From the Desk of President George Loewenstein



The Reporter recently held a tribute to the memory of its long time editor, Irv Lazar, who passed away last month. Sixty-five people attended, including Irv's brother and son, all sharing memories of Irv. The Jewish War Veterans, of which Irv was a member, provided an honor guard.

Election time for UCO officers is drawing close. We will be electing a new President (I cannot seek re-election because I am term limited), two Vice Presidents, a Treasurer, Recording Secretary, and Corresponding Secretary, as well as twenty Executive Board members.

If you wish to seek any of these positions, you can call Roberta Fromkin at 712-0259 before the delegate meeting on February 5th, or be nominated and seconded by a delegate on February 5th. Election will be held between 8 and 9 a.m. on March 5th, with only delegates being able to vote. The elected officers and board members will be installed at a brunch on March 14th at the Marriott Hotel in West Palm Beach. Everyone is invited to attend.

In a few weeks we will be getting new pool furniture for the guest pool in back of the clubhouse. Instead of straps, we have ordered mesh in a tan hue to blend with the color of the walls of the clubhouse.

The Operations committee has authorized WPRF to issue a day pass to guests of residents regardless of where the guest lives. The pass, costing \$3, will enable the holder to use the clubhouse facilities and pools but does exclude the Hastings Fitness Center and Bingo.

January 18th will be the starting date of UCO's bookkeeper (our fifth paid employee), Marilyn Lanflisi. She comes to us with many years of experience and will be a valuable asset in the finance office, allowing the treasurer more time to act in that capacity, overseeing investments, doing financial planning, etc.

Kudos go out to Abby Koffler, the talent scout who books all our shows. Having attended many shows this season, I must say they were all excellent. Some of these same shows also play at the Kravis Center, but at much higher ticket prices. Just one of the perks we enjoy by living in Century Village.

We have just been notified by the company that operated the postal van that they no longer find it profitable to bring its van into the village. They have discontinued their service here. We are trying to see if the Post Office would be in a position to bring their van into our clubhouse. Stay tuned. □

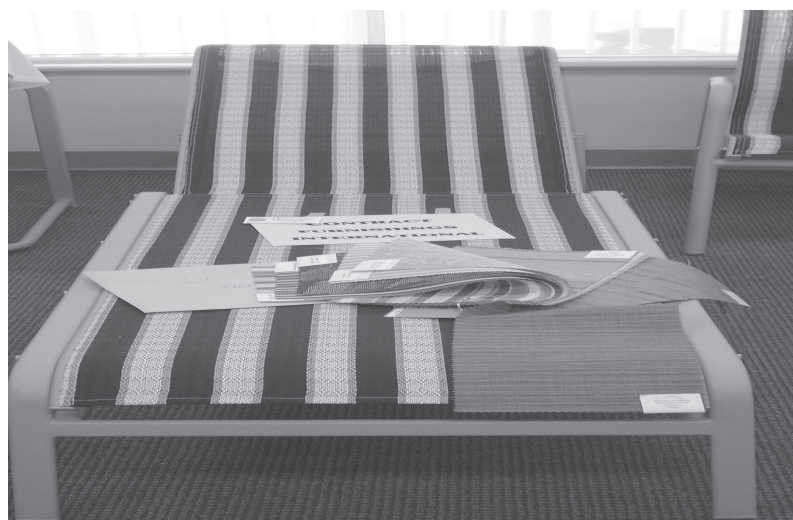

January 8, 2010

OPENED...This meeting was called to order by President George Loewenstein at 9:30 a.m. in our auditorium.

INSURANCE...Dan Gladstone submitted his report.

TRANSPORTATION...Barbara Cornish reported that the Senior Day date is correct. A question re: can we have a bus to the airport? This will be checked out.

MAINTENANCE...There was a question re the potholes on the road to the Wachovia Bank – he referred to the County as this does not belong to C.V.

CHANNEL 63...There will be interesting interviews at 6 p.m. and 7 p.m.

CABLE...Dave Israel said that Comcast has shifted its schedule. Please read his column in the upcoming REPORTER. With regard to the second box for your second TV – see the Comcast schedule. Dave Israel said that if you get a bill bring it to him. We are waiting for a letter ruling on the question of taxes on the entrance fee. See his column re a “John Doe” to sign for absent unit owners. This will be explained in his column in the REPORTER. Re a question regarding HBO – this would cost about \$5.70 per month, and must be voted on and must be a common expense.

CERT...Jackie Karlan reported that the next meeting will be on January 18th – 3 p.m.

REPORTER...Dot Loewenstein reported there was no

phone service to the Fax machine on Thursday and should be ready by Tuesday.

INVESTIGATIONS...Louise Gerson reported that when you live in a building the report is confidential and when you move into another association they want you investigated and you must pay \$100 – we must not use selective enforcement.

MAINTENANCE...Jerry Karpf reported that on February 9th, the Building Dept. will present a program on Codes, etc. and on February 4th – Board members’ responsibilities.

UCO REPORTER...A letter that had been sent to the REPORTER for publication had not been accepted and the writer wanted to know why. Myron Silverman responded that they didn’t have the space available and it could not be consolidated; it will be published when they have the space and time available.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS...Ted Silverman reported on the success of Centenarian Buffet Celebration of 2009 and they have begun to work on the 2010 celebration. Their next meeting will take place on Thursday. We will be kept informed.

A Tribute to
“A Man for All Seasons”
And a Miracle Occurred

A fitting tribute was given to our beloved Irv Lazar on Sunday, January 10. It was a day to remember as a large group of family, friends, and military comrades gathered to bid a final farewell to the late editor in chief of the *UCO Reporter*.

UCO President George Lowenstein, chairman for the occasion, spoke glowingly of Irv and his importance to the village. He was followed by the Honor Guard of Jewish War Veterans Post 520, which presented its official military memorial ceremony. Sam Rosen, commander of the JWV Post, reminded everyone that Irv was a hard working member of the Post, devoted to the concerns of disabled veterans.

From North Carolina came Irv’s brother Norman, and from Pennsylvania, son Ken arrived. Each recalled special moments in their lives. Norman noted his close relationship with Irv during their years together, while Ken spoke of his father’s devotion to the Village. There was, of course, a special mention of his tennis playing.

Other testimonials were given by individuals in the audience, including his Plymouth neighbors, tennis and bowling friends, and working partners on the *Reporter*. The Easton brothers, who print our *Reporter* monthly, recalled their many years with Irv and his initial reluctance to graduate from “cut and paste” to a computerized product.

The miracle referred to above was the unexpected tribute by John Saponaro. John is a whiz at the computer and a cornerstone of the paper. Seeing a shy person, who seldom speaks, walk up to say *more* than a few words had the audience in tears, with their mouths open in total shock. One co-worker for UCO remarked that in the three years we shared space she had never heard him say one word. To top off the day, John greeted everyone as they were leaving, with a handshake. And yes, his face actually glowed.

The memorial remarks and tribute to Irv reminded us of the time that President Abraham Lincoln made his speech at the Gettysburg cemetery. He said “people will little remember what we say here, rather than what they (the soldiers) did.”

We differ when we say with reverence and humility that we in the Village will long remember what was said here, as well as what Irv did here.

Some in attendance inquired about charitable donations in Irv’s honor, and the family suggested the Morse Home. □

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Timely Tax Tips

I would like to remind those of our unit owners who rent their apartments that any lease less than six months and a day is considered a short term rental and subject to both a bed tax of 5% and a sales tax of 6½%, a total of 11½%. Any lease over six months is considered long term and not subject to either tax.

Many of our residents employ aides that they pay directly (not to an agency). Under both Federal and State law, these aides are considered employees. Listed below are the Federal and State requirements:

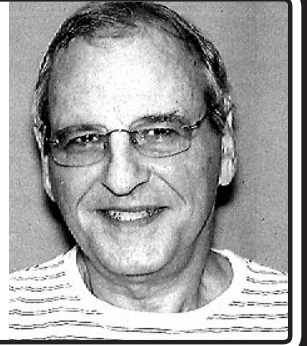
If you paid more than \$1,700 to any one aide during 2009 or \$1,000 in any quarter you must pay Social Security of 15.3% (7.65% withheld from the employee and 7.65% your share). This must be remitted on Schedule H that is filed along with your personal income tax return.

The aide may also ask you to withhold income tax, but that is voluntary. You will also be subject to both Federal and Florida Unemployment taxes and file the required Florida unemployment forms and pay the tax. You, as the employer, must also secure proof from your aides that they are legal residents by completing an I-9 form. It is also essential that you apply for an employer identification number from the Internal Revenue Service, which is done by filling out form SS 4 and then the required number can be attained by telephone.

Lastly you must give a W-2 form to your aides at the end of the year, showing the wages and taxes paid. Compliance with the above requirements is essential if you want to deduct your payment to the aides on your income tax return. Further information can be obtained from publication 926 issued by the Internal Revenue Service. □

The installations of new shut-off valves continue successfully. Many Associations have already lined up and are ready for their turn. It is convenient and already being used in some cases where a shut-off is needed urgently. In my building it has been used twice in an emergency as well as a short term absence.

The new budget for the 2010 insurance policies is estimated at 15% higher than last year. It comes after a decline in the premiums in the last four years. The raise is due to a political decision in Tallahassee by the House of Representatives and not so much by the performance of the insurance industry. Our share in the market results are approximately a hike of two

percent, which is not too far from the inflation rate.

The State of Florida is using a Catastrophe Fund to reinsure the insurance companies with cheaper premiums and to make Hurricane coverage more accessible to the public. This fund supposes to have \$30 billion to be able to function properly. As of today, this fund has less than \$3 billion. Most of the funding came from assessments on the existing insurance policies that are issued in the State. Apparently, this is not enough and other measures have to be taken like raising the current premiums. We have been lucky in the past four years, but if G-d forbids and Florida is hit again by storms, the State will have to assess each of us probably through taxes. □

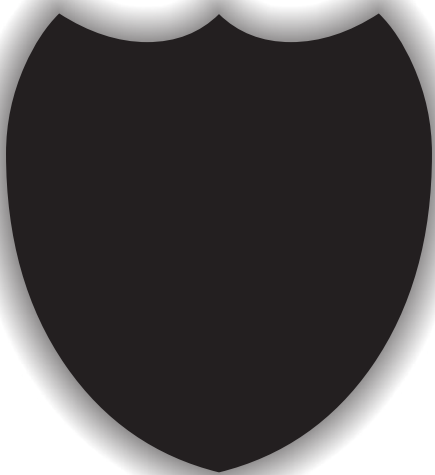
Please come into our office to have your questions answered. We cannot give you information over the phone about pending investigations as everything is confidential.

Our Association board is the only one to make the decision to accept or reject a person when

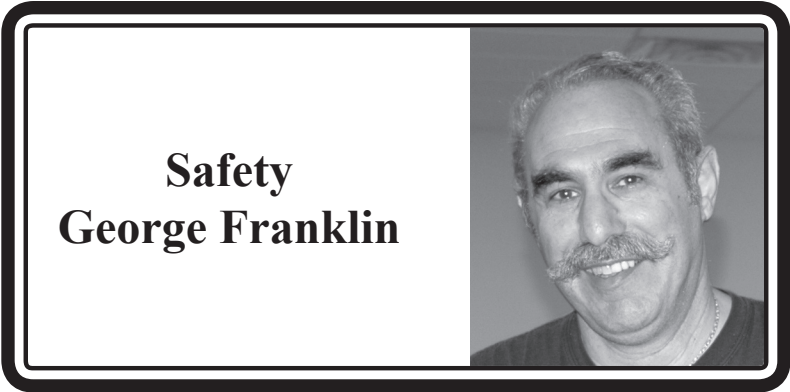
you see from the investigation report that the prospective buyer has a history of delinquent payments and/or a history of criminal wrongdoings.

If you make a decision to reject this person, we can then send it to our attorney for his legal opinion.

This department only does investigations. We gather information and give it to the Association board *only*. **All decisions are made by your board.** We cannot advise you what to do. □

The Flu season is here. We should know the facts. The regular flu is our enemy. The H1N1 Swine Flu at this time is not a major problem. It may mutate and become a problem in the future. The best way to fight it is a Flu shot. In addition we need to avoid the virus. This can be best accomplished by carrying a hand sanitizer. When you touch any smooth flat surface such as the rails on our busses you pick up any viruses left by everyone else that has touched it. A virus can live on a smooth surface for up to two days. It is a common reflex to cough into your hand. You may have noticed when you enter a cruise ship they spray your hands. This is because of the railings. In addition the average adult touches their face 18 times a minute. Try to avoid touching your face.

Every year in the United States, on average:

- 5 to 20 percent of the population get the flu
- More than 200,000 people are hospitalized from flu-related complications
- About 36,000 people die from flu-related causes

Please remember that this is the common Flu

Flu Symptoms and Cold vs. Flu

- Common Symptoms:**
- fever (usually high)
 - tiredness (can be extreme)
 - headache
 - dry cough
 - sore throat

- runny or stuffy nose
 - muscle aches
- These symptoms may occur, but are more likely in children than adults:**

- nausea
- vomiting
- diarrhea

Is it a Cold or the Flu?

Flu and the common cold are both respiratory illnesses, but they are caused by different viruses.

Flu and the common cold have similar symptoms (e.g. fever, sore throat). It can be difficult to tell the difference between them.

Your doctor can give you a flu test within the first few days of your illness to determine whether you have the flu.

In general, the flu is worse than the common cold.

Symptoms such as fever, body aches, extreme tiredness, and dry cough are more common and intense with the flu.

Colds are usually milder than the flu. People with colds are more likely to have a runny or stuffy nose.

Colds generally do not result in serious health problems, such as pneumonia, bacterial infections, or hospitalizations.

H1N1 Swine Flu

The Swine Flu does not appear to be a particular problem at this time. You must get a H1N1 flu shot anyway. The problem is that it may mutate at some point. This could make it a threat to us. Be sure to get your H1N1 flu shot. □

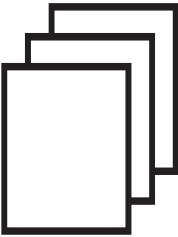
At the Library

On December 18, there was a Town Hall meeting for our residents to meet and hear from several candidates seeking the office of Congressman serving in the U.S. House of Representatives for our district.

The meeting had been publicized for several weeks to be held in the Clubhouse Theatre, a theatre of some 1,200 seats. There were perhaps 30 people that came to listen to the six candidates, one of whom will be their next Congressman.

George Franklin and Ed Black seemingly did their best to assure the candidates that aside from the dismal turnout and the fact they would be addressing a virtually empty room their message would be seen on Channel 63. I cannot say if any of them asked what the viewership of Channel 63 is. One might wonder if any thought the candidates had of Century Village being a major voting force was diminished by today’s fractional turnout.

Most of the presentations both individually and collectively dealt with the issue of health care and, of course, the health care legislation now being considered in Congress. The election will be in February. With supporters of the legislation seeking to have it passed as soon as possible, it might be decided before the successful candidate takes office. Of course there is likely to be future action, proposed or taken, with respect to health care.

Another Update on the Golf Course

As of this writing (January 7, 2010) I have been told by County Code Enforcement that they have been in touch with Andrew Waldman, the owner of the golf course, and the internal fence was installed on the property with a gate that is chained and locked. This fence replaces the one that was removed by Waldman a few months ago. This should prevent anyone from coming through the golf course property into Century Village as long as the gate stays

closed and locked. If anyone notices that the gate has been left open, please let me know and I will follow up again with Code Enforcement. The County advised me that they are not requesting a fence to be installed across the entrance at Haverhill at this time.

I also was in touch with the County Landscape Division of Code Enforcement and supplied them with a legal ruling on the requirement for perpetual maintenance of the entire golf course property, instead of just maintaining 20 feet from the property line. They are taking that under consideration and will advise me shortly.

I also was informed by Code Enforcement that fines were imposed against Waldman for the time that he did not comply with the Magistrate’s ruling.

I have also been in touch with the Sheriff’s Department to ask that they do frequent monitoring of the property to see that “undesirables” have not taken up residence there. They have assured me that they will check. Again, if you see someone on the golf course property other than the workers hired by the owners, please notify the Sheriff’s office to check on the situation.

The Pro-Active Committee of Century Village, in conjunction with UCO, and with the owners of the golf course will be holding another Town Hall Meeting to discuss the golf course. This is for those residents that were unable to attend the October meeting.

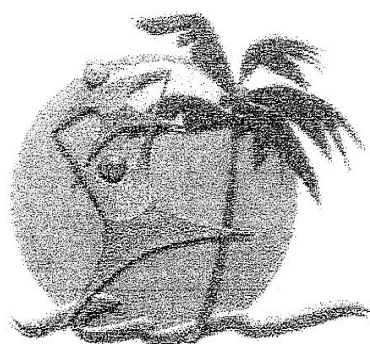

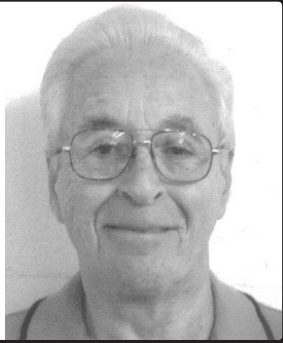

Maintenance Jerry Karpf



Before I start my article, I must state our policy with regard to manufacturers and anyone who lectures at any maintenance meeting:

UCO and the maintenance committee do not endorse or approve of any manufacturers, product, or contractor. All opinions of any lecturer are strictly their own and not those of UCO. This article cannot be used in any legal matter.

I have been getting a number of calls about a comment that was made in the last issue of the *UCO Reporter* regarding the article that Dan Gladstone wrote and used the plumbing term ball cock. It is the floating ball and post in the tank of your toilet which controls the flow of water when the toilet is flushed. When, over time, the ball breaks off due to rusting, water starts to run uncontrollably, causing the tank to flow over and causing much of the water damage that has accrued in many apartments. This part should be checked out at least twice a year. A gentle reminder to all associations to sign up to have the water cutoff valves installed as soon as possible, because our pipes have reached their life expectancy and it should be done before the season is over.

There have been comments about other methods to shut off the water in an apartment. The problem with these methods is that they are flawed because putting a valve at the line by the water heater does not shut down the water pressure in the line to a unit. The next method would have you shutting down five or six valves to shut down the water instead of shutting one valve that is right outside the unit. There was an ad in the paper saying that a person could install a valve by the water tank for a \$20 permit fee. I had called permit dept and was informed that there is no such thing as a \$20 permit to install a valve.

I would like to see a copy of this so-called \$20 permit to install a valve. Anyone who would like to check this info could call Mr. Joe Kajak, the head plumbing inspector at the Building Department. From now on, I am requesting that

the *UCO Reporter* have the advertiser prove any statements that they may make about permit fees or cost of services that they put in any ad.

At present, there are several units that have had water damage and cannot pass inspection because they have tankless water heaters which the building department wants replaced and rewired with a conventional hot water tank. So be warned: If you have any illegal wiring, water devices, fans etc., and they are seen by a building inspector for whatever reason, you may have a big problem and will be liable for a heavy fine.

Attached is a copy of a letter from the Building Department answering several questions I had asked with regard to tankless water heaters. Please pay attention to this letter. It tells you about all the problems with tankless water heaters and how they can possibly start a fire. There is one part of this letter where I wanted clarification. I again contacted Mr. Gathright and asked how a handful of tankless water heaters passed inspection. His answer was that those heaters were of much lower amps and meet code, even though they don't heat water very well. Other tankless water heaters that have been found run on higher amps and will not comply with code because they will produce an extra load on existing wires, which could lead to causing a fire. I ask you, is it worth having one?

At our December 3 meeting, Mr. Bill Raphan, the Ombudsman from the Department of Condominium, Land Sales and Mobile Homes, talked about how elections in Condominium Associations should be conducted in a step by step approach. On Thursday, February 4, he will again be with us, giving a class on responsibilities of board members to an association. Please sign up for this class at the guard station in the clubhouse.

Our next Maintenance Committee meeting will be on Tuesday, February 9 at 10 a.m. in Room C of the clubhouse. This meeting is open to everyone. People from the

RE: Tankless Water Heater Installations in Century Village

Dear Mr. Karpf:

Recently you sent me a letter asking three questions about the installation of tankless water heaters in Century Village. The following are your questions and our answers.

1. "Based on the math that Mr. Karrh supplied to me that an average unit is getting approximately. 100amps of power and this unit uses an average of 75amps. Now when you add a tankless water heater which uses 44 amps which is 19 amps more then the circuits were meant to hold is there is a danger that this could overload your circuits which may burn up the wires and cause a fire?"

Answer:

Yes, the wiring to the original Electric Water Heater was sized and installed to carry the load of that particular water heater. Adding an additional load of 19 amperes to that circuit would create a potential danger of overheating the wiring that could lead to a fire hazard and possible property loss and endangerment of the occupants.

2. "What could happen to a 56 unit building that has at least 20 tankless water heaters in this building that could be on at the same time as when people are washing diner dishes?"

Answer:

If 20, in-line Electric Water Heaters were installed in an existing 56-unit condominium building and all were being used at the same time, an additional load of 380 amperes to that building's electrical service could be expected. This additional load exceeds the design capacity of original building's wiring and service equipment. Overheating of the conductors and service equipment would be the expected result of the additional load. Overheating of these components could lead to a fire hazard and possible property loss and endangerment of the occupants.

3. "Because we have aluminum wires and 40 year old circuit board are our units getting 100 amps of service now. From what has been reported to your office are these tankless water heaters being installed with the right gauge wires and in a safe and proper way?"

Answer:

The typical residential units in Century Village have a properly sized electrical service of 100 amps. If the service equipment for the building and the individual condominium owner's electrical panel are in good working condition, the electrical panels and the conductors are capable of carrying 100 amps. However, while each unit is capable of 100 amps, the electrical load for the entire building is not calculated as 100 amps per unit. The electrical service for the building will be less than 100 amps per unit.

The Building Division has only issued permits and inspected a handful of in-line Electric Water Heaters in Century Village. The installations permitted and inspected comply with the Code. We have been told that individual condominium owners have had in-line Electric Water Heaters installed without obtaining a permit. Installing water heaters without a permit is a violation of the Code. The practice of installing in-line Electric Water Heaters without permits or inspections can create a fire hazard and possible property loss and endangerment of the occupants.

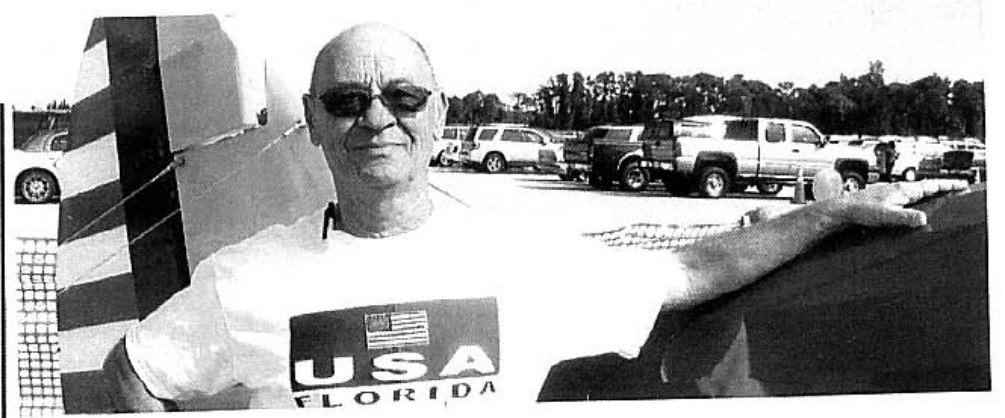

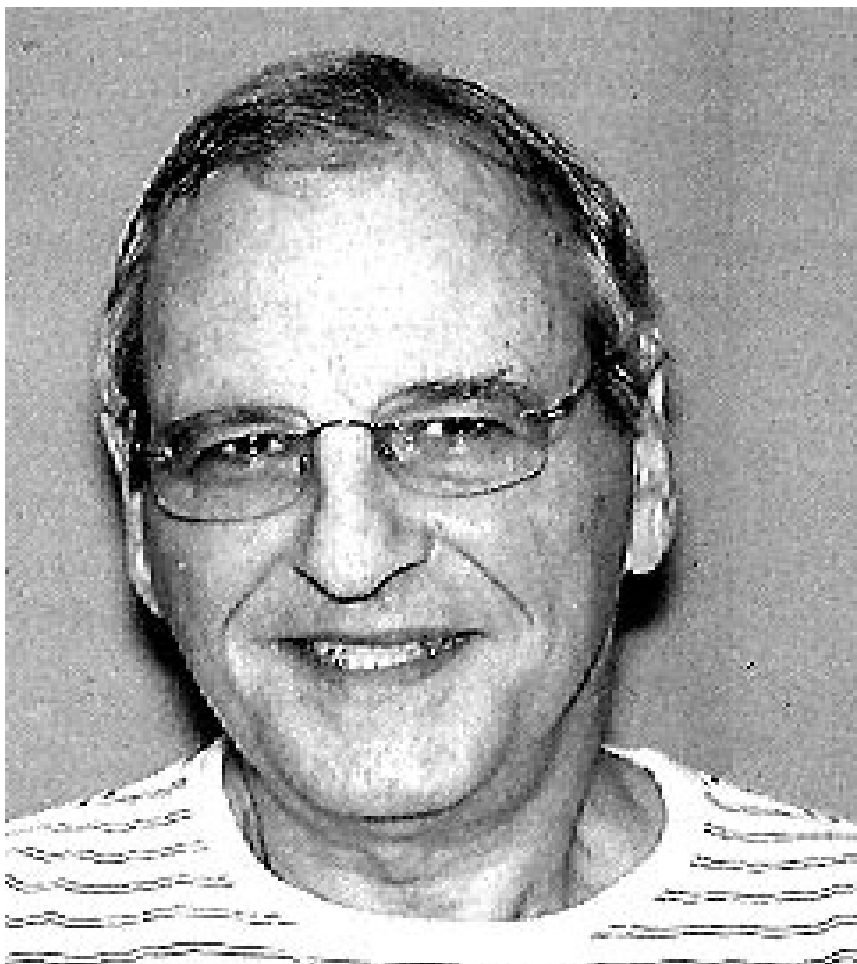

Building a Culture of
Educational Achievement
and a Lifetime of Learning

The State of Florida’s educational system is composed of local school boards, county-administered public schools, private and parochial schools, public and private colleges and universities, and the Florida Department of Education, whose mission is to improve academic achievement from pre-kindergarten through the community college level. When I visit area schools, I am always impressed with the enthusiasm of students in my district and throughout Florida!

The standardized FCAT, currently administered to students in grades 3-11, offers only a snapshot of a student’s ability. House Bill 473, sponsored by Representative Dwight Bullard (D-Miami), calls for replacing the FCAT with comprehensive end-of-year exams. These tests would expand school accountability by focusing on the entirety of a student’s scholastic achievement throughout the year and consider subjects that the FCAT does not, such as civics, geography, world history and the humanities. If Rep. Bullard’s bill becomes law, its reforms would be implemented by the 2014-2015 school year. Here is a snapshot of progress in my district, as well as the future challenges: 65 percent of schools in District 88 are rated as “A” schools; 24 percent are rated as “B;” and 12 percent of schools are rated as “C” schools. Overall, District 88 rates are better than statewide averages. However, I believe we can do better. Schools with poor ratings continue to be punished annually, which is bad for students, for teachers, and for Florida’s future.

As the father of a 17 year-old-daughter, I am concerned with the ever-increasing expense of a college education. Currently, 5,545 students from District 88 are enrolled in higher education under the Florida Prepaid College Plan. This plan offers parents a financially sound and tax-free way to save for college and can be used at 11 public universities and 28 community colleges

throughout Florida. Please visit www.myfloridaprepaid.com for more information or to enroll.

The importance of building a culture of lifelong learning for all Floridians is critical to our future economy. A highly skilled and educated workforce will attract jobs. Our public libraries are a wonderful resource, and Royal Palm Beach just celebrated the grand re-opening of their renovated and expanded branch! Also, the Palm Beach County School District offers adult and community education classes for a nominal fee. Please visit www.pbceducator.net to learn more about these classes, in subjects from finance and computers to English and the arts. □

The Help, Kathryn Stockett’s *New York Times* bestselling debut, is as foreign and unknown to me as was the story of the Chinese “picture bride” in Honolulu. It is the story of a white woman in Mississippi in the 1960s who helps a group of black maids tell their stories.

Stockett writes this book through the eyes of two of the maids, Aibileen and Minny, and Skeeter the proper Southern miss, prosperous, educated and idle. It is told in the first person present tense and brings to life characters that are sympathetic and real. Each of the many relationships between the large cast, from the society women of Jackson to their black “help”, is told with a blend of rage and humor.

The author writes some of the chapters in the speech and dialect of her black women. Not being from the South at that time, I cannot vouch for the accuracy of this depiction.

She certainly describes some of the contradictions of the times though, when violence and hatred were a given, but so were love and compassion on both sides of the story. The characters were fully developed and the story superb. “There is no trickier subject for a writer from the South than that of affection between a black person and a white one in the unequal world of segregation,” wrote Howell Raines.

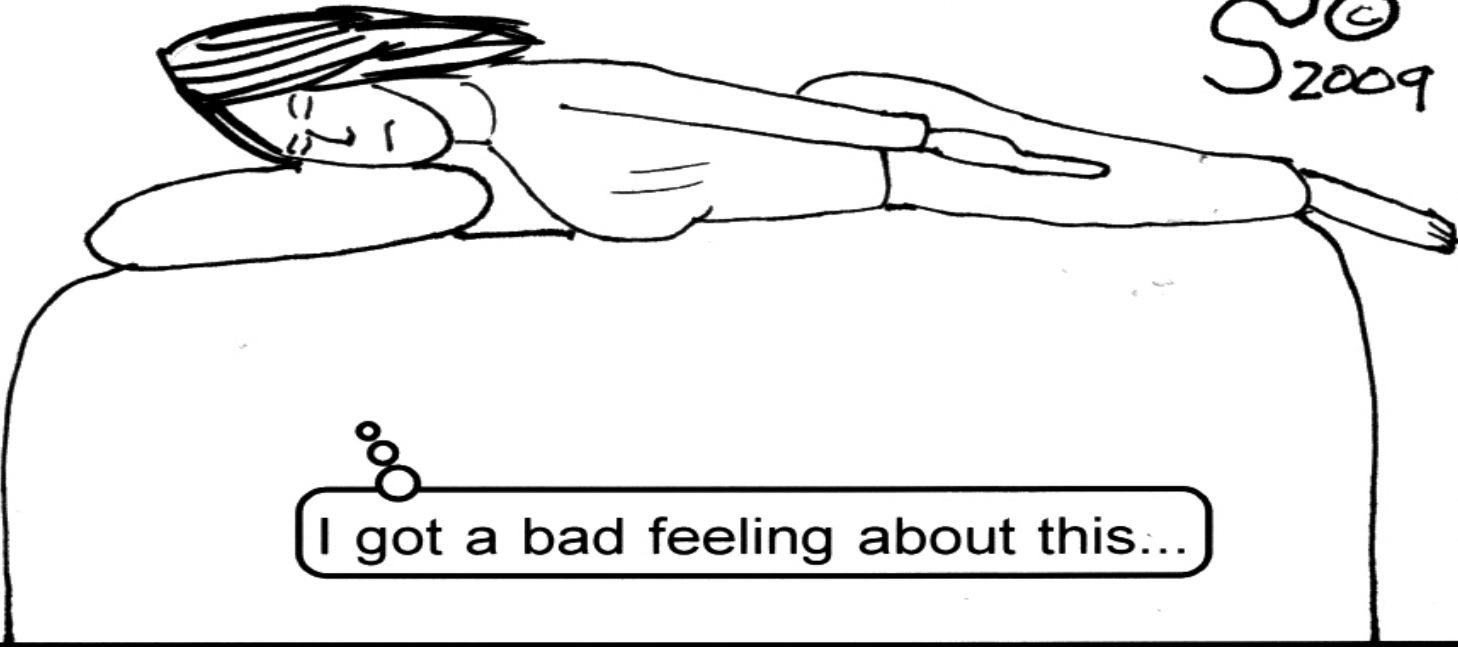
I believe Ms. Stockett showed courage in telling this story of black women who are complex, strong, moral, intelligent, funny, with emotional depth and vulnerability. She also describes some of the white women with all their frailties and “scabs.” She explores the viewpoints of others unlike herself. Whether it is an accurate portrayal only some Southerners can say. *The Help* is surely different from most books you will read. You will laugh, gasp, cheer and cry. □

policy to our Staff Office, ID Office or Administrative Office for clarification.

As reported in one of my earlier articles, some of our residents are still making photocopies of their WPRF ID cards and attempting to use these copies to gain admittance through the gates and/or to WPRF facilities. Whenever a photocopied ID is presented, our guards are instructed to confiscate that photocopy and return it to our ID office. WPRF then maintains a record of those who have chosen to use their own photocopied ID card(s) as part of that resident's permanent record, and repeat offenders will face a period of suspension from WPRF facilities. I strongly urge every resident to refrain from this practice, and simply present the WPRF-issued ID card when requested to do so.

Our staff is hard at work making your WPRF facilities as efficient, clean and well-maintained as possible. Please look for new improvements to our outdoor furniture, the tennis courts and Picnic Island, to name a few, as we work on the 2009-10 budgeted projects.

What's ahead for the 2010 stamp program?

Let's take an exciting look at a few items for 2010 releases by the U.S. Postal Services.

We already reported the stamp hailing the Winter Olympics to be held February 12-28 in Vancouver, B.C. Canada. Featured was an airborne snowboarder against a backdrop of a snow-capped mountain, and is being issued January 22.

The 2010 line-up is an exciting and variable one. A tribute to the revered and popular Mother Teresa, who received the Nobel Peace Prize in 1979 for her humanitarian work with the poor and suffering of various parts of the world is on the agenda. She was named an honorary U.S. citizen in appreciation for her dedication to her lifelong work for the less fortunate.

Sports fans will welcome the recognition of the Negro Baseball League, which operated from 1920-1960. Honored were a group of remarkable athletes ever to play in this sport — but were denied the opportunity to participate in the major leagues, until Jackie Robinson broke the color line with the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1947.

"Cowboys of the Silver Screen" is the title of a set of four stamps honoring a quartet of heroes of the American West in early film roles. The honorees are: William S. Hart, Tom Mix, Gene Autry, and Roy Rogers. Memories of these saddled experts will live forever. These stamps will be released in April.

"Sunday Funnies" shows a stamped pane of cartoon characters — Archie, Beetle Bailey, Dennis the Menace, Garfield, Calvin and Hobbes. Their humorous antics were appreciated by young and old to start off the week with a big laugh. July is the date for this issuance.

Carrying on the funny side is a stamp featuring America's favorite cartoonist of World War II, Bill Mauldin. Bill's work was dedicated to a pair of G.I. soldiers, Willie and Joe, in various funny situations with serious backgrounds. His cartoons were published in the

45th Division newspaper as well as the monthly *Stars and Stripes*.

Two women who gained universal recognition for their performances in the 20th century, Kate Smith and Katherine Hepburn, will be shown on separate stamps this summer.

Kate Smith, the celebrated songstress and entertainer, gained additional fame with her rendition of *God Bless America*, written by Irving Berlin. The song has been called the nation's second national anthem. Katherine Hepburn will receive the 2010 "Legends of Hollywood" honor with a stamp that shows her portrait. Her popularity was welcomed in a variety of roles in 40 films, many with Spencer Tracy, her co-star.

We will be informing you in greater detail about these stamps as well as many others on the 2010 schedule. □

Theater Review: *Copenhagen* at Palm Beach Dramaworks

Michael Frayn's award-winning drama, *Copenhagen*, is surely one of the most intellectually stimulating and challenging plays I have ever seen. And the acting at **Palm Beach Dramaworks** in West Palm Beach, where it runs through January 31, would seem to be peerless.

At the outset, the playwright establishes the fact the three onstage characters are dead. But the play is based on an actual historical event that took place in Copenhagen, Denmark, in 1941, when physicist Niels Bohr and his wife Margrethe welcomed to their home another physicist, Werner Heisenberg, a German Jew. This was during World War Two, when Denmark was occupied by Nazi Germany. Both the Western Allies, notably the United States and the United Kingdom, were searching for weapons that would defeat the other side, searching for answers that ultimately would lead to the development of the atomic bomb.

What renders the play brilliant is the manner in which Mr. Frayn interweaves opposing physics theories and the personalities of complex human beings who have conflicting ideas of patriotism and moral responsibility into one engrossing story. The two men once worked in collaboration. But now, why is the German visiting the Dane? What did he hope to gain from his friend? Or are they, were they ever truly friends? And when the Second World War has ended — for the play carries them along through the development of the Bomb and beyond — how do they look back upon what they have wrought? Along the way, there is abundant discussion of quantum physics, wave theory and the

plight of people just struggling to stay alive.

Obviously, this is a play for sophisticated audiences. Yet everyone can marvel at the cast. Colin McPhillamy as Niels Bohr and Christopher Oden as Werner Heisenberg actually appear to be the two men they portray onstage. Both are worthy of Carbonell Awards as Best Actor, the highest award South Florida bestows on performers. Elizabeth Dimon has a relatively small role here, acting as a kind of buffer between the men. But then again, Ms. Dimon has already received a number of Carbonells. J. Barry Lewis' direction is a marvel of minimalism. Three chairs and two columns are all that are onstage besides the actors, yet Mr. Lewis keeps the people constantly yet unobtrusively moving, creating the effect of both intimacy and distance. Kudos to the entire technical crew.

If the subject matter even remotely appeals to you, see this. You'll think about it for a long time to come, which is not true of all theatrical experiences. (For tickets and additional information, telephone 514-4042 or online: www.palmbeachdramaworks.org.)

I do have a cautionary note to add: On the night I attended this performance, I and perhaps thirteen or fourteen other people parked in a corner lot virtually next door to the theater. No attendant was on duty. When we emerged from the theater, we found that our car had been booted, blocks put on the front wheels so we could not move the vehicles. Someone came to take off the blocks enabling us to drive away, but that little bit of nasty business cost each of us \$65. Apparently, the theater has passes of one kind or another to bypass this problem. Ask at the box office. □

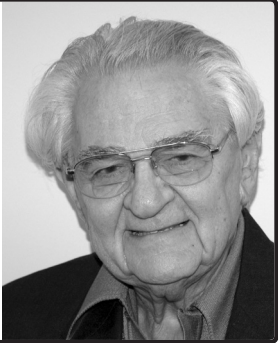

**How Moses Shaped
America**

An article, thus headlined in a recent issue of *Time Magazine*, grabbed my attention. Since that article is much too long to reprint in the *UCO Reporter*, I shall try to give you the highlights of this amazing, thoughtful description of Moses' influence upon affairs in our country.

The Moses story opens in the 13th century B.C.E. with Israelites enslaved in Egypt. At Pharaoh's order, all Israelites' male babies were to be slaughtered. We all know how Moses was saved by Pharaoh's daughter and raised by her.

When Moses killed an Egyptian for beating "one of Moses' kinsmen," he had to flee into the desert, where he was told by a voice in a burning bush to free the Israelites. This was his first test of leadership: live an unburdened life at Pharaoh's court, or free his people from slavery — he chose the latter.

The pilgrims accepted Moses as a role model. They described themselves as the "chosen people fleeing from Pharaoh," and at Cape Cod, they thanked God for letting them pass through the fiery Red Sea.

At the time of the Revolution, the two best selling books of 1776 featured Moses. (Thomas Paine, in *Common Sense*, called King George "the hardened, sullen tempered

Pharaoh.") The Moses image was so pervasive, that on July 4, after signing the Declaration of Independence, Congress asked Jefferson, Franklin and John Adams to propose a seal for the United States. Their recommendation: Moses leading the Israelites through the Red Sea as the water overwhelms the Pharaoh. In their eyes, Moses was America's true founding father.

After the Revolution, Americans faced chaos, but George Washington led the colonists to victory, then presided over the drafting of the Constitution. The parallel — the chaos here and the period of lawlessness of the Israelites in the desert — was not lost. Two-thirds of the eulogies at Washington's death compared the "healer and father of the American nation" to the "first conductor of the Jewish nation." During the Civil war, both sides cited Biblical passages, some to attack slavery, some to defend it.

It took America's most Bible-quoting President to reunite the country when Lincoln died; he, like Washington before him, was compared to Moses. "There is no historic figure more noble than that of the Jewish law-giver," read one eulogy.

Lincoln's assassination invited an even more long-lasting tribute to Moses: the Statue of Liberty given by

the French to honor the slain President. The goddess of liberty was enhanced by two icons from Moses: the nimbus of light around the head and the tablet in her arms, both from the moment Moses descended Mount Sinai with the Ten Commandments.

To modern Americans, Moses' heartbreak ensures his ongoing appeal. He is denied entry to the Promised Land. Martin Luther King Jr. likened the U.S. Supreme Court to Moses for "splitting the Red Sea of segregation," but he also knew that his dream will not be fulfilled while he was still alive. "I have seen the Promised Land, but I may not get there with you."

What can President Obama learn from a figure that his predecessor was so involved with? In 2007, he said: "We are in the presence of a lot of Moses," surrounded by civil rights pioneers, but he reminded all, while thanking the "Moses generation," that "Joshua still had to do a job."

Moses' life was not without enemies. The Bible mentions a dozen rebellions. Israelites even question his birthright: "Who made you leader over us?" Sound familiar these days?

Obama is fighting hard for what he believes in. He should remember that Moses confronted his final choice: "I have put before you this day life and prosperity or death and adversity." These words may be the most trying lesson of leadership. You may fail, but your legacy is to prepare your followers to succeed without you, so persevere and do not be surprised if you do not reach your goal. For the true definition is not this year, but next, 2010 (and even 2012?). □

- pepper — Garnish with pepper and oregano. Bake for 9 minutes.
- oregano — The cheese will be melted and the tomato roasted.

You can also add sautéed onions, leeks or meat to make it more of a sandwich or pizza. □
