## Renovating The Pools

In early February, the Dorchester pool was completely renovated with a new coping including bull nosed brick cap, new 'Diamond

Brite' interior finish, pavers that both enhance the appearance around the pool and permanently eliminate many cosmetic cracks around the deck as noted by the random serpentine rows of inset pavers. A new speckled finish was applied throughout the entire deck surface.

The new slightly textured finish has been used at other Century Villages with great success and will become the standard finish as WPRF community pools are renovated. Unfortunately, for those bathers using the Dorchester pool, delayed scheduling affected the timing of the work performed and many were temporarily inconvenienced. For that, I apologize but I think that it will be a pleasing result.

The pool area finishes and color of the bathhouses will become the standard for all community pools in the future. To date, the Guest Pool and the Kent Pool were renovated in 2011 with the decking being painted with a

product called "Kool Deck". However, the new finish at Dorchester will become the standard. Having only a single entrance to the pool area, it was decided that an additional gate should be installed for easier access. A row of shrubs with roots that have traveled to the pool wall was removed and replaced with Cocoa Plums that do not have a travelling root system.

Some of you have been asked to step aside while two men in a golf cart pass by them on the perimeter walkway many mornings.

Apologies from me and Frank Cornish as we make the rounds each day checking drainage and the progress of the paving. On rainy days we traverse the Village by car to see that the drainage boxes and swales are performing as designed; i.e.- directing runoff to the middle of the parking areas and into the french drains. With few exceptions drainage is performing properly and puddles disappear in 24 hours.

A few weeks ago there was a meeting of the bid committee to look at bids to have the Hastings parking lot repaved.

The bids were received from Harddrives Inc. @ \$27,334, M & M Asphalt @ \$ 28,400 and final Ranger construction @ \$ 40,490.00.

## **PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE UCO BYLAWS**

### **PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE UCO BYLAWS**

The following amendment proposes to grant to the Officers' Committee, advisory and consent powers in the appointment of committees and to determine the mission and term of service of such committees, unless otherwise provided in the Bylaws.

(Additions shown by "underlining", deletions shown by "strikeout", unaffected text indicated by ".....").

#### **ITEM 1**

#### **ARTICLE VIII, "COMMITTEES" , is hereby amended as follows:**

##### **A. APPOINTIVE COMMITTEES**

1. The President, with the advice and consent of the Officers' Committee, shall appoint such standing committees and such special committees and chairmen thereof as ~~he~~they may deem necessary or advisable. Any unit owner in Century Village who is a member of UCO, may be selected to serve as a member of any committee. Committees shall keep detailed and accurate records of their proceedings, including the vote or abstention of any member on any matter which comes before the committee. The President, with the advice and consent of the Officers' Committee, will also determine the mission and term of service of any such committee, unless otherwise provided in these Bylaws or the Articles of Incorporation. If the term of service of a committee is not otherwise designated, it shall be until the next March meeting of the Delegate Assembly.

2. The President, with the advice and consent of the Officers' Committee, may appoint UCO members and/or the the Licensed Property Manager as members of all such committees, with the exception of the Officers' Committee. The Licensed Community Association Manager (LCAM) shall not be a voting member of any committee. Committees thus formed may seek advice from whomever they desire but may not incur any expense or obligate UCO for any expenditure unless properly authorized beforehand.

\*\*\*\*\*

The UCO Bylaws presently requires that every amendment proposal, whether good or bad, must make its way through to the Delegate Assembly after being published in the Reporter. The issue at hand is to clearly grant to the Executive Board, the power to "kill" (postpone indefinitely), to "amend", or to otherwise dispose of any amendment proposal referred to the Executive Board by the Officers' Committee.

#### **ITEM 2**

#### **ARTICLE XI, "MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS", (D), "METHOD OF AMENDMENT" is hereby amended as follows:**

The Executive Board, after due deliberation, shall either approve or disapprove ~~recommend approval or disapproval~~ of the amendment proposal. The amendment proposal, if approved as presented or as amended, shall then be published in the next issue of the UCO Reporter and shall be read and considered by the Delegate Assembly at the meeting immediately following its publication....

# LOOKING FOR THE "REAL FLORIDA"

How often have you heard these words: "The Real Florida"?

No, it's not that plushy soft seat at the Kravis Center or all the stores with the lovely merchandise at the Gardens Mall. It's what you find in the beautiful state parks in Florida or paddling a canoe on one of Florida's waterways. Maybe it's a hike you take on a rustic trail. Or taking your gear and camping in the Everglades. If you're "outdoorsy" and looking for a little adventure, there are plenty of places to go for the Real Florida experience.

When I first moved to Century Village from my home state of Vermont, I was taken aback by all the traffic, and wall-to-wall housing and stores. We had only one store in our hometown, Dan & Whit's, whose motto was "If we don't have it, you don't need it." Well, maybe Florida won't be too bad, I thought, but there must be more to the state than this!

Indeed; and I was fortunate enough to find it, along with my friend Lydia and several others who were interested in exploring. Lydia knew all there was to see; she

had lived in West Palm Beach since she was a child except for having strayed in other places such as Alaska. She knew where to find the Real Florida! So on weekends and days off, our group would be on its way to experience the elegance of the great outdoors. Let me tell you about some of the experiences we had.

Billie Swamp Safari is located in the Big Cypress Reservation. We went there on New Year's Eve and stayed in a thatched Chickee hut.. At sundown, we boarded a swamp buggy and rode off on an eco tour to see the exotic native terrain and wildlife. We traveled (with a guide of course) through the lush woodlands described as a land on the edge of civilization and in the solitary beauty of tropical hardwood hammock and cypress domes. What wildlife to be seen! Not only deer, alligators and raccoons, we also saw an extremely large southern razorback hog. Being in very muddy streams at times made it possible for the swamp buggy to get stuck, and it did. About 45 minutes later, a big tractor rescued us. It pulled the buggy out of the mud and got us on our way back to our



hut. There we celebrated the year's end by having a little wine, some crackers and cheese.

On one trip we went to Paynes Prairie for a depiction of Florida living in the days gone by. People were dressed up in clothing worn in those days. We heard stories of their rugged times and travels, and we viewed tools that were used by those early settlers to build their settlements.

After getting a permit to camp on the banks of the Peace River, we traveled to Arcadia with our canoes and camping equipment. After loading our gear in the canoes (another group actually had a portable potty!) we paddled away. It was lovely. The river was quite calm and the scenery was lush! Lunch was eaten in our canoes, and

towards the end of the day, we saw a great place to camp and pulled our canoes up on land, set up our tents, made a fire to cook over, and relaxed. When we got tired enough, we bedded down in our tents and fell sound asleep. All of a sudden we heard a great rumbling. Looking out of our tents, we saw a herd of cattle running down the slope to the river to get a drink of water. The herd split and went around the tents, never hitting a one. That was quite an awakening!

There are hundreds of crystal clear springs in Florida. The water temperature is always between 70 & 72 degrees. The "gang" has been to several of them including Kelly Springs, Rock Run Springs, Wekiwa and many others. Lydia and I

once swamped our canoe on one of them after trying to paddle across some downed trees topped by some very fast-flowing water. We made our way to the banks, got the water out of the canoe, and went on our way.

At Deleon Springs there is an old Spanish mill where we were able to make our own pancakes sitting at a wooden table set up so that a griddle was in the middle.

All I can say is, if you are physically able, head for the Real Florida. You will recall the experiences you'll have for the rest of your life. I know that I will.



By now, most of the Village knows the decision -- or what a lot of residents are still wondering, was it a decision?-- that was made January 26 at the meeting of the Palm Beach Board of County Commissioners to decide the fate of the Turtle Bay Golf Course. It was a tie, the commissioners voted 3-3 to vote again in October. Commissioner Priscilla Taylor was out of town.

To recap the highlights, there were several suggestions that the commissioners gave to both sides to consider before the October meeting. These included that the residents buy the course, that Andrew Waldman, the current owner of the property, should scale down his proposed development, or that he might want to find a new buyer for the property.

## FAST FORWARD:

At a meeting of the commissioners on Tuesday, Feb. 7, the owner of the Poinciana Golf Club in Lake Worth, Kevin Swill, spoke about his interest in Turtle Bay. In a telephone interview a few days later when asked if he was interested in buying the course, he said, "At this time, I would entertain a discussion with the current owner of the course." He said he had not spoken to Waldman yet but would call him when his time permits. Swill said he did not attend the January meeting due to prior business commitments. He has owned the Poinciana course since April 2011 and has interests in two golf courses in the New York and New Jersey area. On Feb. 13 Waldman said, "I have not had a call yet." However, he continued, "I always return all my calls."

At the beginning of the January meeting, Waldman's main speaker, the project planner, Kerry Kilday, gave a presentation of their plan. One member of his team gave an economic impact analysis on what the development could mean for the area. This speaker said there would be, "jobs, jobs, jobs." He said the revenue to the county would be approximately \$193 million, and the impact to the community could be \$50 million. He said that during construction 655 jobs would be created, and when completed

# Meet Phil Shapkin

Just mention his name and you will get a reaction. It may be positive and it may be negative but it surely will be a reaction. If you attend the delegates' meetings you will know that Phil is there. He speaks on many subjects of concern to himself and the residents of the Village but mostly it's about the golf course. Even if you are not a delegate you will hear his name come up in conversations in the Village all the time. Shapkin is the president of the Pro-Active Committee to save the golf course.

In a recent interview Phil said he was never a regular player or super golfer but, get this, especially if you are a golfer, the first time he ever played he broke 100! He said

he was playing with two men and a pro at the time and the pro couldn't believe it.

Born in the Bronx, he's 84 years old. He said he was always a good athlete. In fact he made a football farm team sponsored by the New York Yankees. After he married his wife Barbara, (that she tells everyone has been for, "57 wonderful years," they lived in Baldwin, L.I., NY, where they raised their two daughters and a son. They moved to Century Village in 1992 after buying his mother-in-law's unit that she had bought from the blueprint. He said he played golf at the Turtle Bay Golf Course but never with a league or a organized group.

Phil has many interests. Name almost any group, club or activity in the Village and you will find him there either

as a officer or member. And, he's a painter, he has a easel on his porch and has some of his paintings on the walls of his unit. He does wood carvings too. He is also the past president of the men's club at his temple.

But, his first priority right now is saving the golf course, Shapkin said when he first met Andrew Waldman, the current owner of

the golf course property who is asking the county commissioners to rezone it so he can build his development, Reflection Bay, he asked him what his plans were for the golf course and offered to help him make it a success. He suggested ideas for golf tournaments and getting fam-



ilies and children involved in playing the course. He said after the course began to deteriorate he became involved in trying to save it.

Asked why he has fought so hard and so long to save the course his answer is a simple one. He and his wife love the pastoral scene. "We

bought our home so we could enjoy the openness of the golf course view. We watch the wildlife activity from our porch and, in fact just last week we saw a pair of bald eagles on the course."

Shapkin said he will continue to fight to save the course as long as it takes.

there would be 1,716 positions available, and the possible revenue from real estate taxes would be in the millions.

Ralf Brookes, the attorney for the Pro-Active Committee, emphasized the Plat 14 restrictions and the letter written from a county attorney in 1973 stating that the property would remain in perpetuity.

During a discussion of the future of the golf course at the Feb. 3 UCO delegates' meeting, a speaker announced that a new group is being formed called "Welcome Neighbor." This group supports the Reflection Bay development. He said their mission is to be "good neighbors." Beck said he believes the development will increase property values in the Village and the residents will benefit by being able to have nice restaurants, perhaps even a Kosher deli or restaurant and a shopping center that they will not have to travel to use. He continued, "It will be like a small town. We hope to give our residents the opportunity to express their ideas to Andrew Waldman." To contact them, call 561-318-3408.

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

### Palm Beach County Tax Collector

March is National Women's History month. This year's theme is "Women's Education – Women's Empowerment." Many people may not realize that we have 11 colleges and universities in Palm Beach County and only three have women presidents! These colleges collectively offer degrees in every possible field. What could be better than earning your degree in beautiful Palm Beach County? I moved from Mississippi to Palm Beach County, enrolled in college and never left.

Did you hear the news? My office reached a \$1.9 million settlement with the major Online Travel Companies (OTC) for uncollected Tourist Development Tax – also known as "bed

tax". A "bed tax" of 5 cents per dollar is levied on all Palm Beach County hotel stays of 6 months or less. Bed tax collections fund Palm Beach County tourism promotion, cultural programs and beach restoration.

I filed suit against OTCs in Circuit Court in July, 2009. Defendants in our litigation include Expedia, Orbitz, Priceline and Travelocity. The suit alleged the OTCs did not pay tourist development tax as authorized by Florida Statute 125.0104 and County Code 17-111.

Defendants agreed to collectively pay over \$1.9 million in uncollected differential between the wholesale and retail bed tax. This settlement was not an admission by the OTCs they owed the bed

tax but a settlement of the case.

A special thanks to our legal team who worked so hard over the past three years. They include Palm Beach County attorneys Jeff Liggio, Esq., Lou Silber, Esq., and John Romano, Esq.

March is the last month to pay property taxes. All outstanding property taxes after April 2nd (see below) are delinquent. Last year over 32,000 properties were delinquent. The law requires that Tax Collectors hold an annual Tax Certificate Auction on June 1 of each year to replace uncollected revenue. All delinquent properties are listed in the sale. Please do not let your property fall into this category.

Important Property Tax Deadlines:

We urge you not to wait. Our offices get very busy at the end of the month.

The deadline for postmarks for mailed property tax payments is March 30th.

- According to Florida Statutes if the end of a discount period falls on a Saturday, Sunday or holiday, the discount period is extended to the next working day, and the payment must be delivered to our office. Since the last day of the month, March 31st falls on a Saturday this year, the law extends the deadline for online or in person payments to the following work day which is Monday, April 2nd.

A few important property tax payment reminders:

- Payment options: Online, by mail, in person or drop box.

- Make payments to: Tax Collector, PBC. Include 17 digit PCN, account number or license plate number on your payment.

- Include the payment stub with your payment whenever possible for efficient processing. Do not use staples, clips or fold the payment when sending by mail.

- Mail Property Tax pay-

ments to: P.O. Box 3353, West Palm Beach, FL 33402-3353.

We have drop boxes at each of our locations. You can drop your payment off and avoid waiting. Please note, drop boxes are not available when our offices are closed.

If you want an alternative to the usual "one lump sum" property tax payment, you can catch a break. Our office offers an Installment Payment Plan allowing you to break up your property tax payment into four quarterly installments. Enrolling is quick and easy. Just complete an application and return it to our office by April 30, 2012. You can download one from our website at [www.taxcollectorpbc.com](http://www.taxcollectorpbc.com) or pick one up at any of 8 service locations.

This month we set the clocks forward and welcome spring. For us, it's the end of another busy tax season.

## From Commissioner

### PAULETTE BURDICK

Your tireless efforts on the Golf Course paid off in the County Commission's decision to postpone the issue until October 25, 2012. It wasn't easy. First, you again broke the record for attendance at a county meeting. In addition to sending thousands of post cards, you filled the chambers, the atrium outside the chambers, the large conference room on the 12th

Floor, the lobby on the first floor, a conference room on the 7th floor and there were even citizens out on the patio. And of course, there was the two-way video feed between the county commission chambers and the Century Village Theater. Another record turnout that I do not think will be duplicated.

I thought attorneys, Ralf Brookes and Rod Tennyson,

for the Village did an excellent job of explaining that the "in perpetuity" provision on the Plat is a contract which should be respected by the Commission. The representatives for Mr. and Mrs. Waldman did an excellent job of explaining their proposal, but did not really address the "in perpetuity" provision. After the presentations by the "experts," the public had an opportunity to speak and speak you did. Although there were some Century Village residents in support of the two zoning applications, it was clear that the overwhelming majority of residents at the meeting opposed the development of the golf course. The entire meeting was about 5 1/2 hours with public comments taking about 3 1/2 hours. The speakers were forceful and

spoke from the heart.

When the matter came back to the County Commission, Commissioner Jesse Santamaria offered an inspired argument for protecting the rights of the residents of Century Village in opposing both zoning applications. I followed with a motion to deny the applications with prejudice, which would have prevented the applicants from reapplying for a year, which is the maximum allowed under the law. Unfortunately, my motion failed on a 3-3 vote (Commissioners Burdick, Marcus and Santamaria voted for the motion and Aaronson, Abrams and Vana voted against the motion. Commission Taylor was absent.) A motion to approve the applications also failed on a 3-3 vote. Eventually, the

Board agreed to postpone the applications until October 25, 2012, which is really very good. If the meeting had ended without a majority decision, the applications would have merely been carried over to the February 23rd zoning meeting.

Again I would like to thank UCO and the Pro-Active Committee for their tireless efforts on this issue.

## From State Representative

#### REDISTRICTING UPDATE

On Thursday, February 2, the House began debating the redistricting bills, Senate Bill 1174 and Senate Bill 1176. The proposed House, Senate

and Congressional maps were discussed for many hours. The bills addressing redistricting were taken up again on Friday, February 3 for a floor vote. Both bills passed with a vote of 80 to 37 with Representative

Pafford voting against the bills.

The maps now go to the Senate for approval. Once the plans are approved by both chambers, the legislative (House and Senate), bills will be submitted by the Attorney General to the Florida Supreme Court for constitutional review. If the bills are approved by the Supreme Court, they will then be submitted to the U.S. Dept. of Justice (DOJ) for review under the Voting Rights Act. The Supreme Court has 30 days to respond and the DOJ has 60 days to respond. The congressional plan will be submitted

to the governor and if signed, the plan will be sent directly to the U.S. Dept. of Justice, (no review by the Florida Supreme Court). The governor has 7 days to approve the plans and the DOJ has 60 days to review.

If either the Supreme Court or the DOJ rejects a plan, the legislature must hold a special session to create new maps. If a second set of plans are rejected by the Supreme Court, the court must draw the plans for Florida. The courts can also amend the plans in response to legal challenges filed by third-party groups, as was done in 2002.

## From Congressman

### TED DEUTCH

I was pleased to hear President Obama devote much of his State of the Union address to growing our nation's manufacturing sector. Though Florida is the fifth largest exporter of domestically manufactured goods in America, this critical sector

has taken a beating in recent years and shed over 113,000 jobs between 2000 and 2008.

Yet, for the first time since the late nineties, America's manufacturing sector has begun to grow. In fact, since late 2009, manufacturers have created over 300,000 new jobs

It is my hope that this year, Republicans and Democrats can work together and pass some of the proposals outlined by President Obama in this year's State of the Union. Our manufacturing sector helped make America the world's strongest economy with the most prosperous middle class in history. It is time to reclaim that mantle by embracing an agenda that puts American jobs first.

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
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# Keeping Your Kidneys Healthy

Many parts of the body come in pairs. You have two eyes, ears, arms, legs, feet and ovaries or testicles. You also have two kidneys that are each about the size of a closed fist. These bean-shaped organs are located on either side of the spine near the middle of the back, just below the ribcage. Kidneys are like the body's treatment plant, processing about 200 quarts of blood each day and removing approximately two quarts of waste products and extra water that become urine. Keeping your kidneys healthy is very important to overall health. If your kidneys do not function properly, wastes can build up in the blood and eventually damage the body.

People at risk for kidney disease, including those with diabetes, high blood pressure, heart disease or a first degree relative with kidney failure, need to take special precautions to keep their kidneys healthy. Small declines in kidney function may be overlooked because they do not cause any symptoms. In fact, you may lose as much as 30 to 40 percent of kidney function without noticing. Some people are able to lead normal, healthy lives even though they may have been born with only one kidney. But serious health problems can develop if kidney function drops below 25 percent and renal replacement therapy, such as dialysis or transplantation, is necessary when function drops below 10 or 15 percent.

Diabetes and high blood pressure are the two most common causes of kidney disease. Diabetes is a disease that prevents the body from properly processing glucose, which is a form of sugar. Glucose can act like poison if it stays in the blood instead of being broken down. Small blood vessels in the kidneys can be damaged by high blood pressure and prevent the proper filtration of waste from blood. People with these conditions can take steps to keep their kidneys healthy.


Diabetics need to have their blood and urine checked for signs of kidney disease on a regular basis. They also should try to keep blood pressure below 130/80 mmHg, maintain normal cholesterol levels and aim for blood glucose targets. Medications should be taken as prescribed. A healthy diet with limited salt intake and regular physi-



cal activity also are important. People with high blood pressure or heart disease can follow many of these same steps, maintain a healthy weight and limit amounts of alcohol and caffeine. Their diet should include plenty of fruits, vegetables, grains and low-fat dairy foods.

While chronic kidney disease cannot be cured, the pro-


gression of the disease can be slowed and managed so people with the condition can make their kidneys last longer. They should see their doctor regularly, control high blood pressure and diabetes, follow a low-protein diet, not smoke, take medications as prescribed and maintain normal cholesterol levels.



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
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# A LITTLE BIT OF HEAVEN

## Frank Veglia's Vegetable Garden

In the November 2011 issue of the Reporter, we described how John Moser and his friend Patrick McElhenny had turned an unkempt, uneven walkway on the north side of Dorchester K into a pretty garden path. Frank Veglia's garden, on the opposite, south side of the Village, is a different kind of garden. He grows vegetables.

His garden reminds me of

the old Victory Gardens we had during World War II. People had them in their yards and almost anywhere. There was a huge one, shared by a number of families, near Fenway Park, home of the Red Sox, in Boston.

Frank and his wife, Ginger, come from Revere, Mass., on the north side of Boston. They have been married for 60 years and have five children plus grandchildren. Frank was a plasterer, having learned the trade when he was fourteen. The family has a summer home in Ossipee, New Hampshire.

It was a very common thing to grow vegetables in Revere. Some of the people there had chickens and pigs, grew corn eight-feet high in their front and back yards, and drank goat's milk. Frank and Ginger brought their talents down to Century Village when they came here in 2006. One of his was growing vegetables, and one of hers was cooking and baking—an unbeatable combination if you ask me.

"We found one of the best places to live in Century Village," says Frank. "I love it here—it's quiet and there's no crime. I live the life of Riley." His garden faces the dogleg portion of the old Turtle Bay Golf Course. There is a picnic table beside the garden enclosure.

Frank does most of the gardening, helped some by his

friend Anthony Marsillo, but others are always coming by to watch and talk. "They come on foot, by car, and by bicycle," says Frank. Three friends dropped by during the hour I was with him and Anthony.

Among the vegetables Frank has grown are red potatoes, tomatoes, eggplant, green peppers, artichokes, bush beans, and basil. "Runoff into a nearby canal supplies most of the water we need," explains Frank. "I have had to bring in loam and cow manure. I fertilize as needed, usually every two to three weeks."


Opposite the garden, on the opposite side of a road, are two more picnic tables, which are used when the Veglias and their relatives and neighbors have a barbecue. This is OFTEN," says Frank. "We don't limit ourselves to the holidays. We eat out there all the time." To make sure I got the true picture of their enjoyment, he said: "We have mad barbecues!"

It does sound like the life of Riley to me: the outdoors, the camaraderie among neighbors, fresh vegetables, Ginger's incredible cooking, and the frequent barbecues.

When life gets hectic for me and I need a break, I have an invitation to head for Frank's garden, swap stories with him and his pals, and munch on a fresh tomato.



## Camille Carrier: A Volunteer



Camille Carrier was born and grew up in Quebec, Canada. He joined the Canadian National Defense Army as a private in 1952, when he said his country was asking for volunteers for the Korean War. This act became the beginning of Camille's volunteer service that progressed through the years from the military to religious organizations and ultimately to Century Village.

But to backtrack, he didn't go to Korea, but in 1953 his unit was sent with the United Nations Peace Keepers to the Congo for six months. His first tour to the Middle East was to the Gaza Strip in 1964; then in October 1973, he was there during the Yom Kippur War in the Golan Heights. Carrier also spent time in diverse locations that included Cairo, Egypt; Newfoundland; Resolute Bay in the

Northwest Territory; Jamaica; and Fort Sill, Oklahoma. He also spent nine years in Germany. He retired with the rank of Warrant Officer in 1979.

He didn't stay idle. Camille began a new career with the Canadian Customs Department during the '79 year. Part of his service with this department was spent at what is considered one of the most isolated ports between the United States and Canada, Checken, Alaska. 

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
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# WHAT, ME VOLUNTEER?

"I don't want to get involved." Or, "I'm here to enjoy my vacation." How often do board members hear these excuses?

There are many association boards that are being run with two, maybe three members, and sometimes these people are seasonal leaving the association with no one to represent them or make decisions for six months or more.

If you speak to officers of the many associations in our Village you will hear the same lament. "We can't get our residents to come forward to be on the board or to even get interested in their buildings". They continued, Do these residents realize that their board is independent? That they control their own budgets and approve the amount of money for their monthly assessments? Do they know that the work being done on their building, new roofs.

painting and insurance coverage are all determined by their individual board members?

On February 3, there was a regularly scheduled meeting of the UCO delegates. President David Israel announced that there were 199 delegates present. But, there were 150 associations that had no delegate present. At this meeting candidates for the upcoming UCO elections were announced and then nominations were taken from the floor, but, 150 buildings were not represented!

Ed Black, UCO Treasurer, said all associations should remember to file a list of their officers with their seal on it at the UCO office every year. He said, "Very often we have a question or a problem and need to speak to a officer and come to find out they are no longer in office." He continued, "The worst scenario would be if a association did not have a board. They would

have to go into receivership and have a lawyer handle their affairs. This could lead to a cost of thousands of dollars a year that the building owners would have to pay."

Here's an example of what can happen when association owners are not active. In 2008 a couple from Canada bought a unit in the Village. The wife joined the board. When they returned in 2009 they asked to see the financial statements. They said after a review of the statements and accounts they found discrepancies. The amount of money missing from their reserves was in the thousands. After all the legal issues were resolved there were only three members left on the board. As of this date there are four

board members including the Canadian couple. She is still the president.. At their recent general meeting there was a total of five people present. They had no quorum. The president said, "No one votes, no one cares. No one asks any questions." She continued, "When I leave, I basically run the building from Canada."

Of course, you have the other side of the coin. One association with 26 units said that for several years their building has been functioning smoothly. They have a board with seven active members. Four of the members are full-time residents. Each board member has a specific area of responsibility and they report back on their activities at their meetings. The officers

keep in touch with all the owners on a regular basis and ask them to participate in building matters wherever they can help. At the end of the season they have a covered dish get-together that all the residents are invited to attend, including the renters.

On March 2 there will be UCO elections for the president, vice president, treasurer, executive board, corresponding and recording secretary. There will be a candidates forum on Feb. 27, at 9 a.m. at the clubhouse. Although only the delegates vote on March 2 all owners should attend and let their delegates know what their preferences are.

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
### Reader's Corner

LENORE VELCOFF

David Baldacci has a new lead character, John Puller, in *Zero Day*. He is a combat veteran and a military investigator. In some ways he is similar to Lee Child's Jack Reacher, i.e. military issues, goes only by his surname, a big man who can look after himself, no partner and a little inept socially.

Puller is given the job of finding the murderer of a colonel in the Defense Intelligence Agency, his wife and children in a West

Virginia coal mining town. There he meets up with Samantha Cole, a local detective. They work together to uncover the secrets in this small town and the closer they get to the truth, the higher the body count rises. He also meets an interesting group of locals, from the wealthy coal industry baron (who also happens to be Cole's brother-in-law) to her brother and sister and others who all work in coal mining. Some are likable, most



pathetic.

Though the good guy is perfect, larger than life, and the bad guys are really evil, you aren't just reading about Puller – you're really living his military life. There are many acronyms used that are explained but they make for a little slower reading as I had to keep looking back for reminders.

I've come to expect a certain type of novel from Baldacci: government agencies, a conspiracy/cover-up/terrorist threat, even a going against the clock to diffuse a bomb schtick. But I don't want to reveal too much of the plot. Baldacci sets the scene well, the action is fast paced and the characters are believable. The reasons he sells so many books is that he doesn't often vary from his formula. The raw language is kept to a minimum in this book but the thrills are kept to a maximum.

## *A Simple Recipe for Irish Bread*

March 17th, is St. Patrick's Day, along with the traditional corned beef, cabbage and boiled potatoes, we have a special treat contributed by Kathleen Taylor Guarnagia, of Irish Bread.

On a visit to her sister Phyllis, who lived in Boston, Massachusetts, in 1959, she not only fell in love with the city, but eventually found her true love, Domenic. They married and were blessed with a daughter, Sheila and a son, William, both of whom married and have given them three grandsons to enjoy and pamper. Once they became full time residents of Wellington D, both became involved in the community, Kathleen, is involved in WOW, C.E.R.T., The Centenarian Party Committee and True Sisters,



and is the current Treasurer of her Association. Domenic, of course is one of our valued UCO Vice Presidents. ### Ingredients:

3 cups all purpose flour  
 3/4 cup granulated sugar  
 3 teaspoons baking powder  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 stick (4 tablespoons) butter  
 1 large egg  
 1 cup buttermilk  
 2 cups raisins (I use golden raisins but you can use dark raisins or a combination of both)

### Method:

Toss together first four dry ingredients. Knead into dry mixture ? stick of butter. Add egg which has been beaten into milk. Fold in raisins. Place mixture into a greased and floured 9" cast iron frying pan or 9" cake pan. Bake for approximately 45 minutes in a preheated 350 degree oven. Test for doneness, bread should sound hollow when tapped with your fingers. At this point, remove from oven, cool in pan about five to ten minutes and then turn bread out onto a wire rack. When bread is completely cool you can slice and serve.

## Transportation

I've listened to your complaints, and they are numerous. Makes me think of the Punch List for the paving that was done recently. Most of the complainers are seasonal residents who left us in the spring and returned to find a new bus company, new drivers, and route changes galore. The changes were hard to accept. The UCO Reporter has had monthly columns with information about changes. Some people ask for the Reporter to be mailed to them when they are away. Others read it on the Internet. Keeping informed is quite important.

Today we are offering a quiz, to see how much you know about the new bus schedule.

You are at the Clubhouse for a meeting or class which ended about 11:45 and you want to go home. How do you get there? Remember, the BIG change is the addition of a NOON bus to Publix. Get on it! Stay on it, and wait till it leaves Publix--the driver will then take you to the bus stop nearest to your home. You should be home before 1 p.m. If there are just a few

passengers, you may be home even earlier. Try it--you'll be pleased.

By now it has occurred to you that the Publix driver gets a lunch break from 1 till 2. But you still have the #1 leaving the clubhouse at 1:30--the busiest time of the day.

Have you considered changing your schedule to avoid this crush? I used to take the first bus in the morning so I'd be home by lunch, and then found it difficult to get a seat--and this was during the "off season" with fewer residents here. Changed my schedule and learned that it was more sensible to take the 10 a.m. bus on many occasions.

Why have we stopped the Monday/Wednesday excursion trips? Simply: money. Our prior bus company was providing these trips at no charge. Our current contract can be changed to accommodate us with two buses weekly--IF we are willing to invest \$46,800 and IF the change is presented to (a) the Officers Meeting (b) the Executive Board AND [c] the Delegate Assembly. With 13,000 residents here in season, and only 200 using buses, what chance do you think we have to convince them how important it is to spend this additional money for our pleasure?

Remember: everyone pays for this common element. Recently I have been bombarded with opinions and needs for individuals, and have tried to explain that this is a common expense, absorbed by all 13,000 residents--majority rules.

Beyond the cost of the bus and driver, there is the cost for fuel. Prior months have averaged \$11,000--our budget can't handle much more than that.

Be grateful that we have a 7-day bus service on buses that are in perfect condition, and drivers that have passed many tests to prove their ability and their courtesy to all. You can always fill out a form (from the Ticket Office) with your constructive criticism.

Each of us has some sort of personal problem, and your phone calls to my home will have to end. You may leave YOUR number at the UCO office and I may return your call at my convenience, probably within two days. Thanks for understanding human errors.



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## Security

### AL MC LAUGHLIN

We sure are in season with almost 26,000 guests entering

CV during the month of January. There has been an increase of troubles at the gate and on the property. Residents are not calling in their guests or delivery/service people. Over 600 people were refused entry during the month of January because NO ONE CALLED them in. This problem must be addressed. You, as residents, must call and tell us to allow your guests to enter the village. We do not stop any guest that you have called in, we only stop those people that

are not authorized. If you cannot call in someone you may come to the gatehouse and show us your residents ID and give us your address and your guest's name. You also could come to the gatehouse and bring them through with your ID. YOU must let us know that you invited them into Century Village.

At this months Security Meeting, we received several reports of rude and abusive residents. We have cameras at each gatehouse to provide

proof and record the incoming cars in the Visitors Lane and their conversation with the guards. Some people have been nasty to the guards and it has been recorded. Until now we have suggested that the rude residents please be kinder to the people that are working to keep their home's safe and without unwanted visitors. It seems that many people don't care to listen to our requests, so now we are going to be more active with our enforcement. The call-in system for the

phone and the transponder system for the cars are considered a privilege for a resident. Privileges could be suspended for a few weeks if traffic is stopped by an argument or abuse by a resident at the gate.

Finally, when you call someone into the village you are responsible for their actions since THEY ARE VISITING YOU. If your guests damage property or abuse other residents we will ask for your help in correcting the bad behavior.



## Health

The new service is actually the old service. AMR will take over transports soon.

AMR is actually the continuation of the original ambulance service that was here when Century Village started. The original service was bought out approximately six times and is now part of a 3.2 billion dollar conglomerate. Many of the people have been doing transports here in the village for over 20 years. I have personally worked for AMR for over 20 years. I am mostly retired now but still give them a few hours a week just to stay busy.

The important thing to know about the ambulance, and your insurance as well as the Century Village contracts, is that not every trip is covered. If you dial 911 your

insurance will cover with a deductible. The contract with AMR covers this deductible. If the Fire department decides to transport you, the contract has no effect.

The problem comes in when you are sent home. In order for medicare or your HMO to cover you there must be medical necessity. If the hospital has treated you and released you, medicare feels you have been cured and may not pay. Just because the Hospital has called an ambulance does not mean that you need one, make sure that the discharge planner has verified that your insurance will pay. Be aware that when you are having health problems there are often multiple ambulance calls. Just because the hospital sends you home does not mean that you are cured. Many people come home and wind up calling 911 that same day for a return trip. This can go on for many trips until they send you to a rehab facility. All of these trips will add up to large bills for return trips unless there is found to be medical necessity.

## Maintenance

**DOM GUARAGIA**

Have you been contemplating repainting your building exterior? This is both the time climate wise and an opportunity to involve the Winter residents in color selection, should you desire to abandon WHITE. Stucco-covered concrete block exteriors should be repainted every eight (8) years or sooner. Sun and rain are the eroding agents that the stucco should be protected against.

Painting contractors have different opinions on whether to use 100 percent vinyl acrylic paint or elastomeric paint. The jury is still out. Sealing or priming the surfaces after power washing has left the surface devoid of moisture and loose paint is an important step. Care should

be taken that windows, doors, and surfaces to which paint should not be applied are masked or covered. The upper floor walks receive a lot of wear when furniture, appliances and foot traffic scuff the surface, requiring more frequent painting, perhaps every three (3) years.

As you may recall, a two-page check list, to make everyone aware of building maintenance, exterior and interior water and electrical issues, will reduce costly repairs that through proper inspections and timely maintenance can be averted. If your association didn't perform those tasks or wishes to utilize the check list, it can be accessed by visiting the UCO Office and talking with me for a review. With the effort of most associations performing these inspections, water related damages have been greatly reduced.

With input from the Insurance Committee, new efforts, to be revealed in forthcoming issues, will be initiated for additional preventive maintenance steps that will reduce further catastrophic damage as our buildings mature; i.e. aging pipes (cast iron and copper tubing). New Code changes and innovative materials and techniques make repairs simpler and less costly for both elec-

trical and plumbing repairs. The "Third Nail Project" was a well conceived idea but the accessibility of adequate room to carry out the plan created more damages to ceilings than the costs for the installing the nail. It was scrapped before it created more damage than it solved.

Looking ahead, we will once again, according to the Weather Bureau, experience a 'rainy season' of extreme drought in South Florida. Since we are using reclaimed water, we will continue to irrigate twice a week. Purchasing reclaimed water, from the Palm Beach County Water Utility, will continue throughout the Summer months adding up to one million gallons to our lakes, lagoons and canals daily. It is prudent that the planting of sod, flowers and shrubbery be curtailed during a drought period. Your maintenance management company should be well versed in dealing with the irrigation policy set forth by UCO. Recently hired landscape maintenance crews can be informed by inquiring at the UCO Office.

Enjoy the Winter months here in Florida, especially the myriad of amenities here in your Village but be aware of the systems and structure that you share with others.

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

## Insurance

**TONI SALOMETO**

As many of you who have Homeowners' policies expiring in the last few months know, the premiums from last year have gone up drastically. I don't mean \$100; I mean \$200, \$300 and up. In the last few weeks I've seen instances of 45% increases over last year. Personally, my policy went up 25% this year, which makes it two years of double digit increases. No losses personally or for my Association. I own, live here all year, do not rent—what have I done? Why are my premiums going up?

Citizens, the insurance company for "uninsurable"

accounts, has become the competition of other standard markets. When they got the OK to increase premiums, the remainder of the markets joined in. Making the situation just a little more awful is the departure of Allstate from writing new business. When I queried an agent of my acquaintance, "What's going on?" I was told that there have been losses. My problem with that answer is that we haven't had any bad weather in the state this year. Unfortunately, that has not been the case nationwide, in Europe and Asia. In our interconnected world, what affects one insurance market, affects another.

If your increase in premium is reasonable, and only you can decide what is reasonable for you, then accept your premiums and realize that you are better off than a lot of your neighbors. If the increase that you've been quoted is more than you can tolerate, then I recommend you re-market your policy to other agents in the area.

Before approaching an agent,

review your policy for limits and coverage's. Are the building limits too high or low? If your limit is too high, you're maybe paying too much, but if the limit is too low and if you have a loss, you'll be paying for most of the loss yourself. The decision is yours.

Please give yourself enough time to re-market your policy. You are unlikely to get a quote in 24 hours, so give the agent enough time to work on your account. Sometimes the more time available, the better the result. On the other hand, bad news always comes quickly.

We have a list of agents at UCO who are writing Homeowners' insurance. We gave a copy out at the March Delegates Assembly, but if you didn't get a copy, stop at the front desk to get one. And, if you know of a good agent that's not on the list, feel free to share that information with the rest of your neighbors and us at UCO. Your recommendation is the most valuable.

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# Help others plan their end-of-life care by taking control of your own


versation.

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

## A NOT-TO-BE-MISSED EXHIBITION AT THE FOUR ARTS

THE SOCIETY OF THE FOUR ARTS in Palm Beach has an exhibition not to be missed. Recapturing the

Real West: The Collections of William I. Koch explores the subject of western expansion in America during the 19th and 20th centuries.

Most Century Villagers come primarily from the northeast. Some originated abroad, from north or south of this great land or overseas. Our knowledge of the historic American west derives mainly from novels or films. William I. Koch fell in love with the west at an early age, and now he shares "The Real West" with us.

What drove our countrymen years ago to risk the often hazardous journey across this continent? Adventure. Defeating the French and British in wars. Economics. The notion that despite hostile Indian tribes who fought them, land was theirs for the taking, as were animal furs. And gold, discovered in California. Transportation improved. Stage coaches literally carried people along. Railroads followed. The good soil encouraged cattle raising. That led to cattle drives, cattle rustling. The Homestead Act and other government decrees inspired settlers. The American Dream, to them,

was reality. If Europeans were establishing colonies, America's Manifest Destiny was to expand its territory across the whole of North America, everywhere

spreading its political, social and economic influences!

Come to the Four Arts. Outside, on the lawn stand real, old stage coaches, some familiar from motion pictures, some not. Enter, and you're transported to the frontier west. Among other things the museum staff has set up a small grocery store, (some few products still sold today!) There's a saloon. (Sorry, no samples, and you can't buy.) There's a bit of a bordello. (Nuh, uh! No buying here, either, although old-time posters advertising whiskey and booze use sex to push their products.)

There are guns, rifles and pistols, galore. Polished and cleaned, they're not just weapons but genuine works of art. Many hung paintings are extraordinary. The subject matter speaks for itself, but clearly, the artists had a marvelous sense of color, sunlight and grass, and motion, from Indian fighting and bucking cattle to human dancing. (Lots of references to dance halls here.) The bronzes are amazing for their detail. One could spend an hour studying a bronze called The Stampede. There are mens'
