IN A NUTSHELL

Explained: WPRF, the Long-Term Lease, the Millennium Agreement, the **Operations Committee**

HAVE YOU EVER WONDERED WHAT THOSE CHECKS YOU WRITE EVERY MONTH, PAYABLE TO WPRF, ARE ALL ABOUT? Many of our unit owners have asked me and asked others in UCO what exactly these funds are used for.

Let me first call your attention to this: The monthly checks, as you all well know, are in the approximate amount of \$100 — some a bit less, some a bit more. So, do the arithmetic: 7,854 units in the Village at \$100 per month comes to \$785,400 per month, a veritable river of cash. Oh yes, and that's \$9,424,800 per year!

So (getting back to our question) what is this monetary Niagara used for? The answer is RENT — for the lease of the recreational facilities here in Century **Village.** This includes the main clubhouse, the Hastings clubhouse, the WPRF pools, the various game courts, and the lakes and canals.

There is a name to the kind of long-term lease we have. It is called a **Triple Net Lease**. In this kind of lease, we, the unit owners, pay all taxes, insurance and operational costs associated with the recreational facility. About two thirds of the money is *base rent* and one third is operational rent.

In 1999, a major amendment was made to this already existing long-term lease. The amendment is called: "AMENDMENT TO LONG TERM LEASES FOR ALL CONDOMINIUM ASSO-CIATIONS IN CENTURY VILLAGE, WEST PALM

BEACH." It is often referred to in conversation as the Millennium Amendment or the Millennium Agreement.

The statutory basis for the Operations Committee lies in this amendment. The following extract from the amendment is the basis for the creation of the Operations Committee:

"COMMITTEE. A Committee shall be formed by UCO. Pursuant to this Agreement, the Committee shall perform functions related to the operation of the CV-WPB Facility, including, but not limited to, the making of all policy and control of all budgetary matters regarding Operating Expenses.....

The Committee shall be selected and shall serve as may be provided by UCO or its successors or assigns in its discretion. Unless the Committee and Management Company agree to the contrary in writing, the Committee may meet at least monthly to consider the desires and needs of all lessees as concerns the CV-WPB Facility. In accordance with the provisions of paragraph 4-G (1) hereof, the Committee, or its designated representatives, shall have access

Delegate Assembly Minutes October 1, 2010

President Israel called the meeting to order at 9:30 AM. He introduced Shelly Spiegel, Captain of C.O.P. in Century Village, who led the Pledge of Allegiance. Special guests were Paulette Burdick, Sarah Alsofrom, Leslie Blackner, Capt. Calloway and Lt. Richard Dibarardino.

Capt. Calloway reported that for the past month there were no robberies or burglaries in CV, which was due in part to our active C.O.P. volunteers.

Sarah Alsofrom reported that the State Attorney's office is looking for volunteers and directed our residents to their website: P.B.Co. StateAttorney/Volunteers program.

Leslie Blackner explained proposed amendment #4 which will be on the November 2nd ballot. This amendment will give voters the final say whether zoning could be changed. If passed voters would have final say on plan changes.

NEW BUSINESS — The 2011 UCO Proposed Budget was attached to the agenda. Dorothy Tetro, Treasurer, pointed out the new items: Reserve for bad debt and 2102 building reserve. There will be an \$8.42 increase per unit per month. There was some discussion concerning the \$250,000 line item for Road Reserves.

MOTION: Ed Black moved that the line item Road Reserves/Drainage — \$250,000 be left in the budget and Claudette LaBonte seconded the motion. Motion carried.

MOTION: Roberta Fromkin moved that the UCO 2011 budget as presented be approved. Ron Massa seconded the motion. Motion carried.

The Comcast HBO offer is off the agenda for today.

MOTION: Ted Silverman moved that the appointment of Jean Dowling to the Executive Board be accepted and Ed Black seconded the motion. After much discussion, the motion was defeated.

Phyllis Richland announced that we are participating with the Fire Department and will accept unwrapped gifts for disadvantaged children for Christmas, Hanukkah and Kwanza. These items can be dropped off at the UCO office.

Meeting was adjourned at 11:10 AM.

to the books and records of Management Company pertaining to the CV-WPB Facility."

These **Operating Expens**es, which are addressed by the Operations Committee, encompass (as noted above) the one third of our monthly payments designated "operational rent."

The **Operations Commit**tee consists of all of the officers of UCO and a number of members appointed by the president of UCO. Currently, four non-officer members sit on the committee along with the UCO Licensed Community Association Manager (LCAM). Also, at full meetings of the committee, senior managers of W.P.R.F., Inc. are in attendance.

There has been much criticism of the Millennium Agreement; however, one must view the amendment in the light of the times in which it was forged. To put the matter simply, unit owners wanted a say in how their money was being spent. To get this control, they took on massive responsibility for the recreational facility property. If one rereads the extracts from the amendment above, he can hardly deny that incredible control is afforded the Village (the renter) over the operational and financial affairs of the recreational facility.

Was it a deal with the devil? You decide — we asked for control and now we have it. Think about that before you start to complain. And always: "Be careful of what you ask for; you just may get it."

By the time you read this, we will be a little more than two months before our 2011-2012 renewals. We've been working hard on getting the best coverage's we can, at the fairest price.

I've been asked what the premiums will be. I don't have a definitive answer, but I will tell you what the Committee has been working on. We interviewed nine agencies and finally settled on three to offer us quotes. They don't have the final answers, but these are some ideas of what's been happening.

First, the property coverage: We may be able to place our better associations with an admitted carrier that has become available. This carrier, American Coastal, will write the property, DIC and Law and Ordinance coverages on one policy. They also have the ability to reduce premiums for those properties that have had good loss experience and have worked to reduce losses by good maintenance and upkeep of their properties. For those who do not qualify, the option will be Citizens, with a DIC and Law and Ordinance policies.

Claudette and Thelma on and healthy month.

our Committee have reviewed the last few years' loss runs and have identified those associations with loss problems. Into this mix, we are trying to get the maintenance checklist from those associations who have completed it. Or, as one association did — forward us the list of work completed and attached invoices. If you've done any preventive maintenance on your association, please forward it to us at UCO Insurance Committee and we will make sure it gets sent to the company for consideration. I can't say you'll get a certain amount reduction, but it will all be part of the final determination of your association's premium.

I'm aware that this article will probably leave you with more questions than answers, and for that, I apologize. However, we don't currently have the answers, only ideas of where this will come out in January. What we are hoping to do is to have a meeting when more of our residents are here and discuss what's happening in the Insurance market and to us in the Village specifically.

In the meantime, have a safe and healthy month. \Box

Maintenance Dom Guarnagia



Until September 29, it was a month of deficit precipitation during our rainy season; however, **preparation** is the key word to avoid water from a heavy rain from backing up to the sliding glass door with two potential consequences. One, the accumulation of rain water could damage the porch floor covering (carpeting). The flooding could also reach the doorway and damage the door track/rollers and perhaps enter your unit. Two, gaps between the floor/wall could allow water to seep under the wall and drip down onto your neighbor's porch.

For the majority, screened porches/patios have no tile on the floor and those holes provided by the contractor during construction that are easily clogged are easily cleared. Wire from a clothes hanger or other rigid metallic object can be inserted into the hole at the juncture of the concrete floor and the aluminum extrusion, to re-open the holes to allow proper drainage. If tile has been installed, it becomes necessary to drill new openings, especially the area where the puddle is deepest. Take note of that low spot, have a handyman drill quarter inch holes through the aluminum strip, spaced about three (3) feet apart, to drain the water. Do not attempt this with water **on the floor**; rather wait for the water to dry up.

On another issue, this is a good time for those of us who are here during the Summer months and early Fall to act on those tasks outlined on the two-page inspection forms and spend a little to save a lot on your maintenance costs as reflected in the projected increases in association insurance premiums and in WPRF, UCO and Comcast costs for 2011.

The proposed insurance increase is 10% on Citizens property policies (\$1,000 X 10% (or \$100)) = \$1,100. Performing the tasks and joining the pool of associations, as suggested by the UCO Insurance Committee, could possibly yield a drop in premium from this year's rate of 15% (\$1,000 X 15% (or \$150)), bringing the total savings of \$250.

As year-round residences, we are, essentially, our brother's keepers. The situation presents us with a doubleedged sword. Without the financial input from the winter residents, who carry costs for twelve months while residing here for three to six months, the situation could be very different. This symbiotic relationship, in order to succeed, requires the mutual input from both groups to provide a safe and affordable environment with the burden of preparation falling upon us and the efforts of both.

Viewing interviews on Channel 63, reading articles in the *UCO Reporter* and attending the monthly Maintenance Committee meetings on the second Friday of each month, held at 10 A.M. in Classroom A upstairs in the Clubhouse, will provide the information necessary to successfully implement the tasks outlined on the inspection form, designed by the Insurance Committee.

This can be accomplished by following three (3) steps.

- Carry out the inspections as outlined, keeping records of expenditures, permits and contracts from professional tradesmen and others as well as reports for professional inspections. The Maintenance Committee, at its monthly meetings will provide hand-out information and discussion of the bidding and contract processes as well as the appropriate payment schedule along with items needed to make necessary corrections to eliminate deficiencies for the lowest costs.
- Have a professional inspection of the roof and associated elements, i.e., gutters, soffits, downspouts and drainage pipes. Have maintenance and repairs performed, keeping a record of the receipts, contracts and permits for future reference and proof. This should occur on an annual basis and especially after severe wind storms.
- With little time remaining before insurance coverage for your association must be



CERT: **Community Emergency Response Team Jackie Karlan**



September 2010 marked the seventh annual National Preparedness Month (NPM). This year focused on encouraging Americans to work together and take concrete actions toward emergency preparedness. The Century Village CERT team is prepared. We have been meeting all summer reviewing and refining our disaster survival and rescue skills so that we can meet postdisaster needs.

The CERT Team encourages every building to assign either a board member or resident to gather information using our After-the-Storm Disaster Evaluation Form. Call the UCO office after a hurricane and tell us your building needs. Our trained telephone staff will be available to help you.

It is vital to document information about the disaster situation so that first responders (emergency services) can be deployed to Century Village. Our October CERT meeting dealt with documenting medical injuries. Using the Victim Treatment Record Form, groups were given descriptions of injuries. They had to decide how to tag the injured people. For this exercise we used the following standard tags: RED for immediate treatment, YELLOW for delayed treatment, and GREEN for minor treatment. A scribe (recorder) filled out this record sheet with input from the group. This sheet is given to the medical team of first responders. These are standard forms used by all CERT teams throughout the United States.

Procrastinators, were you inspired by my last month's article? I hope so!

We are not out of the woods yet. We have been lucky so far.

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



Ristorante Vino

An unplanned trip

The other day my friend Carolyn and I decided to eat out but had no particular restaurant in mind. "Let's see where the car takes us," I said. So we went out the Okeechobee gate, where the car made the first major decision, to turn right. The Longhorn Restaurant came up almost immediately on the right. It's good, but we had decided earlier to save that for a future trip with some friends, so we passed it by as well as some sports bar restaurants. Nothing wrong with them, but we weren't in the mood for noisy or watching football.

To make a long story short, after meandering through a good part of Royal Palm Beach, the car took us south on Royal Palm Boulevard and headed west on Route 80 (Southern Boulevard). I knew this part of 80 was getting built up and wondered if we might find a good restaurant somewhere along it. Sure enough — at the intersection of Crestwood, in the northwest corner among a small group of stores, was the Ristorante Vino.

The restaurant, opened a year ago, was clean with a pleasant wood-paneled decor. As soon as we were seated, the waitress brought us ice water, homemade bread and butter, and a complimentary half glass of wine for each of us. The wine was a red Chianti, delicious and their special house blend, we found out later. I ordered a full glass. Linen napkins were a nice touch.

The menu was impressive — many chicken, fish and meat dishes; several appetizers; many pasta choices; salads; cheese dishes and sides. We figured with the name "Ristorante" the prices might be on the high side, but they were moderate. Most of the choices were in the \$14.50 to \$17.95 range. I chose the Veal Rosalia and Carolyn the Pollo (chicken) Florentina. Both were delicious.



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About Amendment 4 By Jean Dowling

Lesley Blackner, a Palm Beach attorney and sponsor of Amendment 4, appeared at the Delegate Assembly on October 1 to ask support for the Amendment which will appear on the November ballot. While the full amendment can be read on the web (Google "Amendment 4 Florida"), the summary is:

Establishes that before a local government may adopt a new comprehensive land use plan, or amend a comprehensive land use plan, the proposed plan or amendment shall be subject to vote of the electors of the local government by referendum, following preparation by the local planning agency, consideration by the governing body and notice.

While no one can estimate how much financial impact this will have on local government, costs will depend on the frequency, timing and method of the referenda and would include the cost of ballot preparation, election administration and associated expenses. If this is a special election, it could be significant.

County and City Commissioners evaluate plan amendments after proposed changes are reviewed by the local planning board, receive input from the community in public hearings, receive local government recommendations, review and additional input from seven state agencies and is approved by Florida Department of Community Affairs. In 2006, there were 6,406 amendments to local comprehensive plans. All would require voter approval under Amendment 4.

You, the voter, will decide the question on Tuesday, November 2, 2010. □



Effect of passage: Would amend Constitution to provide added property tax relief to designated military personnel. *Article XII, Section 31, Fla. Const.)

Effect of Passage: Would amend Fla. Constitution to require voter approval of development proposals that conflict with already established comprehensive land use plans. Comprehensive plans are blueprints that cities and counties use to define how the lands in local communities may be developed. Article II, Section 7.

- would continue the current method of land use planning as established by the legislature.

Districts must be contiguous. Unless otherwise required, districts must be compact, as equal in population as feasible, and where feasible must make use of existing city, county and geographical boundaries.

Effect of Passage: Would set standards for drawing legislative districts after each census to reduce gerrymandering. (Would add a new section 21 to Article III, Fla. Const.)

Unless otherwise required, districts must be compact, as equal in population as feasible, and where feasible must make use of existing city, county and geographical boundaries.

Effect of passage: Would add a new section 20 to Article III, Fla. Const.

AMENDMENT #7 REMOVED FROM BALLOT Amendment #8 Revision of the class size requirements for public schools

Ballot Summary: The Florida Constitution currently limits the maximum number of students assigned to each teacher in public school classrooms in the following grade groupings: for prekindergarten through grade 3, 18 students; for grades 4 through 8, 22 students; and for grades 9 through 12, 25 students. Under this amendment, the current limits on the maximum number of students assigned to each teacher in public school classrooms would become limits on the average number of students assigned per class to each teacher, by specified grade grouping, in each public school. This amendment also adopts new limits on the maximum number of students assigned to each teacher in an individual classroom as follows: for prekindergarten through grade 3, 21 students; for grades 4 though 8, 27 students; and for grades 9 through 12, 30 students. This amendment specifies that class size limits do not apply to virtual classes, requires the Legislature to provide sufficient funds to maintain the average number of students required by this amendment, and schedules these revisions to take effect upon approval by the electors of this state and to operate retroactively to the beginning of the 2010-2011 school year.

Effect of passage: Would amend the Constitution to increase permissible classroom size. (Would create new Section 31 in Article XII, Fla. Const. that would increase permissible classroom size.) A YES VOTE FOR AMENDMENT #8

- would provide more local level control of teacher-student ratios.

staff can sometimes be. We shared a homemade tiramisu


for dessert.



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Down Memory Lane

(Editor Syd Kronish is well known for his writing theatrical prose. He formally was a feature writer and editor for the AP in New York covering primarily entertainment and sport subjects. Today he is beginning a new feature for the UCO Reporter highlighting one of his favorite subjects — dynamic actor Humphrey Bogart.)

HUMPHREY BOGART — **FOREVER NO. 1** "AS TIME GOES BY"

Humphrey Bogart was a man for all seasons and all reasons, for all acting roles, receiving approvals and accolades for his achievements on and off the screen — from New York to Hollywood to Casablanca.

Bogart was voted number one by the American Film Institute's list of the greatest movie actors. He was the winner of two Academy Awards. He was honored on a 32¢ US stamp in the "Legends of Hollywood" series and special prize voted as the "Greatest Movie Star of All Times" by Entertainment Weekly magazine.

Bogart came into my picture as a young reporter on special assignment. I was excited to do this story because Bogie was my favorite of favorites.

We met on the set of a film in progress as one of a series of which he played Sam Spade. I introduced myself and said "Hi, I'm Syd Kronish of the AP." He quickly replied "Hi Syd, I was expecting you. Let's sit down at this table and have a cup of coffee and we can chat along the way." While talking, he smoked cigarette after cigarette.

We briefly discussed some of his memorable films — Petrified Forest (1930) The Maltese Falcon (1946) Key Largo (1948) The African Queen (1948) and, of course, Casablanca (1942).

Casablanca was his favorite, he admitted. It is considered "the greatest love story ever presented on the silver screen."

Starring with him was Ingrid Bergman, Paul Henreid, Claude Raines, Conrad Veight, Sydney Greenstreet, Peter Lorre and jazz pianist Dooley Wilson, who played that unforgettable song, "As Time Goes By."

Many great lines were associated with this film, including "Play it again, Sam," "This is the beginning of a beautiful friendship," "Round up the usual suspects," and "Here's looking at you, kid."

While chatting away, he told me that sometimes things were one drink behind. When asked about his views on life, he commented, "I'm a Democrat in politics, an Episcopalian by upbringing and a dissident by

design."

Humphrey DeForest Bogart was born December 25, 1899 in New York City, the son of a prominent surgeon. His father called him "my Christmas boy." His early years were spent in New York. His desire was to become an actor and not a doctor as his father wanted him to be. He was successful in obtaining some small parts on the New York

His friends in the acting profession arranged for him to go to Hollywood where he started his film career. From 1936 to 1940, Bogie appeared in 28 films with roles ranging from gangster to detectives.

scenes with Ingrid in Casablanca. He noted that when the cameras moved in on the pair and she is saying "I love



you, it would make anybody romantic."

In contrast, Bogie laughing Bogie lovingly recalled his recalled his role with Bette Davis; he said, "Even when I was carrying a gun, she scared the begesus out of me."

He had a variable love life off the screen. He was married four times; all were actresses. The last was Lauren Bacall, who appeared with him in To Have and Have Not. Her memorable line to him was "If you need me, just whistle. You know how to do that. Just press your lips together and blow."

Bogie was an avid baseball fan; he said he would rather have a hotdog than a steak dinner at the Ritz.

Bogart died January 14, 1957 at the early age of 57 from cancer of the esophagus due to his heavy smoking.

In his casket, a gold whistle was placed on his chest by his wife Lauren Bacall.

Some days, I glance at the sky and reverently say, "Here's looking at you, kid." □


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

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The Reader's Corner Lenore Velcoff



Midwives by Chris Bohjalian was an Oprah's Book Club read, so I feel lame saying I read it. I am put-off by her logo on a book front cover. But this one was interesting and a quick read.

The story is told from the perspective of the midwife's fourteen year old daughter as she looks at her mother's role during a delivery gone bad. It follows the court case of this midwife who does an emergency C-section on a woman who dies but whose baby lives. Was the woman actually dead when she performed the surgery? Did the midwife cause the death? The State accuses Sibyl of practicing medicine without a license and involuntary manslaughter. Home delivery has advocates and opponents. The World Health Organization recommends that homebirths should be standard for all normal pregnancies.

But what happens when "normal" goes bad and conditions prevent hospitalization as in this case?

This book does not show Sibyl as incompetent. It tells of her years of training and practice without a mishap. But in some ways the author portrays a negative attitude that undermines midwifery in our times. Opponents of homebirth feel that the mother in this story was at risk the moment she decided not to have her baby in a hospital.

What I found interesting was how the trial lawyers shaped their arguments for this case and how they questioned perspective jurors to reveal their attitudes toward birth, hospitals and medicine.

I thought *Midwives* was believable and easy to understand, though the topic is heated. It is a story of everyday people who deal with com-

plex moral issues that fill this world. Not just Sibyl, but the entire practice of midwifery was put on trial. You make your own decision. □



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

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

WAR AND PEACE

The U.S. is actively pursuing two wars: one fighting it, the other trying to bring it to an end?

The war in Afghanistan entered its tenth year, the longest in our history.

Hopes to see this war come to an end soon are wishful thinking. There are differences of opinion on the highest level as to what we really attempt to achieve.

I have no doubt that the U.S. can bring this war to an end — the military would require an all-out effort, including a draft! After all, we fight this now with severely restricted manpower, relying on "surges" which, by their very nature, can impact only on the areas on which they are targeted.

Even an all-out military victory would not bring about a substantive change in Afghanistan. Their government is a joke. Corruption is widespread and whatever "Marshall Plan" we would try to impose to help this poor country — the fourth poorest country in the world — is doomed to failure. Like in the past, while the warlords would negotiate with the Taliban, a modus Vivendi to both their liking and to hell with the country.

No doubt, the citizens of our country are against the war and our involvement in the Afghans. No doubt also, that no U.S. politician has the guts to say, "Enough."

So it seems to me that we shall continue to this adventure in "nation-building"

through this, the tenth year, and probably the 11th and 12th and — finally — we shall do what the British and the Soviets did: get out.

The other war, which the U.S. is trying to bring to an end, is in the Middle East: Israel versus the Arabs. This war has now a good chance to be named "The Second Hundred Year War" in history.

I am one of those who truly believe that this is the last time a peaceful end can be achieved. There are, of course, problems which seem to be insurmountable, but the rise of Iran to become a major power in the Middle East has changed the attitude of Arab states such as Saudi Arabia and others — with the exception of Syria — to an extent that one can assume that a final peace treaty and the establishment of a Palestinian state are possible, despite Hamas and Hesbollah.

Easy? When has anything ever been easy in the Middle East? What is important to remember is that the Arab states know they can never defeat Israel and that in a confrontation with Iran, Israel would be a possible major combatant along with Saudi Arabia and others who are more afraid of Ahmedinejad than they have reason to be of Netanyahu.

LifePlanning for Adults with Disabilities

A significant number of adults with disabilities are dependent upon their aging parents. Many of the caregivers do not have knowledge of the myriad benefits and services available to them and their children here in Palm Beach County. To bridge the gap, Alpert Jewish Family and Children's Service (AJFCS) has been funded by United Way of Palm Beach County to create LifePlanning, a non-denominational program, which offers, free of charge, a number of services for families who are planning ahead for their adult child.

We have planned a Seminar series of five workshops for family members, which cover the topics of: You're Not Alone!; Bridging the Benefits Gap; The Roadmap to Legal and Financial Security; "There's No Place Like Home"; and Arriving at Optimal Independence. The seminars will be offered in three different locations throughout Palm Beach County, in morning, afternoon and evening sessions, from November 2010 through April 2011, and are open to all family members who are caring for an adult child with disabilities.

The *LifePlanning* program also offers individualized planning meetings with trained social workers, support groups for the families, and a socialization program for the adults with disabilities, all at no charge. For the seminar schedule and more information, please contact

Vegetable Ribbons


- 3 medium carrots, peeled
- 2 medium zucchini
- 2 tablespoons butter
- ¾ cup reduced-sodium chicken broth
- 2 tablespoons minced fresh parsley, divided

Using a vegetable peeler, cut the vegetables lengthwise into very thin strips.

In a large skillet over medium heat, melt butter. Add broth. Bring to a boil; cook until liquid is reduced to onethird cup. Add the vegetable strips and one tablespoon parsley; cook and stir for two minutes or just until crisp-tender. Sprinkle with remaining parsley. Serve with a slotted spoon. **Yield**: Four servings. □

From the Desk of Congressman Ted Deutch



Small businesses employ over half of America's workers and create two out of three new jobs in the United States. From local contractors and technology start ups to growing franchises and private medical practices, small businesses are the engine of economic growth in America.

That is why I have argued Congress should cut taxes and expand lending opportunities for small businesses. Since taking office in April, I have fought to pass the Small Business Jobs and Credit Act despite opposition from my Republican colleagues. This September, after months of obstruction, Congress was finally able to send this common-sense bill to President Obama's desk for signature.

The Small Business Jobs and Credit Act contains \$12 billion in tax cuts for America's small businesses. It frees up capital for private sector job growth by eliminating capital gains taxes on new investments, doubling the deduction for start-up costs, and allowing general business credits to be counted against the Alternative Minimum Tax.

Over 1,000 small businesses are currently on a waiting list for the low-interest recovery loans authorized by this bill. Without access to capital, these business owners are unable to hire new workers, invest in new equipment, and open new locations. While big banks have bounced back from this recession, the community banks our small businesses rely on for loans are still struggling. To bolster lending from community banks and increase the availability of capital to small businesses, this legislation creates a targeted \$30 billion Small Business Lending Fund.

From Pompano Beach to Lake Worth, I know the ability of small businesses to expand and hire new workers is critical to Florida's 19th district. Creating new jobs in South Florida is my upmost priority in Congress. All told, the Small Business and Credit Act's smart combination of tax incentives and enhanced lending opportunities is predicted

to create up to 500,000 jobs across America.

Thank you for reading this message. I am proud to support legislation that will help America's entrepreneurs and small business owners get back to doing what they do best — growing America's economy and creating jobs. \square



Safety Tips for Motorists in Emergencies

In a flood, never attempt to drive through water on a road. Water can be deeper than it appears, and can rise very quickly. Most cars will float dangerously for at least a short while. A car can be buoyed by flood waters and

then swept downstream during a flood. Flood waters also erode roadways, and a missing section of road — even a missing bridge — will not be visible. Wade through flood waters only if the water is not flowing rapidly, and only

in water no higher than your knees. If a car stalls in flood water, get out quickly and move to higher ground. The flood waters may still be rising, and the car could be swept away at any moment.

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


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
