brow, raised his bow to quiet us, and then he said — not boastfully, but in a quiet, pensive, reverent tone — "You know, sometimes it is the artist's task to find out how much music you can still make with what you have left."

What a powerful line that is.


It has stayed in my mind ever since I heard it. And who knows? Perhaps that is the definition of life — not just for artists but for all of us. Here is a man who has prepared all his life to make music on a violin of four strings, who, all of a sudden, in the middle of a concert, finds himself with only three strings; so he makes music with three strings, and the music he made that night with just three strings was more beautiful, more sacred, more memorable, than any that he had ever made before, when he had four strings.

So, perhaps our task in this shaky, fast-changing, bewildering world in which we live is to make music, at first with all that we have, and then, when that is no longer possible, to make music with what we have left.

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





### **Hotel Key Cards:** The Straight Story

In a previous issue, we reprinted a filler story from the Internet claiming that electromagnetic swipe cards used by hotels not only contain room information, but personal information, and hotels do not erase this information, creating an invitation for identity theft. We have since been informed that this is a false story.

We went on snopes.com, a Web site that specializes in separating truth from fiction, and getting the facts.

From the site's entry: "None of the hotels we contacted (including the Doubletree chain) said they do (or even can) encode personal information on hotel key-cards, nor could any of them offer a plausible explanation of how they would benefit from doing so."

The site quotes a Hilton security expert: "Certainly, modern security systems are sufficiently sophisticated that personal identifying information 'could' be encoded onto hotel card-keys. To do so, however, would be pointless and would create additional work (and expense)."

Snopes continues: "Even in cases where a hotel keycard can be used to purchase goods and services (e.g., at a resort complex such as Walt Disney World), guests' credit card information is not encoded on the cards themselves; the cards simply contain a flag indicating that the guest has a credit card on file with the resort and is authorized to charge purchases to his room."
