## REFLECTION BAY GETS A MULLIGAN!

Mulligan? What's a mulligan? Most people know what a mulligan is, but for those who are not golfers, it's a "do-over" or the chance to take another shot. Of course, you won't see this being done on the pro tour or if you play with an organized club.

Reflection Bay developer Andrew Waldman got his "mulligan" on Thursday, Oct. 25 from the Palm Beach County Commissioners when they voted to grant him a postponement so he could present his new zoning petition application to the Department of Planning, Zoning & Building regarding changes to the Reflection Bay Master Plan.

In his letter dated Oct. 19 to the Palm Beach County Planning, Zoning & Building Department that was written by Kieran Kilday from Urban Design Kilday Studios, who represents Waldman, Kilday said he needs a 60-day postponement to present a new plan to replace his client's original application. Kilday said the UCO Officers from Century Village also expressed a desire for a postponement to further consider the proposed changes.

Continuing, he wrote that he understands that this request for postponement requires the approval of the Board of County Commissioners.

The new plan that was submitted now includes a nine-hole golf course, a "virtual" driving range, an enlarged assisted-living facility, an inn and 55 less residential units.

The Commissioners voted to grant the postponement by a vote of 4-3. Commissioners Aaronson, Vana, Abrams and Taylor voted for the postponement. Commissioners Burdick, Santamaria and Marcus voted against it. Also of note, the postponement was granted for 90 days minimum instead of 60 that was originally asked for. The reason for the extended 30 days or more, the commissioners explained, was that 60 days would not give the various staffs time to complete the necessary paperwork.

Leading up to the Commissioner's meeting, a vote was held Friday Oct. 19 at a Special UCO Officer's Meeting on the following motion: "To approve a requested postponement to County Commissioners in order for sufficient time to study new proposal on table."

A large crowd of residents attended this meeting from the Pro-Active Committee, the Welcome Neighbor group and other Village residents.

Emotions ran high at this meeting with Village residents voicing their opinions on this motion. There were pleas for us to work together to gain approval for this new plan and those who objected to this motion voicing their concern that the commissioners would consider this motion as approval for the new plan. Other issues discussed were the elimination of the perpetuity clause and the Plat 14, the UCO vote from a few years ago in which the delegate assembly voted to support the Pro-Active group and their stance based on a letter written in 1973 from a county official stating that the land would be kept as a golf course in perpetuity.

Just a brief background on how this new proposed plan came about: UCO President David Israel received a letter from Waldman written on August 29 asking to meet with the UCO officers and some Pro-Active representatives. In response, Israel set up a meeting on Sept. 19 with the UCO

Officers, Ana and Andrew Waldman, H. Irwin (builder of Century Village) and his son Mark Levy, Phil and Barbara Shapkin and Honey Sager from the Pro-Active group. At this meeting, the respective attendees discussed and questioned aspects of the Reflection Bay plan, their objections to it and suggestions as well. The next day, Sept. 20, Waldman sent another letter to Israel (received Sept. 25) saying that he felt there might be interest on the part of the Village to include in his plan,

"A more comprehensive assisted-living facility than the one currently planned, as well as restaurants and a nine-hole golf facility and driving range (without a discussion of who will own or maintain the facility and range)." He continued, "This would mean a conceptual reconfiguration of the retail and residential components of our project." Then came the aforementioned Special Officer's Meeting and the Officer's motion to recommend a postponement.

Will we meet again for another round? Either way, keep your scorecard handy.

# UCO Delegate Assembly Minutes – October 5th, 2012

President David Israel called the meeting to order. All officers except Bob Marshall and CAM Rodger Carver were present.

Guests included Dave Aronberg, Dina Keever, Rep. Mark Pafford, Peyton McArthur Senior Administrative Assistant to Commissioner Paulette Burdick.

- There were 203 delegates present for a quorum.

PBSO Capt. Bruckner led the Pledge of Allegiance

A plaque was presented to PBSO Lt. DiBernadino thanking him for his years of service to our Village.

- Delegate Jeanette Veglia asked to make a point of order on the motion made at the Executive Board meeting on Oct. 1st. She said Honey Sager made a motion, seconded by Phil Shapkin, to include in the budget a 98-cent line item to cover legal fees for the Pro-Active Committee. Dave Israel explained that the motion was out of order and therefore was not voted on.

- Crime Report - PBSO Lt. John Hill reported two burglaries, both in residential units..

- Two tires were stolen from a car left in the UCO office parking lot. The owner went on a trip and left his car in the lot. A report was made to the Sheriff's Office.

PBSO Det. Michael Antinoro was introduced. His assignment now includes the Village.

- The minutes were accepted with correction noted. (In crime report, para 4 should have read Military Trail not Military Drive).

- Treasurer's Report: There were no questions. Dorothy Tetro, Treasurer, presented 2013 budget for approval. She pointed out there was a line change on WiFi and budget was now in final form. She said the bylaws call for the budget to be voted on in October. Speakers were told they would have two minutes to speak and would have to wait until other speakers had spoken before they could have a rebuttal.

- David Israel, said the request or motion to have the 98 cent line for the Pro-Active Committee included in the 2013 budget had to be discussed at the Finance Committee, and voted on by the Officers' and Executive Board. This advice was from our advisory chair and attorney. The delegate's assembly is a policy-making body. The budget has to be modified by the Finance Committee and approved by the Officers and Executive Board.

- A long discussion followed on the budget.

- Ed Grossman and other speakers asked the delegates to turn the budget down.

- Several people spoke on the motion made at the Delegates meeting to have the 98-cent item for the Pro-Active Committee included in the budget.

- Bettie Bleckman said she took the minutes at the Oct. 1, Executive Board meeting

and they reflected that a motion had been made to accept the budget when the 98-cent motion from the Pro-Active Committee was made. No vote was taken on the motion, and the Executive Board was referred back to the original budget motion that was on the floor. The Pro-Active Committee motion was out of order and not voted on. The budget motion passed.

- Ed Black made a motion to approve the 2013 budget, seconded by Bob Rivera.

- Phil Shapkin made a motion for a roll call, seconded by Ed Grossman

- The roll call motion failed after 51% of delegates polled said no.

- Randall Borchardt advised that there should be a motion made to accept the budget today. If this passes a motion should then be made to vote to approve the budget.

- The two budget motions were passed. The budget was approved by a vote of 117 delegates.

- President's Report: David Israel said there is a discussion with the County Commission on a possible grant to help us with cost of WiFi.

The light pole and fence, damaged in an accident several months ago, on Okeechobee has been repaired.

- Officers Reports

- Phyllis Richland said that FPL will not offer a credit on their bills for the coming year

for those in need. She was told they have lost their funding. She is still trying to pursue this.

- Joy Vestal thanked Bettie Bleckman for filling in for her at Executive Board meeting and said she had every confidence that Bettie's notes were correct.

- Marilyn Pomerantz said Eva Rachesky from WPRF said the Camden Pool should be completed in about three weeks.

- Barbara Cornish asked for volunteers on a call-in basis to help out at UCO.

- Dom Guarnagia said there are three permits open on the paving job but the punch list is now being addressed. The striping of parking spaces is still being checked.

- Dorothy Tetro said a decision was made to keep the Plymouth Laundry open. The hours have been expanded to 6 am-10 pm. There will be an increase in prices but a final decision had not been made. Ed Grossman said he wanted to see the bills for the laundry. Dorothy said she would meet with him Monday, Oct. 8 at 11 am at the UCO Office to review all pertinent bills for the laundry room.

- A resident asked why there are no lights on at our entrances. Dom said they are being worked on and there is a \$30,000 provision in next year's budget for beautification of our entrances.

- New Business: Gus Petrides from the Welcome Neighbor group suggested a discussion with Andrew Waldman and

officers on Reflection Bay. David Israel said there was a recent meeting with Andrew and his wife, H. Irwin and Mark Levy, the UCO Officers and two members of the Pro-Active Committee. Waldman said he might consider a new plan to just build an assisted living facility, restaurant, a driving range and 9-hole golf course. He was told there is much objection to the residential housing that is part of his plan. He was told to put any changes in his plans in writing. David Israel said there has been no new plan filed as of this date.

- Peyton McArthur said there has been no change in Waldman's plan. If there was it would have to go back to the Building and Zoning Department for approval. As of this date there has been no change in the plan.

- Ed Grossman asked how a document is accepted at the UCO office. Barbara Cornish said if he delivers his correspondence to the reception desk it will be dated and signed by a UCO volunteer who will then deliver it to the treasurer.

- Committee Reports: Roberta Boehm-Fromkin, chairperson of the Search/Nominations Committee announced that there will be elections for two vice-presidents and 10 Executive Board members in the coming months. She asked all candidates to e-mail her their bios at rgwlbf@gmail.com.

**Good and Welfare:** The Pro-Active Committee announced a town hall meeting Friday, Oct. 19, 9:30 am in the Clubhouse to discuss plans for Oct. 25 County Commission meeting and to sign up for buses. There will be a rally on Haverhill Road, Oct. 22, 2-4 p.m.

- A report was given on WiFi survey.

- Florence Molinari asked to read her letter sent to the County Commissioners on the golf course. A suggestion was made to have it distributed instead.

- David Givens spoke on traffic law violations in the Village.

Meeting was adjourned by unanimous decision.

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# President's Report

## Cherry-picking The Bilateral Agreement

*In Union there is Strength* -Aesop

Recently, I have received requests to revise the Bilateral Agreement between certain Associations and UCO. These requests I believe have not been well considered. The concept behind the Bilateral Agreement was to allow UCO to negotiate certain enumerated services at the best possible price; this is based upon the economic principle of "Economy of Scale". If certain Associations decide to opt-out of certain components, or for that matter, all of the Agreement, those economies are eroded and lost.

Let's have a look at some of the specifics; as you may have forgotten, the Bilateral Agreement has been renewed each year since inception circa 1999 and will continue to automatically renew unless notice to cancel is given to UCO 90 days prior to its expiration. UCO has in its files, some 275 signed agreements with the Associations. Those who have not signed the Agreement have nonetheless benefitted from its provisions since its inception.

As an example, all Associations currently have available these UCO provided Community Services under the agreement: a. Security, b. Transportation, c. Cable television, d. Irrigation, e. Investigations of purchasers and renters,, f. Bulk insurance coverage, g. Call-in privileges, Gate passes, Transponder lane usage, Campus patrol., h. Ambulance Service, and more.

Each of these services requires all Building Associations to participate so that UCO can fund the considerable expenses related to each service, at the lowest possible cost. Our

attorney consistently advises that if any one Association is allowed to cherry-pick only those certain services it wants then the resulting revenue drop jeopardizes all services. For this reason, according to the Attorney, UCO must never allow "cherry picking" and should not allow any Association to evade its obligations under the Bi-Lateral Agreement.

UCO is well aware that some Associations do not use the Investigative services we provide. This is not a very good idea, especially if you are using Internet background checks at some ridiculously low price. These checks cannot hope to compare with the world class firm that UCO employs to do your screening. As another example, are those Associations who have, for whatever reason, abandoned the UCO bulk Insurance program, UCO has a simple goal; the best coverage at the fairest price. If you have any doubts, bring your Association policies to the UCO office and let our Insurance Chair Toni Salometo analyze your coverage, it's not too late to come back to our program, because, have no doubt, that your leaving the program costs the rest of the Village money in the form of higher premiums

Finally, it must be said to those of you who have opted out of any service, or payment due, legally UCO reserves the right to enforce the Bilateral Agreement, and also the right to withhold services from those Associations that refuse to comply with the agreement; no Association has the right to escalate costs for the vast majority; to put it bluntly, UCO may have no other choice but to discontinue all services to those Associations and their residents.

## Smoke Alarm Safety

Smoke alarms are an important part of a home fire escape plan. When there is a fire, smoke spreads fast. Working smoke alarms give you early warning so you can get outside to safety quickly. During the first week of October, Palm Beach County Fire Rescue has responded to eighteen structure fires. Thankfully, there were no reported injuries to our residents from any of these fires but it gives us a great opportunity to stress the importance of having smoke alarms in your home. Below are several important safety tips and facts concerning smoke alarms.

- Install smoke alarms inside every bedroom, outside each sleeping area and on every level of your home.

- Roughly two thirds of home fire deaths happen in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

- Working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in reported home fires in half.

- All smoke alarms should be tested at least once a month using the test button.

- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.

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# Armistice Day

Armistice Day (which overlaps with Remembrance Day) is on 11 November and commemorates the armistice signed between the Allies of World War I and Germany at Compiègne, France, for the cessation of hostilities on the Western Front of World War I, which took effect at eleven o'clock in the morning—the "Eleventh hour of the Eleventh day of the

"Eleventh month" of 1918. While this official date to mark the end of the war reflects the ceasefire on the Western Front, hostilities continued in other regions, especially across the former Russian Empire and in parts of the old Ottoman Empire.

The date was declared a national holiday in many allied nations, to commemorate those members of the armed forces who were killed during the war. An exception is Italy, where the end of the war is commemorated on 4 November, the day of the Armistice of Villa Giusti.

After World War II, the name of the holiday was changed to Veterans Day in

the United States and to Remembrance Day in the countries of the British Commonwealth of Nations. Armistice Day remains an official holiday in France and Belgium.

In many parts of the world, people observe two consecutive minutes of silence at 11:00 a.m. local time as a sign of respect in the first minute for the roughly 20 million people who died in the war, and in the second minute dedicated to the living left behind, generally understood to be wives, children and families left behind but deeply affected by the conflict.

Edward George Honey suggested this gesture of respect in a letter to a British newspaper, although Wellesley Tudor Pole had established two ceremonial periods of remembrance based on events in 1917.[1][2]

From the outset, many veterans in many countries have also used silence to pay homage to departed comrades. The toast of "Fallen" or "Absent Comrades" has

always been honored in

silence at New Zealand veteran functions, while the news of a member's death has similarly been observed in silence at meetings. Presumably to coincide with the traditional 11 a.m. time for Armistice ceremonies taking place in Europe (due to the ten-hour time difference between Eastern Australia and Europe).

In the United Kingdom, beginning in 1939, the two-minute silence was moved to

the Sunday nearest to 11 November in order not to interfere with wartime production should 11 November fall on a weekday. After the end of World War II, most Armistice Day events were moved to the nearest Sunday and began to commemorate both World Wars. The change was made in many Commonwealth countries, as well as the United Kingdom, and the new commemoration was named Remembrance

Sunday or Remembrance Day.

\*To add a personal note, Dot Loewenstein related her story to us. Dot's father was among those liberating the few survivors in the Philippines, which included a ten-year-old boy named George Loewenstein. Meeting many years later, they became instant friends. Recently, Dot's dad died, quite fittingly, on Armistice Day.

*The Paris Wife* by Paula McLain is the story of Ernest Hemingway and his first wife Hadley Richardson's lives in Paris in the 1920s.. Though the book is fiction, it reads like a very believable memoir from Hadley herself.

Paris during that period (shortly after WWI) was a haven for several ex-patriot notables (F. Scott Fitzgerald, Gertrude Stein, James Joyce and Ezra Pound). It was an all accepting and decadent city and into this atmosphere moved a young Hemingway and his naïve, unglamorous older wife. Before he became known as the big game-hunting, hard drinking, womanizing giant of American literature, he was an unknown writer striving for success. The couple quickly learned to drink too much and party too hard.

McLain focused on the more depressing aspects of this era. She portrayed Hemingway as self-centered, egotistical, and less than an admirable human being, even though he loved

Hadley early on. She was considered the love of his life though he married four times.

I found the author portrayed Hadley to be a completely boring person. She did not seem to notice the world around her. She was a very passive individual who relied completely on Hemingway for fulfillment as she had no ambition of her own. She complained about not having enough money but the family had a nanny for their son (a child that Ernest did not want) and took month long vacations. One has to assume that she was jealous of the rich people who surrounded her and corrupted her husband. In fact, I liked her better at the end of the book.

McLain gives us an in depth look at the lives of the artistic community in Paris during the "lost generation" as much of the book is based on actual people and events. I found the book to be a good but not great piece of historical fiction.

Permit me to introduce myself.

I got into baseball in an unusual way when I was in my 30s while working in Detroit's City Hall (I'll tell you that story next month). Within a year of entering the baseball field, I headed a national baseball monthly publication and had the opportunity to interview many of yesterday's heroes including Joe DiMaggio, Bob Feller, Hank Greenberg, Ted Williams, many members of the Brooklyn Dodgers and several of your favorites.

My contacts led me to a front office position with the

Detroit Tigers where I was awarded a 1984 World Series ring in my first year of employment with the franchise. I struck out on my own in the 1990s and began writing books and worked with Hall of Fame sports-writer Joe Falls to compile star interviews in a three-hour tribute to Tiger Stadium in its final year of 1999.

The baseball beat has led me to many interesting people and places. I've seen the Philadelphia Phillies play in their three different homes – Connie Mack Stadium, Veterans Stadium and Citizens Bank Ballpark. I've seen the Pittsburgh Pirates play in three different home parks – Forbes Field, Three Rivers Stadium and PNC Park. I've been to Cincinnati's old Crosley Field (even wrote a book about it – "Crosley Field", Arcadia Publishing 2005), Riverfront



Stadium and Great American Ballpark.

Well before big league baseball returned to Washington a couple of years ago, I saw the Senators play in old Griffith Stadium and RFK Stadium. I've been to Brooklyn's famed Ebbets Field and the most unusual ballpark of all-time – the odd-shaped Polo Grounds across the Harlem River from Yankee Stadium. I saw numerous games in old Yankee Stadium before modernization robbed it of its uniqueness in 1975. I witnessed many games in the remodeled stadium before it was demolished and the Yanks moved into their new digs on the other side of the street.

I've been lucky enough to be in clubhouses, dugouts and on the field with many of baseball's greats and had the chance to sit with legendary writers in press boxes including Red Smith, then with the New York Times, perhaps the greatest sports columnist of all-time. I love these lines Smith is famous for writing: "Baseball is dull only to those with dull minds" and "Ninety feet between the bases is the closest to perfection that man has yet to achieve".

As you know, baseball is the only major sport where the clock doesn't matter. An inning isn't over until three outs are recorded and a team doesn't go down to defeat until it makes 27 outs. No other sport is filled with game-ending suspense. And, no other sport takes as much talent to play at the major league level. Michael Jordan proved it. Hailed as the world's greatest athlete, the basketball superstar left his game to try his hand at baseball. While he could run, throw and field, he couldn't even hit on a high minor league level while playing in the Chicago White Sox chain before returning to the hoops where he could star.

So we'll be talking baseball and most of the time remembering our heroes from the good old days.



# Food Is Love!



How many people did you prepare your traditional Thanksgiving dinner for -- 20, maybe 30? Just imagine how many turkeys and veggies Lidio Saicedo prepares to serve hundreds and hundreds of people on Thanksgiving. Of course he doesn't do this as most of us did at home, he's a manager at the Golden Corral Restaurant in Royal Palm Beach.

Last Thanksgiving, Saicedo said they made over 200 turkeys just for the restaurant alone. They also prepare turkey dinners to take out and they cater many groups as well. There are 5 cooks during the day and 5 at night along with two bakers and two salad preparers on each shift. For the turkeys alone, they use eight ovens that they start between 4-5 am the day of the holiday.

The vegetables are basically what we all enjoy on the holiday but, Saicedo said, "for the most part they are part of our daily menu. Of course, this includes the traditional stuffing,

green beans, broccoli and cauliflower. There are a wide variety of desserts, but pumpkin pie is a must on Thanksgiving."

There are approximately 55-60 people who work at the restaurant not including the managers. Saicedo said he started as a dishwasher at Golden Corral 12 years ago.

We asked several Village residents if they were going to cook for the holiday and for the most part they were going to eat out, either at a relative's home or at a restaurant. It seems that most of us enjoy Thanksgiving and all the memories we have of preparing the big dinner but as one resident who was asked told me, "Now, I'm thankful for reservations."

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# Proposed Amendments to the UCO Bylaws

(Additions shown by “underlining”, deletions shown by “~~strikeout~~”, unaffected text indicated by “. . .”)

## ITEM 1.

### ARTICLE VIII COMMITTEES

#### A. APPOINTIVE COMMITTEES

1. The President, with the advice and consent of the Officers' Committee, shall create appoint all such standing committees and such special committees and appoint the chairmen thereof, as they may deem necessary or advisable unless a different requirement is specified in these Bylaws. Any unit owner in Century Village who is a member of UCO, may be selected to serve as a member of any committee. Committees shall keep detailed and accurate records of their proceedings, including the vote or abstention of any member on any matter which comes before the committee. The President, with the advice and consent of the Officers' Committee, will also determine the mission and term of service of any such committee, unless otherwise provided in these Bylaws. ~~or the Articles of Incorporation~~. If the term of service of a committee is not otherwise designated, it shall be until the next March meeting of the Delegate Assembly.
  
2. The President, with the advice and consent of the Officers' Committee, may appoint UCO Members and/or the Licensed Property Manager as members of all such committees, with the exception of the Officers' Committee. The Licensed Community Association Manager (LCAM) shall not be a voting member of any committee. Committees thus formed may seek advice from whomever they desire, but may not incur any expense or obligate UCO for any expenditure without prior authorization, and subject to the provisions of Article VIII, Paragraph (C) 3. unless properly authorized beforehand.

#### B. SEARCH/NOMINATIONS COMMITTEE

1. In ~~November~~ October of each year, the President, with the advice and consent of the Officers' Committee, shall appoint a Search/Nominations Committee consisting of a chairman and no less than five (5) members.

#### C. FINANCIAL AND BUDGET COMMITTEE

1. There shall be established a Financial and Budget Committee consisting of the Treasurer as Chairman, and at least four (4) UCO members designated by the Treasurer, and approved by the President with the advice and consent of the Officers' Committee, with such powers and duties as may be stipulated by a vote of the Officers' Committee and the Executive Board. Among such duties will be the study of the monetary needs of UCO, and to present to the Officers' Committee and the Executive Board, at their September meetings, a proposed budget for the next fiscal year.

#### E. ELECTION COMMITTEE

1. There shall be an Election Committee appointed by the President, with the advice and consent of the Officers' Committee, whose duties shall be to conduct the election of UCO Officers and UCO Executive Board Members.

#### F. EDITORIAL COMMITTEE

- ....
- The Editorial Committee shall consist of an Editor, or Co-Editors if applicable, and up to four (4) Associate Editors, all selected by the President, ~~of UCO~~ and subject to the approval of the Officers' Committee, the Executive Board, and the Delegate Assembly. There shall be no more than four (4) Associate Editors who will be selected by the Editor or Co-Editors.

#### G. OPERATIONS COMMITTEE

- In accordance with Schedule “2” of the Millennium – UCO Operating Agreement, UCO will form an Operations Committee whose function is related to the operation of the Century Village – WPRF facility (the facilities within Century Village operated by WPRF). Said function to include, but not limited to, the making of all policy and control of all budgetary matters regarding operational expenses. The Operations Committee shall consist of all the Officers of UCO, and any other UCO members or other consultant(s) appointed by the President, with the advice and consent of the Officers' Committee. The committee's ~~tasks~~ duties and responsibilities are detailed in the Millennium Operating Agreement, Paragraphs 3 through 6 (pages 6 through 22).

**ITEM 2.**

**ARTICLE IX**  
**MEETINGS OF THE DELEGATE ASSEMBLY**

**C. SPECIAL AND EMERGENCY MEETINGS** – Special meetings of the Delegate Assembly may be held at any time on call of the President, or at the request in writing from any thirty-five (35) Delegates, for such purpose as may be specified in the call for such meeting. If the President declares that an emergency has arisen, a meeting may be called at his order, and notice may be given by any and all means available. Attendance by a Delegate at an a special or emergency meeting, shall constitute a waiver by him of any objection to the place, time, or manner of calling the meeting. constitutes waiver of notice and waiver of any and all objections to the place of the meeting, the time of the meeting, or the manner in which it has been called or convened, unless the member attends a meeting solely for the purpose of stating, at the beginning of the meeting, any such objection or objections to the transaction of affairs.

**D. NOTICE OF MEETINGS** – Notice of the time, date, place, and purpose of all special meetings of the Delegate Assembly and all meetings at which an amendment to the Bylaws or the Articles of Incorporation is to be considered, shall be given to each Delegate at least seven (7) days prior to the day on which the meeting is to be held. meeting whenever possible. Notice shall be given by personal delivery, publication in the UCO Reporter, by oral notice, or by first class mail. Notice of any meeting may be waived in writing by a Delegate or by attendance at such meeting as specified in Paragraph "C" above. In addition, meetings may also be announced by posting on the bulletin board at the UCO office, designated Association bulletin boards, Community Access Channel 63, electronically, and in the UCO Reporter. All Delegate Assembly meetings shall be open for attendance to all members of UCO.

**ITEM 3.**

**ARTICLE X**  
**EXECUTIVE BOARD**

**F. SPECIAL AND EMERGENCY MEETINGS** – Special meetings of the Executive Board may be held at any time on the call of the President or at the request, in writing, from twelve (12) members of the Board, for such purpose as may be specified in the call for such meeting. If the President declares that an emergency has arisen, a meeting of the Executive Board may be called at his order, and notice may be given by any and all means available. Attendance by an officer or a member at an a special or emergency meeting, of the Executive Board shall constitute a waiver by him of any objection to the date, time, location, or manner of calling the meeting. constitutes waiver of notice and waiver of any and all objections to the place of the meeting, the time of the meeting, or the manner in which it has been called or convened, unless the member attends a meeting solely for the purpose of stating, at the beginning of the meeting, any such objection or objections to the transaction of affairs.

**G. NOTICE OF MEETINGS** – Notice of the date, time and location of all meetings of the Executive Board and of the purpose of special meetings shall be given to each member of the Board at least seven (7) full days in advance of prior to the meeting whenever possible. Notice shall be given by personal delivery, publication in the UCO Reporter, by oral notice, or by first class mail. Notice of any meeting may be waived in writing by a member or by attendance at such meeting as specified in Paragraph "F" above. In addition, meetings may also be announced by posting on the bulletin board at the UCO office, designated Association bulletin boards, Community Access Channel 63, electronically, and in the UCO Reporter. All Executive Board meetings shall be open for attendance to all members of UCO.

**ITEM 4.**

**ARTICLE VII**  
**DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF OFFICERS**

**TREASURER** – The Treasurer shall keep a full and correct account of all cash receipts and disbursements, and deposit all funds in banks or financial institutions in the name of and to the credit of the organization. Such accounting of cash receipts and disbursements, electronic banking and payments, invoicing, financial recording and reporting requirements, and all other lawfully acceptable and required financial practices, including the electronic storage and transfer of information, financial and otherwise, shall be promoted and practiced by UCO.

All such deposits must be secured by United States government, or in bank Certificates of Deposit. However, said deposits of funds may be invested by loans to WPRF or its successors for “Operating Expenses” and/or the “Operational Budget” under the MILLENIUM UCO AMENDMENT TO LONG TERM LEASE. Said loans are to be repaid as decided upon in each case by the Operations Committee. He shall disburse the funds, as need may arise, accepting proper invoices or vouchers for such disbursements. Checks issued on behalf of UCO must be signed by the Treasurer and the President; however, except, that a Vice President may substitute for either, but one signer must be the President or the Treasurer. A check will not be issued which does not carry two (2) signatures. As used in these UCO Bylaws, “checks” and “signatures” shall be considered legally synonymous with “electronic checks” and “digital signatures” respectively. He shall be Chairman of the Financial and Budget Committee and shall, with the assistance of that committee, prepare an annual budget for approval by the Officers, the Executive Board, and the Delegate Assembly in October. He shall arrange for an annual audit of the books and records of the organization by a public accountant certified by the State of Florida. The Treasurer shall be ex officio a member of all committees except for the Election Committee.

## Welcome Neighbor Club – Insights and Outlooks on Reflection Bay

The Welcome Neighbor Club of Century Village is an organization of concerned and cordial residents of the community who have gathered with a vision to be a good neighbor and to do no harm to the well being of the community through factual education and information and to support the proposal for the development and completion of the property formerly used as a golf course facing Haverhill Road on the eastern border of Century Village. We were created and officially recognized as a club at Century Village in February, 2012 and have since held meetings on the first and third Wednesdays of every month at the Clubhouse Party Room from 9:00 – 11:00 AM (except for the summer when most of our members were away). My name is Gus Petrides, and I am the president of this group.

On October 25th, 2012, the Palm Beach County Board of Commissioners is going to make a very important decision to determine whether the property in question, which we will call Reflection Bay, (the former golf course), will be rezoned from a current Planned Unit Development zoning with a special exception for a golf course, to a Traditional Neighborhood Design zoning status. The tract of land in question is privately owned by Mr. Andrew Waldman and his wife Ana, and their hope is to turn an unproductive piece of real estate, currently contributing around \$20,000.00 (twenty thousand dollars) per year in taxes into an upscale traditional neighborhood design, a new concept in Florida, that will increase the county's tax base to the tune of around \$2,500,000.00, (Two and a half million dollars), per year. There is also a solid commitment from the Palm Beach Sheriff's Office to locate a Reflection Bay sub station at the development, along with the further security benefits of a continuous barrier fence with controlled access to Century Village, (like the security gates at Haverhill and Okeechobee), along with a very visible water barrier or lake feature, between Reflection Bay and Century Village. Lighting will be ample and Reflection Bay will itself have a security force protecting its property interests. Relative to what is in existence now this will be a huge increase in security for our own interests.

We are very pleased with the overwhelming support we are receiving for the development plans, but we want to make sure that any questions relating to concerns over the

project are resolved. Mr. Waldman has also stated that anyone who has suggestions for utilizing the area of the tract directly behind the Southampton Units – A, B, and C – will be welcomed. To date, that area is being left pristine, and will be maintained by Reflection Bay landscapers once the project is in place. It should also be noted that the residential density that is planned is about half of what is allowed by zoning rules, further contributing to the ecological preservation efforts being observed.

Because the Waldman's have invested so much of their personal time and money into the development of this dream they have, there is absolutely no merit to the rumors circulating that once zoning has been changed they will try to sell the property. They do not want to sell the property, peri-

od. Other concerns are with the engineering of traffic patterns, water and flood control, building heights, property values, and credibility of the approved plans. I have researched each of these concerns personally, and have found no reason to doubt the integrity, honesty, and sincerity of the claims and data that have been submitted to county engineers, and commissioners for approval. Reflection Bay will be a definite welcome neighbor to our community. The commercial services that will be offered will complement the lifestyle of Village residents, and offer opportunities for employment, relaxation, convenience, eating, entertainment, and other services. Businesses are already asking for projected completion dates when they can open here. There will be a bed and breakfast type of facility for

visiting friends and relatives, a health care facility for the elderly, cafes and other businesses that will add significantly to a lifestyle more conducive to what we all dreamed of when we planned to retire.


How this proposal became such a contentious issue, is beyond me. I can understand the concern of those who were reacting to unfounded rumors and hearsay, (I myself fell prey in the beginning), but as I slowly learned the facts and discounted the myths, my concerns and skepticism were quelled. Knowledge of the undisputed facts has a way of silencing the uninformed and shines a light on what the truth is.

We thank you all for the unconditional support you have given and with all the questions you have provided for us to resolve – in the process, we also learned much.

Reflection Bay will not only give a much needed boost to the economy, but provide a foundation for further development in an area that has been feeling the effects of crime, poverty, and disrepair for the last ten years. This area will become a welcome destination location that will spur further positive growth in the area. The Town Center that will be created will be a source of pride to the residents of both developments – Century Village and Reflection Bay – and property values will go nowhere but up, while area crime will go significantly down.

UOTS, or the United Order True Sisters, the oldest women's organization in the world was started by German Jewish Women, the wives of Jewish Doctors, in 1847. It was maintained as a secret society in order to spare indigents, who received money, food or clothing, from humiliation.

UOTS, said its President Marlene Schnitzer, is a non-sectarian National Cancer Service Organization, serving cancer victims both young and old. Its membership now consists of both men and women, and its national office is located in Delray, Florida.

The Palm Beach chapter has been in the village for 38 years and Marlene has been President for six of those years. There are more than 230 members in the chapter, 220 from Century Village!

Members work with the Pediatric Support Team at Palms West and St. Mary's Hospitals with children who have cancer and their families. For families who need help paying rent, electric bills, food, or for transportation to

other hospitals far and near, UOTS is there. Those needs are verified by a caseworker. UOTS also buys hospital equipment and its members make lap blankets, pillowcases, scarves and other hand-made items for the children.

A great summer experience for the children is when the organization sends them to Rock Camp each year, a camp for children with cancer.

The treat for the holidays is a holiday party sponsored by UOTS in December to which the organization brings a bag with approximately three gifts for the young patients and two for each sibling.

Where does the money come from you ask. From dues and generous donations. Other monies are realized from trips to interesting designations for a day or more, boat cruises, a Birthday Luncheon Celebration, card parties and more. On

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overlay, when the spaces were reduced from 10'-0" wide to 8'-6" to accommodate recycle bins (blue and yellow) and dumpsters as well.

One of Patsy Kline's songs was titled "Break It To Me Gently". This is as gentle as I can relate the situation. Discussions with the owner of M&M Paving revealed that walkways leading to the newly paved parking areas and driveways were, in fact, at differing elevations and not consistent. The paving must follow a straight line along the grass sloping down away from the parking area to the center of the road, where run-off can flow into the drainage system percolating into the sandy soil or, as in the Borden and Bath drain, flow into the lake. The Engineer's Report recommended milling at each concrete walkway. However, to do so would have created low areas (an undulating line) along the parking area at each walkway. Those low areas would create ponding instead of puddling where the asphalt meets the concrete.

The obvious resolution would have been to mill layered material out at least midway into the street at a tremendous expense for which the cost would have been prohibitive. This will surely lead to discontent with most associations regarding tripping and puddling. Conditions like Greenbrier, where short steep sloping

walkways easily transitioned from asphalt to concrete, finished far better than areas like Norwich, where settlement of long sloping concrete walkways lower than the new paving, create puddling which unfortunately affects passage.

The contractor was responsible for paving but not raising the concrete walkways that are at issue. Varying solutions from installing a 12" square drainage box in the grass, adjacent to the juncture to drain the puddle, to raising the end of the concrete walkway to eliminate puddling; the situation where water does not disappear in 24 hours. A simple and amicable solution is impossible and this is informational but not apologetic. A list of contractual items requiring completion follows:

- Thermoplastic rumble strips at the Okeechobee Gate exit.
- Delineators w/ reflectors at Chatham Isle and Fairway Street near the 'S' curve.
- 4" white line at the edge of the paving and the beginning of grassy areas along all roadways.
- Corrected spaces will have wheel stops centered on the space. Because the spaces do not coincide with the original configuration and attaining the maximum number of spots as the goal, unavoidably, there will be wheel stops encroaching on walkways.

## Insurance

We're writing for the November issue which makes us wonder where the year went. My Mom used to tell me not to wish away the years—they pass quick enough. Now I know what she meant.

Most of the hurricane season has passed. One more month and we'll be safe for another year. But it also means that I have to make my predictions for the upcoming renewal. I have been asking some of our agents how the market looks for premiums and the answers I've been getting is

that premiums will be going up, but not too badly. Our most expensive coverage is property and we should expect about 10% increases. We will have small increases in General Liability 5%-8% and Wind Buy Down of 15%. I am recommending that the management companies increase premiums 15% to 20% so you are not under-budgeted. Once again, the increases are due to circumstances outside our control -- Citizens increasing their premiums and the remainder of the market following them and major losses around the country and Europe/Asia affect the reinsurance markets. Folks, we can try and control what happens in the Village, but what goes on outside our gates is out of our control.

I'd also like to ask those Associations who have installed a lift to their building since June of 2006 to advise us. The addition of a lift, whether owned by the Association or a group of individual unit owners,

increases the building value of the Association. In case of a major loss, the repair or replacement of the lift would be part of the reconstruction. We are currently inspecting Associations for lifts to make sure we have their value on your policies. We'd appreciate your help in making sure we don't miss any.

The revised Mitigation reports continue to be requested. If you talk with your board and decide you want one or one of your unit owners needs it for their Homeowners' coverage, please call. It usually takes about a month from your call to us till you get the report, but we can ask for a rush, if need be.

Many Associations who do not currently write their insurance with UCO have asked to have us give them an estimated quote this year. If this is something your Association would like to do, please return the form that you were mailed back to us, or come in. This year, we will only be offering quotes to those we currently represent

or to those who request one.

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# WANTED! VOLUNTEERS FOR COP

You've seen the Sheriff's car, with the yellow flashing light and "Civilian Observer Patrol" on the side. These are your neighbors and friends driving through Century Village to enhance our security.

Our responsibility is to observe and report suspicious activity. If we see something not looking right or someone in trouble, we call 911 or the Sheriff's Department, depending on the occurrence.

We do not confront people directly. We cannot issue a summons or carry any weapons.

Occasionally, someone flags us down to ask a question—usually directions.

All COP participants volunteer for one 3-hour shift per week, attending one monthly meeting in the Clubhouse. All participants are trained before going out on the road. The Sheriff's Department provides the vehicle and oversees the program, confident it will deter criminal activity.

At a recent meeting,

someone told us that some apprehended criminals said they avoid Century Village because of the flashing lights.

The Palm Beach Sheriff's Office relies on our volunteer

members to provide the extra eyes and ears to assist the agency.

Crime in our area, inside and outside Century Village, is higher than it has been in

years. In a recent 30-day period, ten cars in the Village were entered and valuables were stolen. Lock your car!

Ideally, our Sheriff's car should be going through the Village 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, with a driver and observer. That's a dream, but we want to get closer to it.

Eight shifts a day with two people for 7 days a week requires 112 concerned residents. Won't you please be one of them?

This is an ideal way for

seasonal residents to serve the community.

COP currently has 20 seasonal residents, most of whom have now gone north, thus depleting our numbers. We need more permanent residents. Show a commitment to Century Village! Letting the "other guy" do it is not the way.

Hi folks! Well it looks like the season is back into full swing here in Century Village. Just want to take a bit of your time to welcome the new residents and also remind everyone that just because we live in a gated community, we are still subject to crime and accidents.

First and again, PLEASE lock your doors and windows for the evening and or when you go out or know you are going to be away for any period of time. This includes your car also! Ask a

neighbor to check your unit leaving them a key. If you like, ask them to get your mail for you -- OR you can request the Post Office to vacation-hold mail for you which they will be glad to do. How about canceling your newspaper delivery if you receive one? Don't forget that. Reason for these tips is because bulging mailboxes and papers left in front of your door tell someone you are away for a period of time -- a good opportunity for a thief to scope your place out and possibly break in. Do you put your valuables away when company comes? I don't care if it is family or your local repair man. If you don't need it, put it away. NEVER let persons "wander" around your unit alone. Family members steal also you

know. As far as your vehicle goes, remember the Sheriff's Office patrols our roadways and will (and does) give tickets out for running stop signs and speeding. Again, because we are a gated community this does not give you a license to break traffic

rules. Have an accident? Call 9-1-1 and try to remain calm. Give the call-taker all the details you can; i.e., Any injuries? Leaving the scene? Damage done? Tow truck needed? Type of vehicles involved? This helps determine how fast and what services are needed at the scene. If you happen to hit someone, and the "OTHER VEHICLE" is parked, Florida State Law requires you to leave a note with your name and information on

the damaged vehicle. Take a moment and think -- what if YOUR vehicle was hit and the other person left the scene? Be a good neighbor! I know my car was hit in the clubhouse lot and no one left information. But I have \$355.00 worth of damage to my bumper. "THANK YOU" to the person that did that to my car! Enjoy the season. UNTIL NEXT TIME -- BE SAFE and SECURE OUT THERE!!

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READ THIS! IT WILL HELP YOU  
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**PLAN AHEAD!** Those over 65 and persons with physical disabilities are in the greatest danger. Fires are unpredictable. Know ahead of time what to do and where to go. Make a plan and practice. Persons who may need extra help should sleep on the first floor. Plan your escape routes ahead of time! Make sure that they are known and be sure all windows and doors open easily. Designate a "Safe Meeting Place" away from the building where all members will meet. If the building is more than two stories, memorize where the closest exits and stairwells are.

## WHAT TO DO WHEN YOU HEAR THE FIRE ALARM

Stay calm, don't panic. Do not open a door that feels hot, use an alternate route. If the door is cool, open it slowly, proceed to the first exit. Go to the safe meeting place. DON'T GO BACK INTO A BURNING BUILDING! (A DAMP CLOTH OVER YOUR NOSE AND MOUTH AS YOU CRAWL LOW TO THE FLOOR HELPS.)

## IF YOUR CLOTHES CATCH FIRE

Stop, drop gently to the floor and cover your face with your hands. Roll to smother the flames using a blanket, rug or towel.

**NO SAFE WAY OUT?.....**Close yourself in your apartment and wait for the fire department.

Seal air ducts, and top and bottom of doors. Open a window SLIGHTLY at the top and bottom for ventilation. Signal firefighters by waving a white cloth out of the window or at night, a flashlight.

## BE SURE TO USE SMOKE DETECTORS. THEY ARE YOUR FIRST LINE OF DEFENSE!

Test all detectors at least once a month, replace batteries twice a year, or sooner if necessary.

Official records available free online on Clerk's office website

Have you recently received a "deed processing

notice" in your mailbox? If you did, make sure to throw it away!

I've put out multiple warnings in the past few years about private companies soliciting homeowners to buy "property profiles" or to pay for copies of their deeds. The most recent warning involved "Deed Processing Notices" sent by a company called Secured Document Services in Washington, D.C.

That company's notice

resembled a bill, and told property owners to send \$85 and a \$35 service fee if the amount was sent after the "due date."

It's important that property owners remember that they don't need to have a copy of their deeds, which are on file at the Clerk & Comptroller's office. Uncertified copies may be downloaded and printed free by using the Official Records search on the Clerk's website,

## Commissioner PAULETTE BURDICK

I am very pleased to tell you that Palm Beach County has adopted an ordinance requiring gas stations and convenience stores with two or more attendants on duty to prominently display their store's telephone number on the gas pumps so that disabled motorists can call for refueling assistance.

For the second year in a row, Palm Beach County held the tax rate flat with the approval of a \$3.88 billion budget for fiscal year

2013 (Oct. 1, 2012 – Sept. 30, 2012) which includes \$829.5 million in property taxes and \$1.4 billion carried forward for capital projects. The additional funding comes from state and federal grants and enterprise funds (departments which operate like businesses, Palm Beach International Airport and Water Utilities, which are funded from their own revenue).

The County Commission has directed staff to begin

negotiations for the sale of Mecca Farms to the South Florida Water Management District, SFWMD. The District will buy the 1,919 acre Mecca Farms site in North County with a cash payment of approximately \$30 million and would also transfer 1,500 acres of land to Palm Beach County. The agreement will benefit both the county and the SFWMD. The county will be able to reduce its debt and the district will have land that could be used to clean water that flows to the Everglades by giving the district another place to store water. It will also provide a flow way for fresh water to the Loxahatchee River, thus lowering the level of damaging salt water in the river.

I have been working with county staff, the Countywide Community Revitalization Team (CCRT), on reducing crime and improving the quality of life for residents in the Plantation community which is just south of Century Village. The Sheriff's office has increased patrols and enforcement and the county has put in additional sidewalks. Street lights are coming. Reducing

crime in this area should also benefit the Village.

**Ban on new donation bins:** – There will be two public hearings on a proposed county ordinance that would ban all future donation bins in unincorporated Palm Beach County. A large number of the existing donation boxes were illegally installed by for-profit companies. Many individuals using them didn't realize their donated goods were going to for-profit companies rather than local charities. Existing bins will be grandfathered in if they are in compliance with local rules.

## Tax Collector

Thanksgiving is a wonderful holiday. Most Americans look forward to a Thanksgiving meal with all the trimmings. I enjoy carrying on the traditions my mom passed to me and my siblings. Thanksgiving is also a time to share our bounty with those in our community who are less fortunate. November 1 is the first day of the 2012 property tax season. 2012 taxes are payable through April 1. All unpaid property taxes are delinquent after April 1. The majority of Palm Beach County property owners pay their taxes

in November to take advantage of that month's 4 percent discount. Property tax discounts are set by Florida law. The other discounts are:

- December payment receives 3 percent discount

- January payment receives 2 percent discount
- February payment receives 1 percent discount
- March payment receives no discount

Payments must be received/paid in our office by 5:00 p.m. on the last day of the month in which the discount is available. Taxes paid after April 1 are delinquent. You will want to plan ahead. November is our busiest month. Last November over 62,500 people came into our service centers and we received 47,503 calls over that 30 day period. This large volume can result in long lines and wait times. Here are some options to avoid crowded offices and phone waits:

- Check out wait times for high volume services, including property taxes at

- Pay online by e-check and credit card. E-checks are free. Credit card companies charge a minimum fee of 2.35 percent for each transaction.

• Payments by Bank Online Bill Pay should include your Property Control Number or Tangible Account Number. Please note that mail delivery and bank processing times vary.

- Drop a payment in a convenient drop box located inside the lobby at every service location.

• Payments may be mailed to Post Office Box 3353, West Palm Beach, FL 33401-3353. Include your Property Control or Tangible Account Number on the check. Do not staple, clip, fold, write or mark the payment stub. If you changed your address you need to fill out a change of address form and return it to our office. You can download a form from the Property Appraiser's website at [pbcgov.com/papa/AddressCh](http://pbcgov.com/papa/AddressCh)

If you filed a petition with the Value Adjustment Board contesting your property assessment, the following are the payment options:

- Pay the non-ad-valorem assessments in-full and make a partial payment of at least 75% of the ad-valorem taxes, less the applicable discount,

before taxes become delinquent on April 2, 2013; or

- Pay all taxes in full before taxes become delinquent on April 2, 2013.

Also, payment options for a classification or exemption challenge, or the assessment based on an argument that the property was not substantially complete as of January 1 are:

- Pay all non-ad-valorem taxes and the amount of ad-valorem tax which the taxpayer admits in good faith to be owing less the applicable discount before taxes become delinquent on April 2, 2013; or
- Pay the full amount, before taxes become delinquent on April 2, 2013.

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# LET US GIVE THANKS

In 1858, proclamations were written to appoint the day of

Thanksgiving by 25 states and two territories. That day was to be, as it is now, the fourth Thursday in November.

In 1621, the Pilgrims and members of the Wampanoag tribe, along with Squanto, a Pautuxet Native American, celebrated a plentiful harvest that had been realized that year after many years of crop failure. Squanto taught the Pilgrims to grow corn and catch eel; both foods being on the table along with waterfowl, venison, wild turkey, vegetables and fruit. The celebration lasted three days. Many prayers of Thanksgiving were offered for the bountiful harvest.

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## LEGAL UPDATES



### Local Attorney

Last month we reviewed the first two steps for the annual meeting and election. This month we will review the steps which follow.



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### The Candidate Information Sheet – Submitted 35 days prior to the annual meeting

Each candidate may, if he or she chooses, submit one candidate information sheet ("Sheet") that is no larger than 8 1/2 inches by 11 inches. The candidates are limited to only one side of that Sheet. While that limitation is not found in the Florida Statutes, it is specifically stated in the Florida Administrative Code. The Sheet must be received by the Association no later than 35 days prior to the date of the annual meeting. Extensions to this deadline may not be granted by the Board. The Condominium Act does provide that in order to reduce costs, the Association may print or duplicate the Sheets on both sides of the paper. The purpose of the Sheet is to provide the candidate an opportunity to describe his or her background, education, and qualifications as well as other factors deemed relevant by the candidate. However, there is no limitation on these "other factors". This is the source of most of the questions I receive each year from association Boards of Directors concerned with liability due to the remarks included on such a Sheet. The association is prohibited from editing, altering, or otherwise modifying the content of the Sheet. However, the Condominium Act provides that the Association is not liable for the contents of the Sheets prepared by the candidates. (This is only true for

condominiums, not for homeowners associations).

Please note that the failure of an association to include a copy of a timely delivered Sheet for each eligible candidate to the eligible voters shall require the association to send out an amended second notice, explaining the need for the amended notice and include the Sheets if this can be done within the time frames required for a second notice. If an amended second notice cannot be timely mailed or delivered, the association must re-notice and reschedule the election. If the election has already been conducted, the association will be required to conduct a new election.

**Second Notice of  
the Annual Meeting  
– Must be sent in  
accordance with the  
Bylaws but no less  
than 14 days prior  
to the annual meet-  
ing and election.**

The second notice contains a copy of the notice and agenda of the meeting along with various other documents. The notice and agenda must be mailed or hand delivered to each unit owner and posted on a conspicuous location at the condominium property. The additional documents sent to the unit owners include the proxies for those who cannot attend so that they may be counted for the quorum and vote on non-election issues; ballots for the election of officers if an election is being held; two envelopes for submitting the ballot for the election of directors; voting certificates; if required by the declaration of condominium to determine who votes for a particular unit.



## The Doctor Who Makes House Calls

People think that doctors who make house calls went the way of horse-drawn carriages. fears."

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

- Anti-diarrhea medicine
- Aspirin and/or acetaminophen
- Adult vitamins (if needed)
- Hydrogen peroxide
- Band-Aids (assorted sizes)
- Roll of gauze or bandages
- First aid tape
- Petroleum jelly

- Rubbing alcohol
- Tweezers

Several "Seasonal" Organizations will be resuming within the next two months (November & December ) see "Organizational News" for details....


